

McKay Has No Intention of Adopting 'State Socialism'

Local Enterprise Favored if Best For Development

Portland — (U.P.) — Secretary of Interior Douglas McKay said last night he has no intention of adopting "state socialism" in the development of the nation's resources in areas where the work can better be done by local enterprise.

In a review of the Interior Department's policies and accomplishments before the Portland Isaac Walton league, McKay again took exception to critics who have charged him with a "giveaway" policy toward natural resources.

The Secretary said the department "has not and will not surrender any natural resources that should remain in the custody of all the people."

Protector of Wildlife
"But," he said, "The Department will not be a party to imposing state socialism on that portion of the economy that can best be developed through individual and local enterprise."

McKay said that while he was a supporter of hydro-electric development, he was opposed to "construction of dams where the damage to wildlife, fish or recreation will exceed the power benefits."

Among proposed hydro-electric projects which McKay said he opposes are the Beaver Marsh dam on the McKenzie river in Oregon and the Glacier View dam in Montana. He said the recreational and conservation values of these areas far outweigh the power benefits.

Subject To Reservation
Commenting on the Echo Park dam in the proposed Colorado river project, McKay said the site was reserved for power development years before the area was set aside as a national monument. He noted that the late President Roosevelt's order creating the area "specifically said it was subject to the pre-existing reservation for hydro-electric development."

Turning to the department's power policies, McKay cited expansion of services of Bonneville Power Administration. He said that since January, 1953, a total of 1,250,000 kilowatts of power capacity from new federal hydroelectric projects have been integrated into the Northwest power pool.

McKay said while he has been secretary BPA has collected more than \$7,000,000 in net revenue. On the conservation side, the secretary said eight new wildlife refuges have been established since January, 1953, and three more are in the process of being established.

In answer to opponents of the so-called tidelands bill, McKay said that instead of giving away the tidelands to the states, "we told the states that they own what is rightfully theirs. Then the federal government took over that portion of the tidelands outside the state boundaries."

Farmers' Income Drops 4 Per Cent

Washington — (U.P.) — The Agriculture Department said farmers' cash income totalled \$14,300,000,000 in the first seven months of 1955, a drop of 4 per cent from the comparable period last year.

The department, which disclosed the figures last night in a demand and price situation report, attributed the decline to smaller receipts for livestock and livestock products.

It said such receipts totaled \$9,000,000,000, 6 per cent less than a year ago and 9 per cent below 1954. Meat animals were down sharply, mostly because of lower hog prices.

Justice Department Tells Payments Made To Informants

Washington — (U.P.) — Justice Department paid 47 major undercover informants a total of \$43,000 in fees and expenses during a recent 21-month period.

A report released last night showed that former Communist John Lautner was the highest paid informant. He received more than \$16,000 for his work in a series of trials and in other proceedings "as yet undisclosed."

The figures were released in answer to a request made of Atty. Gen. Herbert Brownell Jr. at a news conference four months ago. He was asked for an analysis of the salaries paid to full time consultants as against

fees paid to "expert witnesses." The report covered the period July 1, 1953, through April 15, 1955. There was no comparison of the consultant vs. expert witness systems, however.
