

Chicago Wins Two, Yanks Split In Close League Race

The Chicago White Sox roared into the August stretch run today with their best lead yet and with a definite schedule advantage over the rest of the way, because they have more games left than any of the other contenders.

By the same token, they have fewer games to play with the teams battling for the flag. From now on they have only four more games with the Yankees, six with the Indians, seven with the Red Sox, and nine with the Tigers for a total of 26. But they have 27 to go with the lowly outcasts, 12 with the six place Athletics, 5 with the seventh place Senators and 10 with the eighth place Orioles.

The Yankees have a tougher road to hoe with 32 games against the contenders and only 10 against the lesser lights. They have 3 more with the Indians, 10 with the Red Sox and 8 with the Tigers. But they have only one more with Kansas City, with Washington and 6 with Baltimore.

Cleveland has 30 more with the contenders, 12 with the Tigers and 6 with the Red Sox and 7 with the all-arms, 9 with Kansas City, 8 with Washington, and 6 with Baltimore.

The Red Sox have to contend with the contenders 29 times, 6 with the Yankees in addition to the others. They also have 22 with the "Cousins," 7 with K. C., 6 with Washington and 6 with Baltimore. Detroit has the toughest schedule of all with 35 games against contenders and only 17 against the outcasts, 6 with K. C., 7 with Washington and 6 with Baltimore.

The White Sox, even though they have lost their ace, Dick Donovan, for a month with appendicitis, while the Indians secured a doubleheader and the Yankees brought back Don Larsen, have not in a bad spot. They came through splendidly by winning 3-1, in 11 innings, and 4-5 in the opener they tied the score in the eighth when catcher Fitzgerald dropped a third strike for what would have been the third out and Jim Rivera scored from third. With the bases loaded, pitcher Pedro Ramos hit George Ball with a pitch then walked Rivera to force home two runs in the 11th, Jack Harshman, filling in for Donovan, pitched 6 2/3 innings for his seventh victory.

In the second game Rivera collected four hits to pace the White Sox. Washington rallied for two runs in the ninth but a fine relay play, Rivera to Nellie Fox to Sherm Lollar tipped the tying run off the plate.

Yankees Home Party Frank Bauer, Mickey Mantle, andogi Berra staged Larsen's welcome home party with first inning homers in a 3-2 Yankee victory over the Sox but the Kansas Cityans bounced back with a 3-1 second game triumph. Trailing 1-0 in the second game, Gus Zernial bopped a two-run homer in the eighth and the Athletics piled on five runs with a barrage of singles in the ninth.

The incoming fourth place Red Sox were the only other contenders to show a profit, leading Detroit, 3-3 and 3-2. In the opener Ted Williams' grand slam honor helped Frank Sullivan to his 14th victory, a four-run, bonus baby Frank from Army chores twice in the second victory, scattering 11 hits and leaving 12 Detroiters on base. Jim Piersall's ninth inning homer broke that one up.

Cleveland licked Baltimore 6-0 on Art Houtteman's six-hit effort after the Orioles rallied for four runs in the eighth to win the opener, 4-3. The Indians picked up with a triple play to help Houtteman to his triumph.ookie Bob Hale's key single drove home the winning run in the opener for Baltimore.

Don Newcombe won his 14th game against one loss, as five-hitter while the Dodgers pounded out 14 in an 11-2 triumph at St. Louis. Roy Campanella had four hits including his 33rd homer.

The Giants ended Milwaukee's 13-game winning streak with a 7-3 triumph in which Willie Mays hit his 33rd homer. Jim Brown struck Joe Adcock with a pitch and broke his arm, putting him out of action at least a month. Del Crandall and George Crowe hit Milwaukee homers.
