

Hearing on Zone Change Plan Continued Following Protests

A hearing on a change of zone from two family dwelling to heavy industrial in the area north of Clark st. between Nar-regan st. to McAndrews rd. was deferred by the Medford city council last night.

The hearing was continued after a petition with 97 signatures was submitted opposing the change, and several people appeared objecting that residential property values would be lowered should the area be changed to heavy industrial.

Last April, the planning commission recommended the change after a public hearing in which no objection was voiced. Representatives opposing the change said they were not notified that the change was proposed. The hearing was continued to further studies of the proposal could be made.

Legion Request Granted
The council also granted the American Legion's request to use parking meter brackets to display the flag on holidays. Legion officials said they had several requests from merchants asking to have flags displayed.

staffs inserted in curb holes. City Attorney Frank Farrell was authorized to draw up necessary ordinances for annexation of Congregational Church property and property owned by California Pacific Utilities company at 303 South Groveland ave. Both annexations were recommended by the planning commission recently.

Withdraw Request
The council accepted a letter from the First Church of Christ, Scientist, withdrawing a request for annexation of property along Medford's west city limits. Officials of the church said that since sewer facilities will not be available immediately, the church will install a septic tank and resubmit its request for annexation at a later date.

The planning commission had recommended the property be annexed.

Requests for stop signs at the corners of 13th and Peach sts. and Summit ave. and Haven st. were denied on recommendation of City Manager Robert Duff who pointed out that police department records fail to justify installation of signs.

Records Cited
Duff said police records show on three accidents at the intersection of Summit ave. and Haven st. in 1954, and in seven and a half months of 1955 there has been only one. There were no accidents at the corner of 13th and Peach sts. in 1954, Duff said and only one thus far in 1955, according to police records.

The council granted a change to 24 hours the time effective on loading zone areas at the Medical Center building and the Fluhrer building. Previously the loading zone areas were effective only between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., but physicians in the Medical Center building requested an extension of time.

All night parking hours were changed from prohibited parking between 1 a.m. to 6 a.m. to between 3 a.m. and 6 a.m. in areas of apartment houses, hotels and eating establishments which are open all night. The change was made because city street sweepers do not start sweeping until 3 a.m.

Lease Approved
An ordinance was adopted signing a lease with Rogue River Paving company for use of a 160-by-180 foot piece of city property for \$250 annually. The company plans to install a paving plant near the old city sewage plant.

The council also adopted an ordinance calling a public hearing on a request from Herbert Morris for a change in set back on property on the east end of Reddy ave. The hearing will be held next meeting.

Action on a request from E. W. Brown for widening the north side of East Main st. to Genesee st. was deferred until after the state highway commission determines the route of a proposed freeway through Medford.

Court Issues Order In Turncoat Case
San Francisco — (U.P.) — The Army has been ordered to show cause by Sept. 15 why turncoat soldiers William Cowart and Lewis Griggs should not be freed from the Sixth Army stockade until they come to trial.

The order was handed down yesterday by Federal Judge Louis E. Goodman. It coincides with a previous order in the case of the third turncoat, Otto G. Bell of Hillsboro, Miss.

The three soldiers, now awaiting a general court martial in the stockade, were prisoners of war in Korea who at first chose to join the Communists and then later asked to be returned to the United States.

Attorneys for the turncoats have asked the Federal Court to overrule the Army's charges on the grounds the soldiers committed the offenses during a prior enlistment and, therefore, no longer come under the Army's jurisdiction. They also argue the men have been sufficiently punished by being dishonorably discharged in absentia.

Whereabouts of Runaway Balloon Stumps Scientists

Minneapolis, Minn. — (U.P.) — Scientists were stumped today on which way a giant runaway balloon went with its cargo of mice and guinea pigs.

They figured it should be somewhere in the stratosphere in the general region of the upper Midwest. But Coloradans insisted they had seen a balloon like it bobbing above Durango.

Officials of Winzen Research, Inc., which launched the 25-story high balloon at International Falls, Minn., seven days ago, insisted this couldn't be.

The balloon has been staying relatively close to home—Duluth, they think. It made a side trip into Canada and was last seen near Duluth, Minn., floating east.

But the Minnesota scientists admitted they couldn't be sure of the balloon's precise location because clouds have moved in to hide it.

In Colorado, meanwhile, Air Force officials planned to check today to find out whether the Durango balloon belongs to them.

Scores of residents in southwest Colorado have reported they saw a huge, heart-shaped balloon in the sky. One of them, Mason Richards, said he followed the balloon with his telescope and noted that it had an attached gondola and the diameter of a 25-story building.

Eastman Kodak Grants \$100,000 to Researchers
Rochester, N. Y. — (U.P.) — The Eastman Kodak Company recently granted more than \$100,000 for 34 advanced college students to continue their studies in physics, chemistry and chemical engineering for the academic year 1955-56.

Under the program a single student receives \$1,400 and a married student with dependents, \$2,100. In addition the university at which the scholar is studying receives \$1,000 for his research expenses.

The awards are made directly to 34 universities in the United States and Canada and the schools are permitted to select the worthy students.

City Schools Set Program Of Inservice Training for Teachers September 13-16

A four-day inservice training program for teachers in the Medford public school system has been set for Sept. 13 through 16, it was announced today.

The program is scheduled to open Tuesday, Sept. 13, at 10 a.m. in the senior high school auditorium with a general meeting. Speakers during the morning will include Dr. Lenel Shuck, Wesleyan university, who is a consultant for American Education Publications.

Honor New Teachers
At noon, new teachers and members of the school board will be honored at a luncheon in the senior high school cafeteria. Lee Ragsdale, president of the sponsoring Medford Classroom Teachers association, will preside.

Principals' meetings with the school staffs will be held in their own buildings at 2 p.m., and a session for workshop instructors is slated for 2:30 p.m. in the senior high school woodshop.

Dr. Donald Nylen, director of the department of guidance services for the Seattle public schools, will be the featured speaker at a 6:30 p.m. dinner meeting for administrative personnel.

Dr. Nylen also will be the speaker Wednesday morning. He is scheduled to discuss the place of guidance services in public education programs, at a 10 a.m. meeting, and guidance programs for secondary schools, at an 11 a.m. meeting for junior and senior high school teachers. The meeting will be held in the auditorium.

Dr. Shuck will discuss elementary news reading in an 11 a.m. meeting for elementary teachers in the girls' gymnasium.

A no-host luncheon will be served in the cafeteria from noon until 1:15 p.m.

At 1:30 p.m. Dr. Shuck and Dr. Nylen will be the speakers for two meetings, and at 2:30 p.m., John Pleisch, president of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, will discuss "What Our Community Expects From Our Public Schools," in a general meeting in the auditorium.

Dinner Meeting
A dinner meeting for high school counselors and deans from the junior and senior high schools will be held at 6:30 p.m. in the cafeteria. Dr. Nylen will be the speaker.

Elementary staffs will meet Thursday morning at Jefferson school, and the junior and senior high school staffs will meet at the senior high school. In the afternoon, junior and senior high school staffs will meet in their respective schools for departmental sessions.

Friday, all elementary and junior high school teachers will remain in their respective schools to prepare for school opening on Monday, Sept. 19. Senior high school personnel will continue departmental and principal's orientation meetings.

Movie Comedian Beaten by Fiancee
Hollywood — (U.P.) — Comedian Roscoe Ates, 59, called for help last night when his 21-year-old red-haired fiancee went on the warpath with one of her high heel shoes, sheriff's deputies reported.

Ates suffered a scalp wound which required three stitches to close.

Deputies were called by the comedian to his North Hollywood home when the young woman, Sandy Reeves, reportedly ended up swinging following an argument with Ates.

The comedian, taken in a squad car to a hospital, told officers an argument took place in his apartment over the differences in their ages and a failure to see "eye to eye" on arrangements for their wedding Oct. 2.

Ates told police he was hit in the face, bit on the leg and later whacked over the head with the shoe before a friend separated the two.

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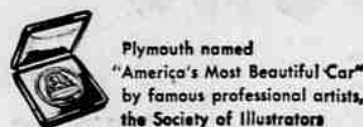
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
