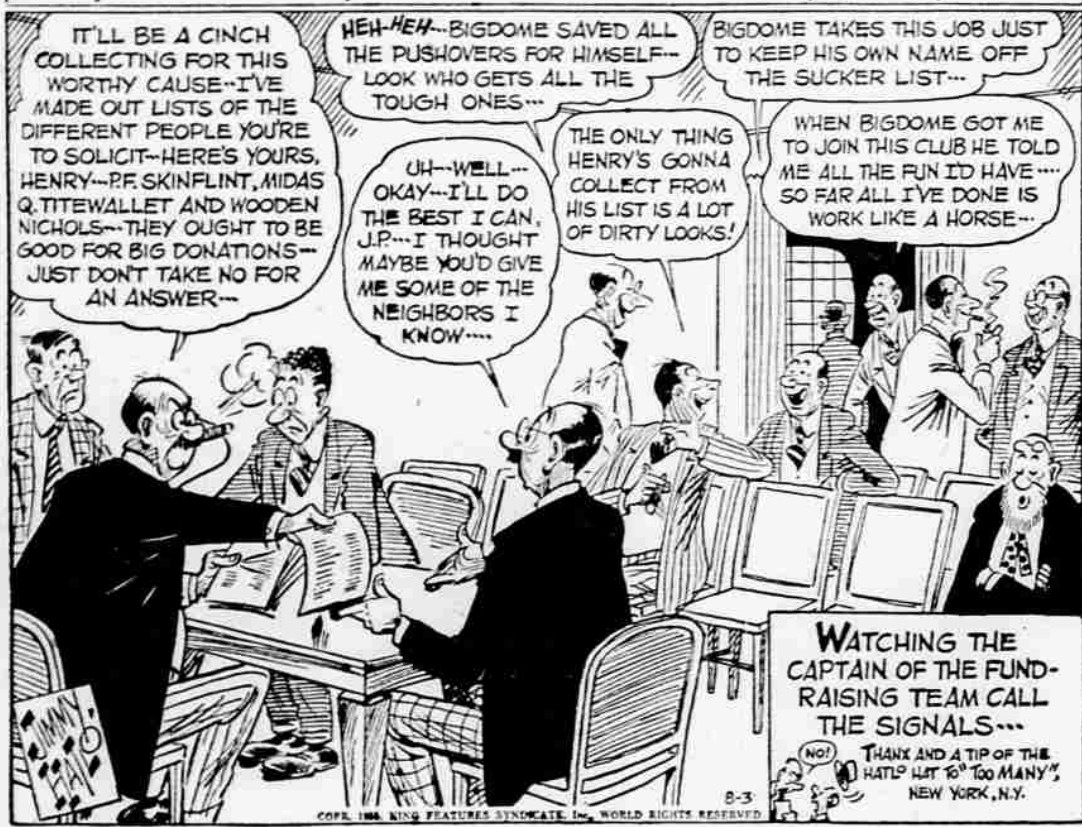
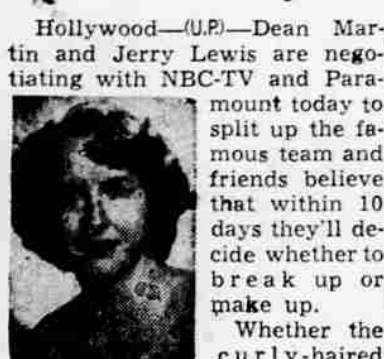




Around Hollywood

Hollywood—(U.P.)—Dean Martin and Jerry Lewis are negotiating with NBC-TV and Paramount today to split up the famous team and friends believe that within 10 days they'll decide whether to break up or make up.

Whether the curly-haired singer and the rubber-faced comedian will "divorce" nearly has pushed the eternal question of Debbie and Eddie out of Hollywood conversation.

Dean and Jerry's long-smoldering differences erupted three months ago when Jerry went to New Jersey for a premiere of their latest picture and Dean stayed home. At the time Martin insisted, "we will work together next fall because we have contracts."

But after Jerry returned to Hollywood the two separately approached Paramount and NBC, through lawyers and agents, to try to get out of the contracts. The employers are trying to reconcile the team, friends say, "and it's a matter of delicate negotiations with everybody making different offers and

counter-offers. Right now Dean and Jerry both want to break up.

The boys are not due to work together until their first TV show in September. But their associates feel "this quarrel will be settled one way or another within the next 10 days."

"I think they're still torching for each other and may fall back into each other's arms any minute," one associate of the team said. "It's like a marriage. A couple tries separation, and winds up back together."

Hollywood experts at first chorused Martin and Lewis were great as a team but divided would fall. However, since their separation both have been pressed with offers for single performances.

Major film studios have showered Jerry with comedy roles. Dean has been asked to star alone in musicals. Both have received lucrative offers from TV and Broadway shows.

"Those offers may really drive them apart," the associate adds. "Each is tempted to prove to the world, himself and the other that he has the talent to stand on his own."

One Paramount source said the studio insists the boys work together, or they'll have to buy back their contract. Other sources said the studio was trying to work out a new contract that would allow the team to take outside jobs as singles.

Their Paramount contract was one of the most lucrative in show business—\$5,000,000 for the next five years at one picture a

Astoria—(U.P.)—Four buffalo, including a two-ton bull, are en route to a tiny Alaskan island along with 70 head of cattle where a big-game hunter hopes to build his own wild bison herd for hunting purposes.

The unusual cargo was carried aboard the converted minesweeper, "Dragon," which sailed from Astoria late yesterday. It is destined for tiny Popoff Island, the domain of big-game hunter and guide Harold Nickles.
