# Condemnation Gets Backing From O&C Counties, Officials

Portland — Outright condemnation of rights of way for timber access roads was supported last week by members of the executive committee of the Association of O&C Counties meeting here.

The group, which includes County Judge Rodney Keating of Jackson county, drafted a message to the bureau of land management urging that agency to condemn rights-of-way in two areas of Douglas county where timber sale negotiations have been held up for months by the lack of access.

The BLM has been reluctant to condemn rights of way, preferring to negotiate right of way agreements, but several counties have been critical of this attitude.

The committee also decided to file for dismissal of a suit by A. W. Lafferty, Portland, and Richard L. Merrick, Washington, D.C., in which they seek \$600,000 in attorney's fees for a suit they filed for Clackamas county.

**To File Motion**

Frank Sever, attorney for the group, said the dismissal motion will be filed within 10 days.

In addition to Keating, those attending were County Judges Carl C. Hill, Douglas county, and Raymond Lathrop, Josephine county, and commissioners Ralph Peterson, Lane; Wesley Schulmer, Tillamook; Charles R. Newman, Yamhill, and Fred A. Kruse, Coos.

The name Del Rio brings back memories of her sultry appeal in the day when she nibbled on gardenia petals and was one of the great stars of the screen.

Today the beautiful Mexican actress sat in the patio of the Beverly Hills hotel and thought over the Turners and Monroes of today.

"The type of star has changed," she said in her soft voice. "Of these today, I prefer Ava Gardner."

"The others—so different. When I was here stars were more sophisticated. It was the mystery, too, like Garbo. There is none of the mystery in Hollywood now. Marlon Brando, I think, is the greatest personality to come along, and a wonderful actor. That combination makes a lasting star."

The actress, wearing a lime green linen dress, showed the same slender figure, flashing smile and porcelain-like skin. I was so surprised to see her hair and eyes aren't black, after all, but brown. She'll be 50 next week, she says, but she could pass for 38.

Thirty years ago Dolores Del Rio arrived in Hollywood as a wampus baby star and posed in a low-slung bathing suit with Janet Gaynor, Fay Wray and Joan Crawford. Her best known films were "What Price Glory," "Romana," "Wonder Bar" and "Madame Dubarry."

After starring with Orson Welles in "Journey into Fear" 12 years ago, she divorced art director Cedric Gibbons and returned to Mexico City "for a short holiday."

"But I found a budding motion picture industry in my country and I have pioneer's blood," she said.

"I never thought I would play parts there. I did roles I always wanted to play but never could in Hollywood. I didn't want to be beautifully dressed and parade around. I want meaty parts."
