Changes in Potato Regulations Delayed

Ontario — (U.P.) — Members of the Idaho-Eastern Oregon Potato Market Control committee voted in Ontario yesterday to postpone any changes in marketing regulations for potatoes at this time.

There had been talk of withdrawing number two potatoes from the market in an attempt to better seriously depressed prices. However, some 100 growers from Idaho and Eastern Oregon recommended no changes be made.

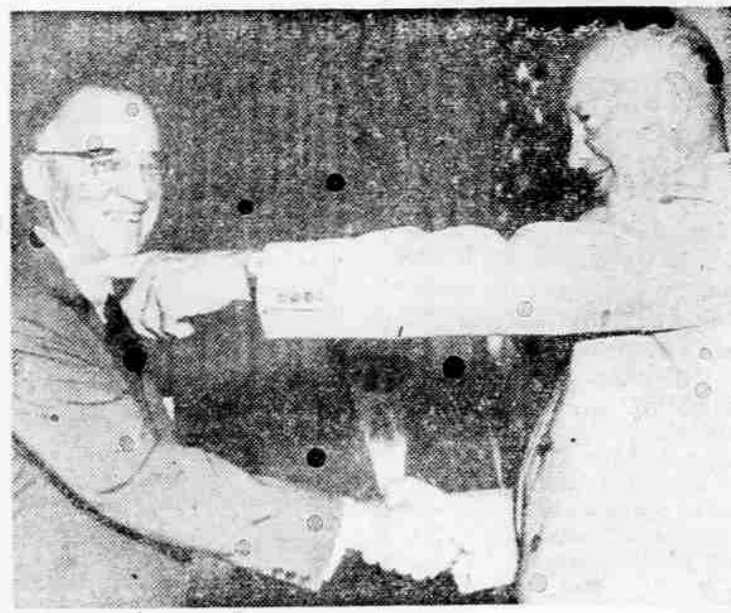
The action rules out a possible cooperative effort with the state of Washington to withdraw certain grades to up prices. Washington has already withdrawn number two spuds from the market.

Growers said they have not yet given up hope for this year's crop although prices are so low they wouldn't cover the cost of digging.

Bit of Home Going To Fliers

Tokyo — (U.P.) — The Air Force is flying a little bit of home to Hong Kong for the 11 American airmen on their way to freedom.

The Air Force announced it is sending two transport planes to Hong Kong with three doctors, steak, ice cream, soap and shaving gear.

In Hong Kong, the United States consulate said the men—due to arrive Thursday—will start home to their families within three hours after they cross to freedom.

An Air Force liaison officer will meet the fliers at the border and take them to the plush Hong Kong Jockey club for baths, drinks and clean clothes.

If everything follows schedule, the men should cross through the bamboo curtain between 8:30 and 9 a.m. (PST) Thursday.

The families of the 11 men probably will meet their loved ones in Honolulu. President Eisenhower promised that the men and their families would be reunited "as soon as humanly possible."

Harriman Predicts Stevenson Election

Dublin, Ireland — (U.P.) — Governor Averell Harriman of New York predicts that Adlai Stevenson will be elected president of the United States next year, even if he has to oppose President Eisenhower.

Harriman said he himself would not seek the 1956 Democratic nomination.

Harriman told a news conference in Dublin that he is satisfied the Democratic party will win next year's presidential election and that Stevenson will become chief executive "regardless of who runs under the Republican banner."

Harriman is on a month-long European tour.
