Acid Fruits and Joint Disability

She does not eat oranges, lemons, grapefruit, limes, tomatoes or other acid fruits or drink their juices, because, her doctor told her, fruit acids are not good for her arthritis. Now I have lame joints, but our doctor tells me to eat all the fruit or drink all the fruit juice I like, that it is good for what ails me. Please tell us about this in your good column. (K. A. M.)

Your doctor is right, Ma'am, and your relative in the big city ought to have a guardian, for apparently she is being lured by the charlatan who tells the poor soul that "acid" fruits are not good for whatever ails her.

As long as gypsies are permitted to separate suckers from their money, in this wonderful free country of ours people whose education was neglected will continue to imagine lemons, tomatoes and other "acid" fruits and their juices are not healthful, especially for certain invalids and certain valetudinarians.

Let me say without qualification that no matter what or whether anything ails you it is good for you to eat all the "acid" fruit or drink all the fruit juice you like, and I doubt that any reputable physician will venture to contradict this statement over his or her signature. Some near-doctors or queer-doctors and eminent but elusive "authorities" far, far away may deceive their customers about it, but they don't count.

Physiologically, acid fruits—lemons, limes, grapefruit, oranges, cranberries, gooseberries, whortleberries, pineapples, plums, p r u n e s, strawberries, cherries, peaches, apricots, currants, huckleberries, blueberries, and if there are different, o.k.—(if the last two are the same, o.k.; I'm not arguing) as well as to matos and apples, pears, and grapes and eke the luscious plantain that grew a reasonable distance from the little house in the

garden in the golden days—oh, to be in Canandaigua now, if the summer drought is over—the various acids in these fruits are oxidized in the body, releasing the potassium, sodium, magnesium etc., which are changed to carbonates thus increasing the alkalinity of the blood and tissues.

Sugar added to fruit or fruit juices does not detract from the alkalizing effect of the fruit or fruit juice on blood, tissues, urine.

Theoretically some foods, especially spinach, potatoes, beans, endives, tomatoes, plums, strawberries, dried figs, cocoa, chocolate, and tea may contain enough oxalic acid (which is not readily oxidized in the body) to cause formation of kidney stone. The only instance in my experience proved to be something entirely different, and after diligent search for an actual case of oxaluria I am inclined to dismiss it as the ghost of an eighteenth-century medical myth.

Warm Springs Aids Over 1,000 Patients

New York — The Georgia Warm Springs Foundation, now engaged in a \$400,000 expansion program, aided more than 1,000 polio-stricken patients from 40 states and 15 foreign countries during the past fiscal year, Basil O'Connor, president of the Warm Springs Foundation, revealed today in releasing the organization's latest annual report.

Youngsters 14 years of age and under accounted for more than half of those treated at Warm Springs, according to the report. Children between five and nine years of age—the group most susceptible to polio—accounted for 226 cases during the year.

Some of those who received treatment at the Foundation came from as far away as Australia to make use of the polio center's modern facilities and treatment methods. Most patient care at Warm Springs was underwritten by chapters of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

The Warm Springs report showed that the average patient needed approximately 60 days of hospital care. New patients—those being admitted for the first time—spent an average of 85 days in the hospital. In addition to polio patients, 29 persons suffering from after-effects of other diseases were admitted to Warm Springs for treatment, the report showed.

Malta Fever
My husband was told he has Malta fever. What part of the body does it affect and is there any cure for it? (Mrs. L. J.)

Answer—It is another name for undulant fever. Mediterranean fever, Texas fever, Gibraltar fever, Neapolitan fever, brucellosis. It affects any and every part of the body. The same

or similar infection in animal (goats, cattle, hogs) is called contagious abortion. Men caring for animals, butchering, handling hides etc., are most likely to be infected. There is no specific cure. In most cases the patient is more or less incapacitated for a year or two, with recurring intervals of improvement and fever. Because of its variable manifestation undulant fever is sometimes mistaken for typhoid fever, malaria, influenza or tuberculosis, and where a joint or joints

are affected it may be mistaken for rheumatic fever. Treatment with a "vaccine" or bacteria consisting of equal parts of Brucella abortus and Brucella suis strains of the germ has given good results in most cases. Copyright John F. Dille Co.
