29th Division Wins Rocket Shoot Title

Yuma Air Force Base, Ariz.—(U.P.)—The 29th air division team from Hamilton Air Force Base, Calif., was praised today for its resounding performance in the Defense Command rocket shooting.

The 29th, in walking away with the Western Air Defense title in Monday's finals, outscored all other 11 teams in the shootoff with a total of 14,800 points.

The 26th air division team from Roslyn Air Force Base, Long Island, N.Y., won the Eastern Air Defense title with a total of 12,800 points.

In the Central Air Defense competition, the title was won by the 33rd air division team from Tinker Air Force Base, Oklahoma City, with 9000 points.

The three winners will compete at this base in the worldwide Air Force rocket meet Oct. 3-7.

Shared Interests Vital
TO A Happy Marriage
No marriage can be happy unless the partners have some interests in common.

(Q) "Ours was a marriage of physical attraction. Now, after nearly seven years of marriage and two children, I find that my husband and I are drifting apart because we have no interests in common. He finished 10th grade and I went to business school after graduating from high school. I would have liked for us to continue our education because I love to read books and articles on any subject. About all my husband ever reads are the comics in newspapers or comic books. He likes to fish and watch sports over the television, while I like more serious programs. We don't agree on bringing up the children, either. He has old-fashioned ideas, while I try to keep up with the more modern methods. I wonder how I can live with him for many more years when he simply doesn't speak the same language about anything. What would you suggest?"

(A) For the sake of your children I advise you to try to develop some interests you can share with your husband. Try, also, to encourage his interest in some of the things that you like.

You are finding out, as many other people do, that it takes more than physical attraction to make a happy marriage. If your husband has no interest in intellectual pursuits, try to meet him on some other ground. That does not mean that you should give up your own interest in reading, but that you should add some other enthusiasm in keeping with your husband's tastes. Sports, for instance, can be quite interesting.

One of the most important areas where you should try to get together is in rearing your children. There is nothing more confusing to a child than to have his mother require one thing and his father another.

You may have to compromise in this matter. Try to persuade your husband to accept some of the more modern methods while you, in turn, accept some of the best from his "old-fashioned" methods. Then your children will know where they stand and what to expect from both of you.

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Former Houseboy Faces Murder Trial

Santa Monica, Calif.—(U.P.)—Former law student-houseboy John R. Crocker, 31, faces trial on charges of murdering Bel Air society matron Mrs. Norma McCauley, 33.

Crocker was ordered to stand trial Oct. 24 when he appeared in court Monday to enter a plea of innocent in the July 5 slaying of the wealthy divorcee for whom he once worked as a houseboy.

The one time Maine university student from Bangor gave police a confession that he stabbed and strangled Mrs. McCauley because she spurned his love, but later repudiated his confession.

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Polio Victim Flown On 6,000 Mile Trip

Honolulu—(U.P.)—Polio stricken Mary Chisholm of Berkeley, Calif., rested here today after a transpacific flight in an Air Force plane carrying her on a 6000-mile mercy flight from Korea to Buffalo, N.Y.

The 24-year-old girl who was stricken May 30 in Korea and is travelling in an iron lung, arrived at Tripler Air Force Base Monday after a flight from Tokyo.

"She stood the long flight exceedingly well and is in fine shape," according to an Air Force doctor accompanying her on the trip.

Miss Chisholm smiled broadly as she was taken by ambulance to Tripler Hospital for a 12 to 36-hour rest before continuing her journey.

An Air Force spokesman said Miss Chisholm will probably be flown Wednesday to Travis Air Force Base, north of San Francisco, and then to Buffalo for treatment.

Miss Chisholm is the daughter of American missionaries in the Far East.

Wasco County Judge Dies in Salt Lake City

The Dalles, Ore.—(U.P.)—Wasco County Judge Ward R. Weber, 61, died Sunday in Salt Lake City while vacationing at the home of his son-in-law, according to information received here today.

Death was attributed to a heart attack. Judge and Mrs. Weber had left The Dalles Friday to motor to Salt Lake City.

Anderson Murder Appeal Again Delayed

Klamath Falls, Ore.—(U.P.)—Flurath action on James Quinton Anderson's murder conviction appeal has been delayed another 30 days, defense attorney Robert Welch of Lakeview said yesterday.

Welch said Circuit Judge M. A. Biggs of Burns had allowed until Oct. 1 to perfect the appeal to the supreme court. The appeal was originally scheduled for presentation on July 1, but was delayed until Sept. 1 to allow time for the transcript to be prepared.

Anderson was convicted last February in Harney county Circuit court of the second degree murder of Richard David Miller, 25-year-old Klamath reservation show horse breeder.

Circus Elephant Goes on Rampage

Kennewick, Wash.—(U.P.)—A three-ton elephant named Judy broke loose from the Ringling Bros., Barnum and Bailey Circus here Monday night and plowed a two-mile path of destruction before it was subdued.

The huge beast was cornered and finally put under control in a grape vineyard. Panting circus workers and an estimated 150 volunteers helped corral the elephant.

When Judy was back where she belonged, circus officials started making the damage estimates from irate farmers and homeowners. Grape vines, fences and clothes-lines were ripped out by the giant pachyderm.

Judy broke loose after a "quarrel" with another elephant, a circus spokesman said.

entrance to a furniture store here. Missing were about \$1,000 from the safe—and a first aid kit.

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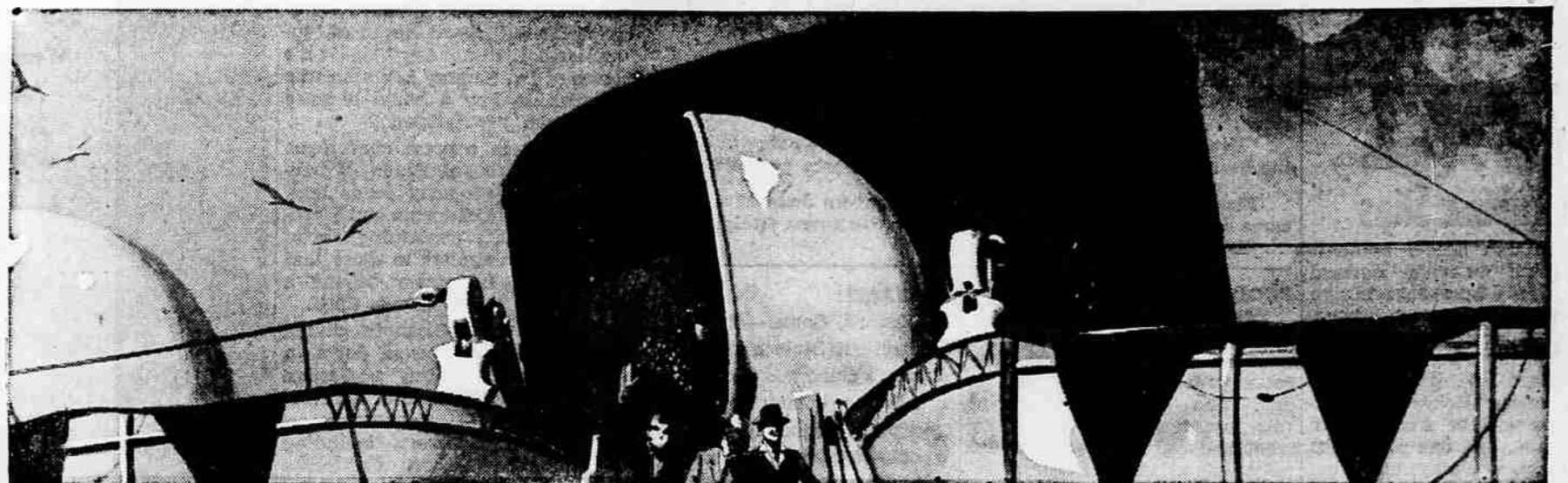
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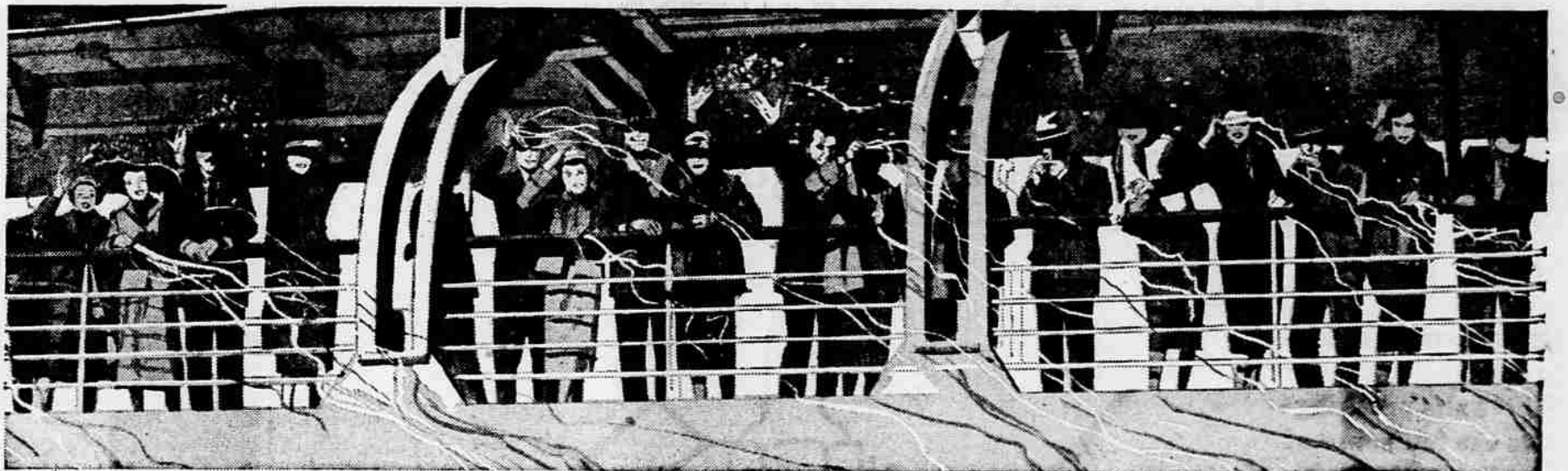
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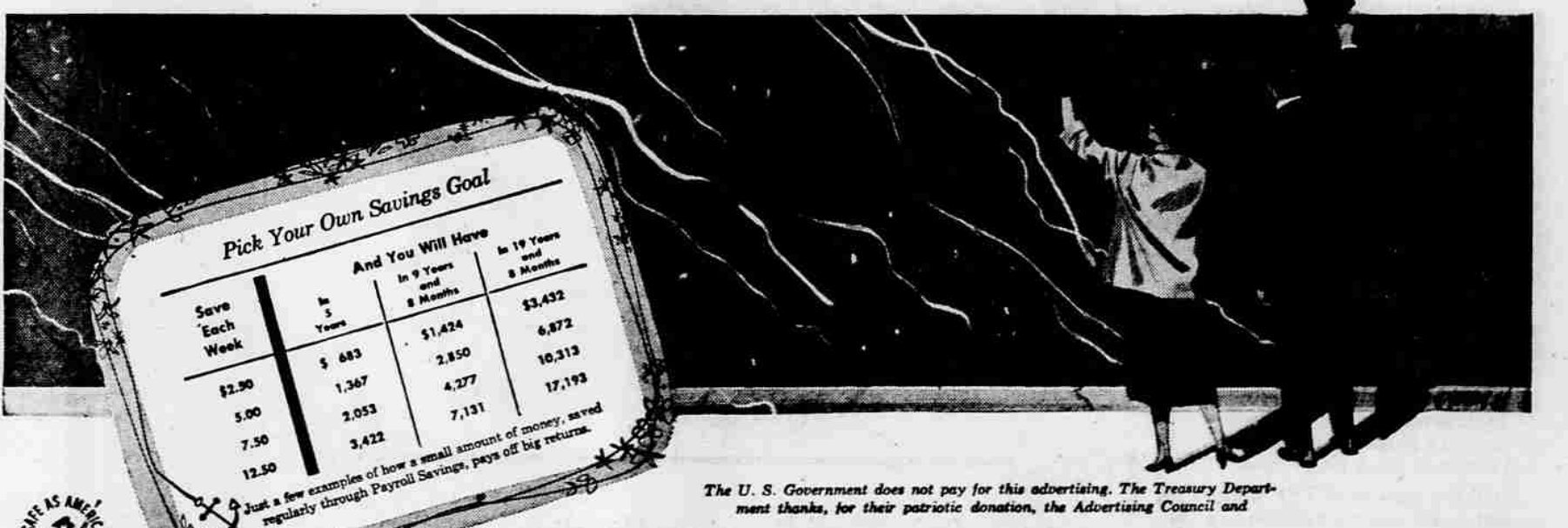
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
