

Walkouts Threaten To Idle Nearly 190,000 Men

Flam, Cooper Vie In Tennis Meet

Rye, N.Y.—(U.P.)—Top-seeded Herby Flam of Beverly Hills, Calif., collided with one of Australia's brightest young tennis prospects, 17-year-old Ashley Cooper, today in the quarter-final round of the Westchester Country Club Invitation tournament.

Cooper demonstrated he is a strong threat to the title favorite yesterday by upsetting Japanese Davis Cupper Kamo, 3-6, 6-3, 6-3. Kamo, fourth-seeded foreigner, recently won a share of the U.S. Doubles championship.

Another upset yesterday saw Kurt Nielsen of Denmark, top-seeded foreigner and Wimbledon finalist this year, beaten by 18-year-old Mike Green, of Miami, Fla., 14-12, 6-4. A total of five seeded players now have been upset.

In today's other quarter-finals Malcolm Anderson of Australia was to meet John Barrett of England; second-seeded Sammy Giammalva of Houston, Tex., faced Enrique Morea of Argentina; and Greco played Sid Schwartz of Long Beach, N.Y.

Detroit Owners Hopes To Align With Syndicate

Detroit—(U.P.)—A "for sale" sign soon may be hung on the Detroit Tigers because a baseball club is not considered a sound investment for a trust fund owner Spike Briggs said today.

But Briggs said he would make every effort to align himself with a syndicate which might buy the club because "the Briggs name has been part of the Detroit franchise since 1918 and I'd hate to end that association now."

An intricate legal situation which is expected to come to a head by the end of October is responsible for the possible sale of the multi-million dollar franchise, called by some the "strongest in baseball."

The final decision will rest with the U.S. Treasury Dept., which is appraising the estate of the late Walter O. Briggs for the purpose of inheritance taxes.

Tri-City Spills League Leaders

Tri-City continued its role as spoilers last night with its second straight one-run victory over league-leading Eugene but second place Wenatchee for the second time was unable to take advantage. The Chiefs lost their second straight one-run decision, too.

Jackson Foe Of Charles

Cleveland—(U.P.)—Heavyweight Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson risks his number three ranking against ex-champion Ezzard Charles tonight for a \$10,000 guarantee in their return TV-radio 10-rounder at the arena.

A defeat would be a serious setback for the fantastically unorthodox young flier from Far Rockaway, N.Y., who is gunning for a title shot next year.

However, 23-year-old Jackson is favored at 8-5 to beat 34-year-old Charles again. In their previous bout at Syracuse, N.Y., on Aug. 3, Tommy swarmed all over ancient Ezzard and won an upset unanimous decision. It was his seventh straight victory.

Chrysler Workers Threaten To Quit Jobs at Midnight

Almost 190,000 employees were on the verge of nationwide strikes today against Chrysler Corp., Westinghouse, and Pan American World Airways.

The biggest walkout threatened Chrysler. Leaders of the CIO United Auto Workers served notice that 139,000 employees would go on strike at midnight tonight in six states unless the big auto company comes up with new offers.

Simultaneously, the CIO Electrical Workers Union ordered a nationwide strike of 42,000 Westinghouse employees Sept. 11 unless a dispute is settled at the firm's giant East Pittsburgh, Pa., plant.

In New York, a strike was threatened for any time after midnight against Pan American World Airways. Michael J. Quill, president of the CIO Transport Workers Union, said 98 per cent of the 6,000 employees involved had voted for the walkout.

There were some bright spots in the labor picture, however. A tentative contract agreement between the Firestone Tire and Rubber Company and the CIO International Rubber Workers Union averted a possible strike of employees in seven states.

The agreement provided a general 12-cent hourly wage boost, plus vacation, holiday and hospitalization benefits. Plants involved are located at Akron, O.; Des Moines, Ia.; Fall River, Mass.; Los Angeles, Calif.; Memphis, Tenn.; New Castle, Ind.; Noblesville, Ind.; Pottstown, Pa.

Farm Machinery Dispute
In the farm machinery industry, strikes continued to idle 40,000 International Harvester Co. employees and 4,475 workers in two Allis-Chalmers Co. plants. Negotiations were continuing, however, and the Allis-Chalmers talks at Milwaukee, covering 15,000 employees, were expected to reach the critical stage today.

At Detroit, negotiators settled down for day-long talks in an attempt to avert the Chrysler walkout.

Hopes were high for a settlement, even though union Secretary-Treasurer Emil Mazey warned "if the company wants to avoid a strike at midnight it will have to move on many issues."

The company and union have already reached agreement on basic economic issues, including a modified guaranteed wage plan, a pay boost, and improved pensions. But "side issues" threatened to stall a final settlement.

A strike would idle plants in Michigan, California, Delaware, Indiana, Georgia, and Louisiana.

Time-Study Protest
The Westinghouse dispute involved a company-ordered time study project at the East Pittsburgh plant. About 2,200 day workers have already walked out in protest against the project and more than 6,000 production workers and 1,350 white collar employees were later furloughed.

Company officials charged that a Sept. 11 strike would be a violation of the company-union contract which expires four days later. But a union spokesman retorted that the East Pittsburgh dispute "affects every Westinghouse local."

The CIO Pan American employees were ready to walk out to back up demands for an 18-cent hourly wage increase for hourly-rated employees and a \$45 monthly pay boost for flight service employees.
