Suds Stretch Lead; Twinks Miss Again

At best the Los Angeles Angels have only an outside chance of winning the Pacific Coast League pennant but they're having lots of fun playing "spoiler" for their arch-rivals, the Hollywood Stars.

A Wrigley field crowd of 15,485—biggest of the PCL season—turned out last night to see the Angels turn back the Stars, 8-1, for the second night in a row and again block Hollywood's chances of moving into first place.

Front-running Seattle managed to split with Portland and thus take a half game lead over the Stars. The Rainiers won the opener 8-0 and dropped the second game, 4-2.

Meanwhile, the San Diego Padres roared back into contention with a 5-0, 6-2 sweep over Sacramento leaving the Pads just 3½ games back in fourth place and Los Angeles is 5½ games behind with 14 games to play.

Cellar Race
At the other end of the ladder, San Francisco climbed out of the cellar past Oakland with an 8-5 win over the Oaks.

The Angels' Don Elston tossed a four-hitter for his 16th win while his mates, led by Steve Bilko, landed on Ben Wade and two successors for 11 hits. Bilko, the league-leading home run hitter, slammed his 36th round-tripper in the second inning to get the Angels off to a 1-0 start.

Seattle went to a slugging spree in the seven-inning opener in Portland as Elmer Singleton posted his eighth shutout and 17th win. Jerry Zuvella, Joe Ginsberg, Bill Glynn and Art Schulte hit home runs to account for all of the Rainier runs.

But in the nightcap Royce Lint muffled Seattle bats with a five-hitter for his ninth win. Luis Marquez singled in two Portland runs in the third and the Beavers were never headed. Wally Westlake homered in the seventh for Portland.

The split gave Seattle undisputed possession of first place. Portland fell from a tie for third to fourth, 4½ games out.

Bill Brenner (1-2) and Ewell Blackwell, who came in for Seattle in the eighth, gave up 11 hits to Portland. Lint's victory evened his mark at 9-9.

Seattle led off the scoring in the first inning. Gene Verble singled, went to second on an infield out and scored on Art Schulte's single to right.

Seattle's final score came in the ninth on Balcerena's double

and Joe Ginsberg's single.

Salmon Striking On Lower Rogue
Portland—(U.P.)—The weekly fishing report as issued by the Oregon State Game Commission:

SOUTHWEST: Winchester bay salmon angling good. Tenuile lake angling generally slow except for perch. Salmon angling at Coos Bay continues good. Striped bass angling is only fair.

The best area is still mud flats between McCullough and Railroad bridges. An occasional silver salmon now being taken in Coquille river in Prosper and Randolph area.

Trout and steelhead fishing throughout the upper Umpqua area is slow. A few steelhead are being taken in the Steamboat area on the North Umpqua, and some cutthroat are being caught in the vicinity of the forks and Umpqua on the main river.

Salmon fishing good lower Rogue river. Steelhead fishing fair. Brookings offshore fishing fair in tidewaters of Elk and Sixes rivers.

T. Jackson Subdues Ez Second Time

Cleveland—(U.P.)—Heavyweight contender Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson, fresh from his second victory over ex-champion Ezzard Charles, said today, "I want a title fight at Miami in February."

Thirty-four-year-old Charles who gave Tommy much stiffer competition in the arena Wednesday night than he did in their first fight at Syracuse, N.Y., on Aug. 3, declared, "I won't retire. I'll keep on fighting. I thought I won."

Ezzard was on the verge of a knockout in the 10th round when his pitter-patter, dancing opponent suddenly turned slugger and thrice sent the ex-champ lurching nearly to the canvas.

Jackson's youthful stamina gave him an impressive victory at the finish.

Largest Purse
The "Hurricane" from Far Rockaway, N.Y., not only added lustre to his status as third-ranking contender; but he received a guaranteed \$10,000, the largest purse of his career.

Ezzard, whose right eye was nearly closed in the ninth round, landed the more damaging punches during most of the bout. He hurt his lanky opponent with smashes to body and head in the first, second, sixth, seventh and eighth sessions. Despite his improvement over their first fight, he was far from his old-time form.

As the former champion tired in the late going, Jackson did plenty of leading in the ninth round, when he played a tattoo on Ezzard's face with long left jabs. And in the 10th, Tommy turned slugger and battered his staggering opponent from corner to corner and from rope to rope. It seemed that the referee might step in before the final bell.

Phil Getchell Scores Record-Shattering 66; Clayton Lewis Has 67

Rogue Valley Country club's 28th annual Southern Oregon Golf Tournament was formally underway today in the wake of record-busting qualifying scores by Phil Getchell and Clayton Lewis and record-equalling effort by Harry Millette.

Getchell, Stanford university student and runner-up in the Southern Oregon last year, established a new competitive course record in Wednesday qualifying play for Rogue Valley entries with a torrid six-under-par 66. Only a half-hour before Getchell came in Lewis, Medford accountant, had tabulated a 67, to beat by one stroke the 68 mark established by Californian Tal Smith in 1954 Oregon Golf association tourney play.

Millette, a Yrekan and Rogue Valley member, equalled Smith's mark with a 68 yesterday.

RV Club Pro Al Williams set the non-competitive record recently with a 64.

Power Cutback Seen By Stream Flow Drop

Portland—(U.P.)—A drop in stream flows brought on by the dry weather might force a cutback of interruptible power deliveries to 13 electroprocess plants in the Pacific Northwest by the end of September, the Bonneville Power administration reported today.

The BPA said, however, there appears to be little possibility that domestic supplies of power will be curtailed.

Representative of electroprocess plants, including aluminum reduction plants, were told that there is a strong possibility that stream flows will reach "critical year" stages by Oct. 1. If this occurs, the plants would not get the estimated 446,000 kilowatts of interruptible hydroelectric power they are expected to need.

Should this source of power be cut off, the plants would have to turn to steam generation to supply their needs.
