New Ceramic Coating Has Unusual Features

Chicago—U.P.—Radically new and flexible ceramic coatings will soon be available to industrial firms as the result of a process developed at the Illinois Institute of Technology.

Called "solution" ceramics, the new coatings differ from the conventional ones in that they are not brittle at a few hundred degrees Fahrenheit.

Officials at the Institute pointed out a number of its unusual features:

1. Application is easy and requires neither expensive equipment nor protected heating.
2. Temperatures required by the coating process is far lower than that required for porcelain enamel.
3. Thickness of coatings can be controlled accurately. While films as thick as .01 inch can be deposited, some coatings only a few millionths of an inch thick have been made.
4. Coatings are less hard than ordinary ceramic materials. This allows sheet metals coated with solution ceramics to be stamped after coating.
