Final Festival Concert Draws Large Audience; Cookes Attend

Ashland — The final concert of the Shakespearean festival season, held yesterday afternoon in the festival shell, drew a large and appreciative audience.

In the audience for the first time this season was Tom D. Cooke, Los Angeles, whose grant to the festival has made the expanded music program possible, and Mrs. Cooke. The Cookes are also attending the festival plays, and Saturday, Mr. Cooke, with

the city planning commission of Los Angeles for many years, attended a joint meeting of the California and Northwest chapters of the American Institute of Planners. The Cookes will return south tomorrow.

The Cookes are being entertained at a number of informal parties by valley friends. They were guests in the home of Mrs. L. P. Ames and her daughters on Kings highway Sunday evening, and were luncheon guests Monday of Mrs. Paul Janney, 192 Janney Jane.

A special feature of yesterday's concert was an Elizabethan dance, the Pavane, staged by company members Irene Baird and Hubert Whitfield. The dance, based on 16th century forms, was choreographed by the two actors. They were accompanied by the ancient instruments ensemble.

Also on the program were Elizabethan ballads sung and played by actor Brad Curtis, whose singing has made him a favorite with festival audiences for several years. Four part Madrigals and English Ayres were sung by Clarissa Berning, Jo Mailard, Jim Baker and Martin Bliefernich.

Solo songs in the concert included Miss Berning singing "Should He Upbraid?" Mr. Baker singing "Sweet Kate," and Mr. Bliefernich singing "Sweet Cupid, Ripen Her Desire," all accompanied by the ancient instruments ensemble. The final piece in the program was a suite for alto and tenor recorders.

The concerts this season have been free to the public, and have proved far more popular than expected. Bernard Windt, festival music director, states that present plans for next year's music program will continue the concerts each Sunday during August.

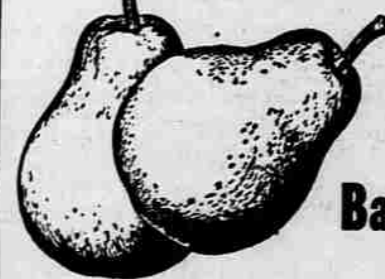
