

Big Crowd Sees Stars Lick Seattle

Pennant-hungry Hollywood baseball fans turned out 12,152 strong last night to see the Stars fight back and defeat Los Angeles, 5-3. It was the biggest crowd of the year at Gilmore field and overflowed into newly-erected bleachers in the outfield.

The second place Stars remained four games behind Seattle's Pacific Coast League leaders. The Rainiers eked out a 2-1 win over Portland in 10 innings.

In other games, Sacramento defeated San Diego, 6-4, for the first time this season on the Solons' home field and Oakland scored 10 runs in the fifth inning to down San Francisco, 11-7.

Caps 19th
Hollywood's Bob Garber became the league's first 19-game winner as he turned back the Angels on eight hits. He has lost 12. The 26-year-old right-hander walked only one and struck out seven for a season's total of 169, tops in the league.

In Seattle, Gene Verble sliced a sharp double over first with two out in the bottom of the 10th inning to score Joe Ginsberg with the winning run.

The Rainier third sacker's timely blow broke up a duel between Seattle's Howie Judson and Bob Alexander. Both had pitched shutout ball since the first inning when Luis Marquez sacrifice fly for Portland's run and Jerry Zuvella homered for Seattle.

Warren Noyes, chucker from Seattle, won't be here this week, Cooney reported. Marv Scherpf, another regular, has been unable to pitch since a fall while fielding a bunt last Saturday at Bend. He has a pulled thigh.

Braves Hand Forlorn Cards Another Defeat

The once-proud St. Louis Cardinals, now hopelessly bogged down deep in seventh place, face their worst finish in 36 years.

Not since 1919 have the Cardinals wound up as low as seventh but they don't promise to wind up any higher this year the way they are performing now.

Thursday night's 5-3 defeat at the hands of Milwaukee was the 18th setback in the last 27 games for the forlorn Cardinals, who have watched every club in the National League, except Pittsburgh, pass them by. Oddly, it was Branch Rickey, current general manager of the Pirates, who managed the last Cardinal team to finish seventh.

Cardinal owner Gusie Busch has indicated there will be a "major turnover" in the club this winter but opposing hitters are getting in their links against the present St. Louis pitchers while they can.

Rookie Chuck Tanner and Bill Bruton of the Braves each connected for homers against loser Larry Jackson Thursday night, making a total of 147 home runs—highest in the league—that have been hit off Cardinal hurl-

ing this year. Southpaw Warren Spahn went the route for the second time in four days to register his 12th victory. He beat the Cards, 12-1, in the opening game of the series Monday.

Redlegs Nip Cubs
Cincinnati regained fifth place by nipping Chicago, 2-1, on a smooth six-hit pitching effort by Art Fowler. The Redlegs put together singles by Gus Bell, Chuck Harmon, Ricky Bridges and Roy McMillian for their runs in the sixth off Paul Minner. Dee Fondy singled home the only Cub run in the eighth.

The league-leading Dodgers, who had lost two games in a row to the Giants, jumped on them for an 8-5 victory despite homers by Whitey Lockman and Sid Gordon. Brooklyn knocked out Jim Hearn with a three-run burst in the opening frame, went ahead 5-0 when Don Hoak slammed a two-run homer in the second inning and then added three more runs with the help of Willie Mays' three base error in the fourth. Reliever Don Besant was credited with his fifth victory as the Dodgers remained 14 games ahead of the second-place Braves.

The Phillies and Pirates were not scheduled.

Rained out of their scheduled game with the Red Sox, the idle Yankees stayed one game in front in the American League race when the second-place White Sox split a doubleheader with the Athletics.

Chicago Splits With A's
The White Sox went back into first place temporarily when they beat Kansas City, 6-2, in the opener, but then dropped back into second place by losing the nightcap, 5-3. Virgil Trucks of the White Sox pitched two-hit ball over the first five innings of the first game but retired in favor of Dixie Howell shortly after being hit on the right knee by a line drive off the bat of Harry Simpson in the sixth. In the second game, Arnie Portocarrero limited the White Sox to six hits for his fourth victory. Vic Power and Sherm Lollar hit homers.

In the only other game scheduled, the Indians defeated the Tigers, 5-3, to snap a three-game losing streak and climb within three percentage points of the White Sox. Southpaw Herb Score, the major league strike-out leader, fanned 13 batters in increasing his season total to 192. Two errors in the eighth inning helped the Indians rally for four runs.
