

# Stevenson To Reveal Presidential Plans In Next Four Months

Chicago — (U.P.) — Adlai E. Stevenson will announce within the next four months whether he will run again for President. If he makes the race he thinks he can beat President Eisenhower.

Stevenson made the promise and prediction last night after a dinner held in conjunction with the 47th annual Governors' conference here.

It was the 1952 Democratic presidential candidate's most straight forward statement to date on his political plans and on the chances of defeating Mr. Eisenhower.

Talk of Stevenson's future has dominated the Governors' convention, even though his only connection with it is that he happens to live in a Chicago suburb.

Stevenson brought the conjectures to a boil last night with a flat statement to about 100 newsmen when he said "I'll tell you what I am going to do, and why, sometime before the end of November, possibly before."

He scoffed at any suggestions that "I'm afraid to run against Ike."

But Stevenson still refused to say whether he has made up his mind about making a second bid for the White House.

The former Illinois governor set the deadline for announcing his political status after two days of huddling with Democratic governors attending the conference.

Earlier, Michigan's Gov. G. Mennen Williams caused a mild furor at the conference with a

## Plan for Dam at Yreka Gets Study

Yreka — The Yreka city council considered the possibility of an underground dam to solve the city's severe water shortage Tuesday night. Mayor Adair Wilson was instructed to report on the cost of hiring a surveyor to determine what such a project would cost.

The dam, if installed, would be made of interlocking sheets of steel driven into the ground near the North Well. The well is presently the town's source of water. The dam would back up an estimated 25 per cent more water to be picked up by the well's pumps, which is now flowing on by the well.

The Siskiyou county board of supervisors the same day adopted an ordinance creating the position of county administrator. A previous ordinance for the same purpose was declared unconstitutional by District Attorney Floyd Merrill.

Merrill sent a memo to the board Tuesday stating he believed the second move to be lawful. Under it, the administrator is an agent of the board, and is not a separate county officer.

## Oregon Potato Growers Schedule Referendum

Portland — (U.P.) — A referendum among Oregon potato growers on extending the Oregon-California federal marketing agreement on potatoes will be held from Aug. 24-31, the U. S. Department of Agriculture said today.

The agreement now covers Deschutes, Klamath, Jefferson, Crook and Lake counties. It is proposed to extend it to all other counties except Malheur which is under another federal order with Idaho.

Approval of two thirds of the voters is required.

## Pendleton Boy Drowns In Umatilla River

Pendleton — (U.P.) — A seven-year-old Pendleton boy drowned in the Umatilla river near here yesterday afternoon.

The body of Jackie Kennedy was pulled from the river shortly after 6 p.m. It was noticed by a group of children with whom the boy had been swimming under the highway bridge just outside of town.

He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Homer Kennedy, who moved here about a year ago from Salem.
