Driving Tips Given On 4 Bad Practices

Detroit —(U.P.)— Driving too fast or too slow, just plain stopping and behind-the-wheel hypnosis — those are the four most dangerous practices on the nation's new super-highways.

The automotive industry makes these suggestions for safe super-highway travel:

1. Speed is the greatest danger. Don't let the long straight-ways lure you into traveling too fast.

2. Be especially wary of the behind-the-wheel hypnosis. To keep

your mind on your driving, avoid staring steadily at the highway. Keep your eyes moving — from rear-view mirror to the roadside, to the dashboard and then back to the road ahead.

3. Don't stop unless it's absolutely necessary. Sudden stops often cause rear-end collisions involving many cars.

4. Remember that going too slow also can cause trouble. The best rule is to keep your speed about the same as the rest of the traffic.

Orchardist Reveals His Best 'Scarecrow' Method

East Jordan, Mich. — (U.P.) —

Orchardist A. E. Darby today disclosed a new method of keeping pest birds from fruit orchards without using the old-fashioned scarecrow.

Darby said all you need to keep your orchard bird-free is a tent, a shotgun and a pair of good, stout climbing shoes. He says to pitch the tent on a platform or tower in the orchard, wait until the birds come to roost in the fruit trees, and fire the shotgun.

After several volleys, Darby said the birds give his orchard a wide berth as long as they see the tent pitched.

Tombstone Tells Story Of Young Girl's Murder

Quaint Meetinghouse Hill cemetery contains a weatherworn tombstone bearing this epitaph: "Thus fell this lovely blooming daughter"

Carved Frog Replica Found in Mesa Ruins

Mesa, Ariz. — (U.P.) —

A carved seashell replica of a frog has been uncovered in the Mesa Grande Indian ruins near here.

The seashell, decorated with pieces of turquoise, was found with the remains of an infant. Dr. Kenneth Stewart, director of the excavation from Arizona State college, said the frog was a valuable piece and indicated the ruins were rich in artifacts.

In the same location were a small bowl and numerous beads believed to have been attached to the child's clothing.

The remains of the child were dug from beneath a hallway between two rooms probably used by the Indians for storage. Dr. Stewart said the Indians commonly buried their infants under their floors or walls.

"My ambition," he says, "is to leave a visual record of my race for the world."

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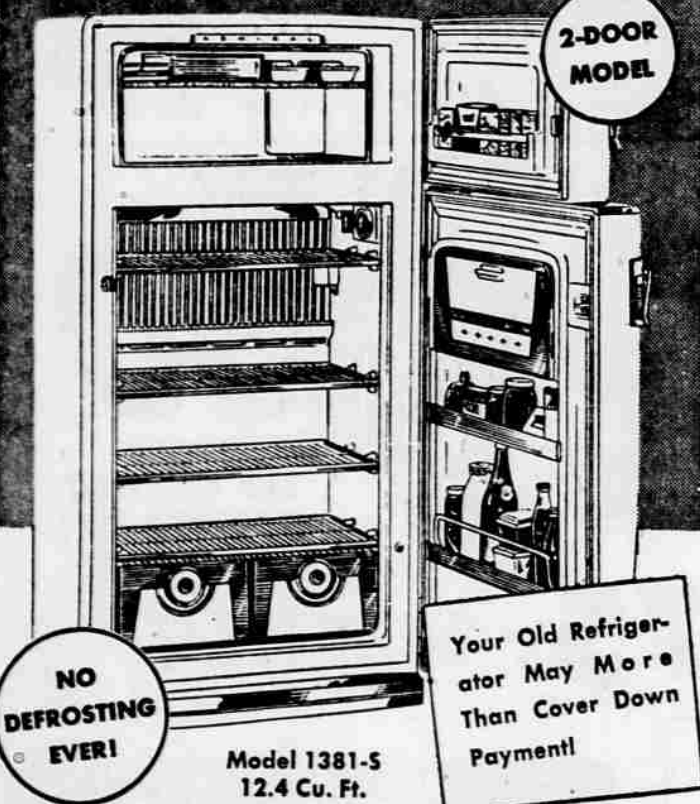
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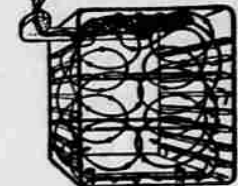
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
