Baljo On Leave; To Go Overseas

M/Sgt. Wallace L. Baljo, Medford area Marine corps recruit, has left Medford on a 20-day leave prior to being detached from duty as a recruiter on Sept. 26, it was announced today.

Sergeant Baljo, who has been here for the past three years, has been responsible, directly or indirectly, for the procurement of some 223 men and women from the Rogue valley and northern California for the Marines.

After being relieved from his present duties, Sergeant Baljo will report to the Marine Corps Air station, El Toro, Calif., for assignment to the October replacement battalion for duty overseas.

Mrs. Baljo and their two children will remain at their present address at 2760 Connell ave. while Sergeant Baljo is overseas.

T/Sgt. Paul H. Dupras will become the new noncommissioned officer in charge of the recruiting office on Sept. 26.

Defto Plans Garbage Disposing Campaigns

Detroit—(U.P.)—Detroit plans to be a garbage-free city. A group of civic-minded leaders of industry have formed a Detroit Committee for a Garbage Free City under the sponsorship of Mayor Albert E. Cobo.

The campaign eventually will become part of the Detroit of Tomorrow plan, with coordinating legislation requiring every dwelling within the city limits to have a garbage disposal unit on the premises.

Detroit is the first city of its size to undertake such a project.

Four New Classrooms Into Use At Eagle Point

Eagle Point—Four new classrooms and a library in the new Eagle Point high school wing will be used for the first time when school opens Sept. 9. The wing was constructed last year, but furnishings were not completed in time for use last year. Summer work on present buildings included resanding and finishing the gymnasium floor.

Nebraska Has Estimated 13,000 State Employees

Lincoln, Neb.—(U.P.)—Nebraska has an estimated 13,000 state employees, in addition to 19,000 on the federal and 39,000 on local public payrolls.

The figures came from Dr. Everett E. Peterson, extension economist at the University of Nebraska. Nebraska has 139 federal and 378 state and local government employees for each 10,000 population, as compared with the national figures of 133 and 301, respectively, Peterson said.

Nautical Cop Has Many Headaches

Albany, N.Y.—(U.P.)—William Sickles is a nautical cop—for 40,000 motorboats.

Sickles, who used to be a tugboat captain on the Hudson river is New York State's boat inspector, charged with the job of policing the thousands of motorboats that zoom around the state's inland lakes each summer.

After more than 36 years on the job, he still feels he'd be safer tugboating on the river than trying to cross a busy Adirondack lake on a summer Sunday.

"Most folks navigating the Hudson know what they're doing," he says.

When he started his job, a motorboat was really zipping along at 10 or 12 miles an hour. Now, they go 40—and there are 10 times more of them. However, Sickles' office gets only about a dozen accident reports a year.

These are reported on forms—similar to ones for auto accidents—including spaces to show whether "master was intoxicated," "master was asleep," or "master appeared confused."

Another space is headed: "In your opinion could accident have been avoided?"

"Yes, if I had been looking ahead and he hadn't been in the area," one boat man replied.

And that, Sickles believes, might well be the cause of most collisions—nautical or highway.

As for speeding boats, Sickles says it's too hard to tell how fast a boat is going, so he gets convictions on reckless driving charges—about four a year.

Sickles also has troubles over lights and whistles. There's a law that says all couples in canoes at night on New York waters should carry lanterns. Sickles tried to enforce this once on Lake George. Only thing was, the canoeists wouldn't believe there was such a law, or that there was a boat inspector.

The minister was even more startled when he received a bill for \$400.
