Festival Musicians To Present First Concert This Afternoon

Ashland—The first of four accompanying himself on the guitar. Besides the concerts, the music program this year includes incidental music for the plays. All of the Sunday concerts this year will be in the theatre, and all are open to the public free of charge. Directed and arranged by festival music director Bernard Windt, the concert includes both vocal and instrumental groups. Vocal groups will include four and five-part madrigals, three-part English Ayres, and some soloists. The instrumental music will be dances. All of the music in the first concert is Elizabethan, and some of the later concerts will feature more modern works.

Company members appearing in today's concert are Clarissa Berning, Redmond; Josephine Maillard, Davis, Cal.; Jim Baker, Medford; Ted D'Arms, Princeton, N. J.; Martin Bliefenrich, Newberg; Susan Shively, Visalia, Cal.; and Bernard Windt. Mrs. Joanne Sousa of Ashland will accompany the groups. A special feature of the concert will be solo numbers by Brad Curtis, now in his fourth season with the festival. For several years Curtis worked as a night club piano player and singer. Two years ago he took up the study of English and American folk music and has since developed a repertoire of more than 400 songs. This afternoon he will sing several songs.
