

## Frank Lane Meted Fine For Protest

New York — (U.P.)—General Manager Frank Lane of the Chicago White Sox said today he'll come through with the \$500 fine and apology ordered by Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick for using "vile and profane language" in protesting an umpire's decision.

But the Sox' fiery front office boss insisted that "I think this whole thing is making a mountain out of a molehill."

The penalties were assessed by Frick Thursday as a result of an incident that occurred in last Tuesday night's White Sox-Boston Red Sox game at Comiskey Park, Chicago. Lane admits he got angry when Umpire Larry Napp ejected Chicago catcher Sherman Lollar from the game for heckling.

Lane charged into a box occupied by Cal Hubbard, the league's umpire-in-chief, and expressed his feelings in strong language. Will Harridge, president of the American League, was seated with Hubbard, but Lane insisted his remarks were not addressed to Harridge.

Frick said the affair was reported to him by "a third party," not by Harridge. The commissioner conferred with Lane here Thursday and then issued this announcement:

"For conduct unbecoming to an official of baseball, including vile and profane language, you are fined \$500. It is understood that you are to make proper apologies to Mr. Harridge, to the American League, and to the Chicago fans."

Lane said he would get off a telegram apologizing to Harridge "immediately," but said he didn't know how to apologize to the fans.

"Why should I apologize to them?" Lane asked. For trying like hell to win the American League pennant?"

Brooklyn — (U.P.)—Jackie Robinson insisted today the Brooklyn Dodgers "should have little trouble" beating any of the current American League contenders in the World Series.

"None of those American League clubs look very strong, judging from what I see in the papers," Robinson said. "If Brooklyn doesn't win the World Series this time, then they certainly will have missed a great chance."

Robinson, who returned to the Dodgers' lineup recently and sparked the club to several key victories which dispelled any notion that Brooklyn was about to launch another famed fold-up, feels the White Sox are the strongest of any of the clubs in the other league.

"And they don't exactly impress me as world-beaters," added the veteran Dodger infielder.

## SAYS ROCK CAN'T BOX

North Adams, Mass. — (U.P.)—Archie Moore, who previously has claimed that heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano has "lost his punch," now says Rocky "can't box either."
