State Fair Expects Biggest Race Season In 90-Year History

Salem — (U.P.) — All the space in the state fair race horse barns has been reserved, pointing to the biggest race meet in the 90-year history of the Oregon State fair, officials said today.

The fair opens Sept. 3, a week from next Saturday, and continues through Sept. 10. Ten races are scheduled daily at Lone Oak track except Sunday. Post time will be 1:15 p.m.

More than 350 thoroughbreds have been entered for the eight running races which are carded each day of the meet. The first two events daily will be harness

races, and 50 of the trotters and pacers are scheduled to compete.

Purses Exceed \$30,000
Total purses for the meet will exceed \$30,000, and a special event is on the program for every day.

Featured on the opening Saturday Sept. 3, will be the Inaugural handicap for three-year-olds and up. The 6½ furlong race carries an \$800 purse. Monday's big feature will be the Labor Day handicap, for \$1,000 in prizes.

The Speed handicap will be the main event Tuesday. The five-furlong race has a \$700 purse. The Governor's handicap rates top billing Wednesday. It is a 1 1-5th mile race for an \$800 purse.

Other Races Carded
The McFadden Memorial will top Thursday's card, with a purse of \$700. Friday's special will be the Os West Primer, a five-furlong race with a \$700 purse. The Au Revoir handicap will highlight the final day of racing Sept. 10. The final handicap will be 1 1-16th mile for a \$1000 purse.

Dr. E. B. Stewart of Roseburg is chairman of the Fair commission and Charles A. Evans is Director of Racing at the state fair. Cecil L. Edwards will be Steward for the Oregon Racing commission.

Jaundice Blamed In Japanese Death

Washington — (U.P.) — A high Defense Department official has disclosed that jaundice — not fallout effects — killed the Japanese fishermen who died after being exposed to fallout from the big U.S. hydrogen bomb test at Eniwetok in 1952.

Dr. Frank B. Berry, assistant secretary of defense, said this fact has been known for some time.

"I haven't hesitated to mention it at medical meetings and the like," he said. "The Japanese doctors have conceded that this is true."

Berry said the jaundice was induced by a bodily reaction following a blood transfusion and is not uncommon in America.

Tragedy Ends Honeymoon Cruise

Erie, Pa. — (U.P.) — The planned 6,000 mile honeymoon cruise of a 78-year-old Spanish-American war veteran and his 70-year-old bride ended in tragedy Monday when a sudden storm smashed their cabin boat to bits on Lake Erie and the husband died.

Mrs. Louise Hecker, New Port Richey, Fla., whose husband died in her arms as they bobbed in life preservers, said their boat "just opened up and split apart."

She struggled desperately for more than two hours to save her husband, Capt. Harvey Hecker, before she was rushed by Coast Guard boat to an Erie hospital. Coroner Millard Turner said Hecker died of a combination of drowning and exposure.

The Coast Guard rushed to the scene about 14 miles east of here when Herbert Durst, a farmer heard Mrs. Hecker's screams a short distance off shore. He said he found the woman struggling to remain afloat. She was clutching the body of her husband who had died about 30 minutes before.

Mrs. Hecker and her husband were on a 6,000-mile honeymoon cruise which they began at New Port Richey last May soon after their marriage. She had never sailed before.

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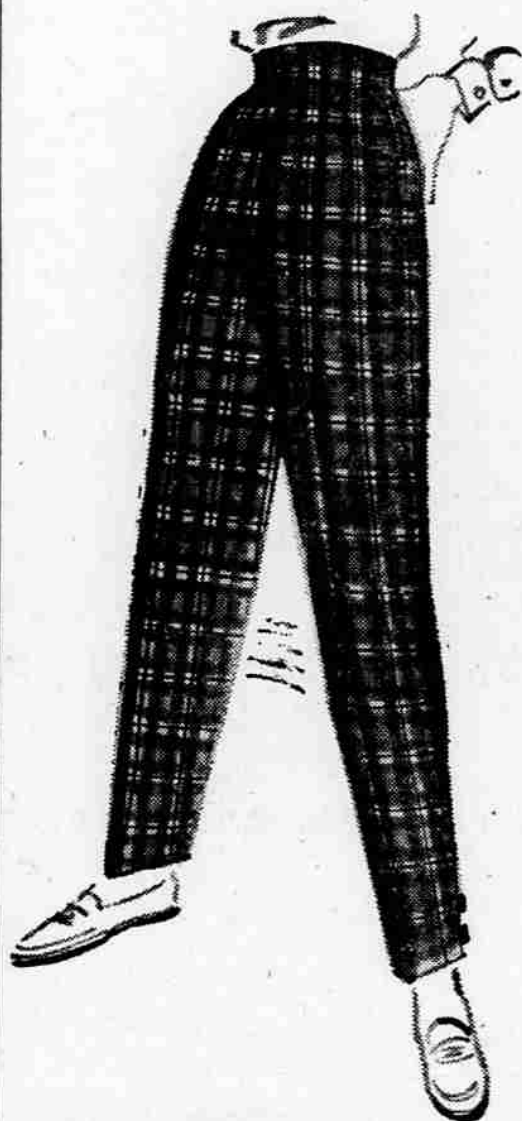
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
