### New York Woman Promotes Major Golf Tournament

By ELIZABETH TOOMEY United Press Correspondent New York —(U.P.)— Now that women are into everything it's getting harder every day to proclaim a new "first" for woman-kind.

But this week marks a "first" in female history which is regarded in certain all-male circles with as much respect as women breaking through sound barriers or breaking into Big Business.

Mrs. Inez Holland is the woman behind the \$50,000 Cavalcade of Golf tournament being played this week in nearby Scotch Plains, N.J. Women simply don't put on golf tournaments, it seems, or didn't until Mrs. Holland suggested the idea to her champion golfer son, Tim, last winter.

Not only has this lively 48-year-old woman moved into a male-dominated field, but her prizes top most man made tournaments and her intentions are to move into other areas and run tournaments all over the nation.

"After this," Mrs. Holland said, "I wouldn't be afraid of anything."

Uttered Brave Words As she uttered these brave words a man walked into her office on lower Fifth Avenue carrying a yellow metal stake with blue rope looped through a top hole. Some of Mrs. Holland's braveness seemed to leave her.

"Would you believe it?" she sighed. "We bought 20 miles of rope and 2,000 stakes to rope off the course for spectators. We had to design them and have them made ourselves. The same way with the caddy shirts and the arm bands. And it takes about 1,000 people on the course to run this, not to mention the state police and the Pinkerton men."

Mrs. Holland lives in Rockville Center, Long Island, but for the past 16 years she has run her own toy manufacturing business from a Manhattan office, where she was interviewed in advance of the tournament. Toys were scattered in her desk along with golf posters, and she interrupted her tournament talks only to exclaim with pleasure over a white teddy bear with a removable music box. "The first of its kind," she crowed.

Tim Jr., 25, is the official host at the tournament and president

of the cavalcade of golf organization, which hopes to promote golf as a spectator sport. Some 250 golfers competed in qualifying rounds today, and Wednesday a pro-celebrity tournament will be held.

"We're going into this, well, I don't know whether you'd call it feet first or head first, but anyway we're going in \$50,000 worth, plus," Mrs. Holland said.

"We've already been invited to do half a dozen tournaments in 1956. I had no idea there was so much work involved in one of these. But now that we've done one, the next one should be easier."

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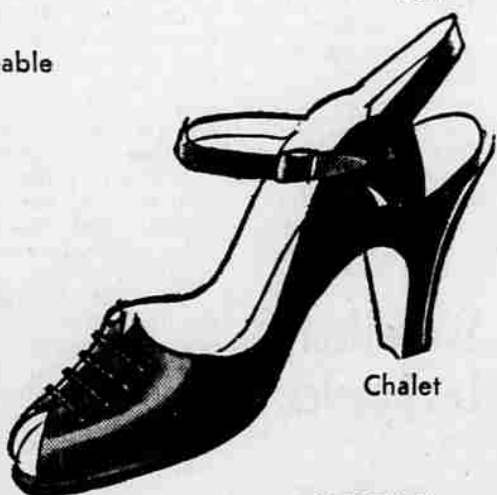
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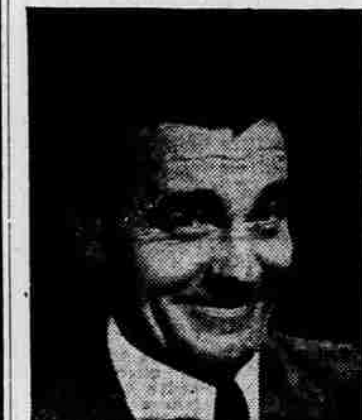
