Mystery man Klaus Frederick Glaubitz who was released by the Russians after seven years imprisonment because they thought he was an American citizen:

Discharge of Top Internal Revenue Official Scanned

New York —(U.P.)— The New York Herald Tribune said today that "a major political scandal will explode momentarily in Washington" over the firing of a top career official of the Internal Revenue Service. He charges he was dismissed for refusing to conduct a whitewash investigation of a political appointee.

In a copyrighted story from Washington, the newspaper said Edgar E. Hoppe, a Dallas, Tex., attorney who entered the Internal Revenue Service during the Hoover administration, was fired on Oct. 7, 1953, from his post as chief of the department's inspection service.

Involved in the case, the Herald Tribune said, are Internal Revenue Commissioner T. Coleman Andrews and Deputy Commissioner O. O. Gordon Delk, who allegedly sought the "whitewash" report and fired Hoppe for refusing it; Treasury Secretary George M. Humphrey, Assistant Secretary H. Chapman Rose and General Counsel Elbert Tuttle who refused to intervene in the case, and the Civil Service Commission which refused Hoppe a hearing.

The newspaper said Hoppe last month filed a suit in the Court of Claims for \$26,823 in back pay, which must be answered by the government by Oct. 19.

The Herald Tribune said the files of the case had been made available to it by Hoppe's attorney, former Department of Justice attorney John P. Witsil. It said Andrews had been told details of the story, "listened attentively, laughed, and said he appreciated the opportunity but could be quoted as saying 'no comment.'"

The newspaper did not identify the "key official" still on the payroll about whom Hoppe allegedly found derogatory information that he was asked to suppress.

Quoting from Hoppe's report to the Civil Service Commission, it said his division began an "integrity investigation of an official being brought into a high post by Mr. Andrews and Mr. Delk" in February, 1953. Hoppe's report showed, it was reported, that the man had set up a phony dependency to avoid or delay military service, that he had been rejected by a draft board as a psychoneurotic and was involved in difficulties involving possible litigation at a large university.

Hoppe's report said Delk was critical on several occasions of the scope of the investigation and "criticized me again for making the reports available to Civil Service."

Hoppe was quoted as saying that after the report was completed, on May 29, Delk bluntly asked him if he would consider a transfer to become director in the Southwest, a Civil Service downgrading of two steps.

A month later, the newspaper said, Hoppe was called before Andrews who, he said, "told me he not only wanted me out of my present post, he wanted me out of the service."

Wind Gust Causes Globemaster Crash

Albuquerque, N.M. —(U.P.)— An Air Force C124 Globemaster, one of the largest military transports, was dashed to earth in flames by a gust of wind while taking off here yesterday killing one and injuring four of the 69 persons aboard.

The four-engine aircraft, attached to the Strategic Air Command and based at Biggs Air Force Base, El Paso, Tex., was hit by the blast of wind and cartwheeled into the runway at Kirtland Air Force Base here just as it became airborne, witnesses said.

Within seconds it was enveloped in flames, but passengers and crew members aided by rescue crews on the outside battered out windows and knocked holes in the fuselage to escape.

The man killed was identified as Airman 2C Arvin W. Harris of the 19th Bomb Squadron, March Air Force Base, Calif.

Of the four injured, one man, Airman 1C Fred W. Stephens, 22, New Philadelphia, O., a passenger, was in serious condition. The other three injured were identified as 1st Lt. Robert Jones, Biggs AFB; Airman 1C Allen O. Strayer and Airman 2C Vernon Taylor, both of March AFB.
