

WYNN RECORDS 200th VICTORY WITH HELP BY DOBY; DODGERS CINCH AT LEAST TIE FOR FLAG

The cocky Cleveland Indians have come up with a pair of professional "bouncers" to take care of any club that may have a notion to knock them out of first place.

The two pros who are doing all the heavy work for the Indians are Larry Doby and Early Wynn.

Doby took care of all the hitting Wednesday night, driving in four runs against Baltimore with a pair of homers, while Wynn took care of the pitching with a nifty five-hitter in a 6-0 victory over the Orioles.

When Doby and Wynn were through mopping up, the Indians still were a half-game ahead of the second-place Yankees, who defeated the Athletics, 2-1, and 1½ games ahead of the third-place White Sox, who eked out a 4-3 decision over the Senators.

Post 200th Triumph

Wynn, in registering his 16th victory of the year and his sixth shutout posted the 200th triumph of his career. The only other active major leaguer with over 200 victories is teammate Bob Feller, who has won 266.

Southpaw Whitey Ford of the Yankees hurled his second straight one-hitter to beat Kansas City. Only Jim Finigan's looping double to right field with two out in the seventh inning deprived Ford of a no-hitter.

Dixie Howell, the workhorse of the White Sox pitching staff, had to be summoned from the bullpen in the ninth inning to save Jack Harshman's victory over Washington.

The Red Sox hopped on rookie Jim Bunning for five runs in the first two innings and went on to defeat the Tigers, 7-4. Frank Sullivan was credited with his 17th victory although he needed relief from Ellis Kinder after Frank House homered with one on in the ninth.

Pennant Tie Cinched

The Dodgers cinched at least a tie for the National league flag by licking the Braves, 3-1. Another Brooklyn victory over Milwaukee today will enable the Dodgers to clinch the pennant on the earliest date in league history. They set the current record when they won the 1953 flag on Sept. 12 of that year.

Righthander Bob Friend of the Pirates turned in the second one-hitter of the day in beating the Cubs, 2-0. Frank Baumholtz' infield single in the fourth inning deprived Friend of the first perfect game since 1922 as the Pirate hurler struck out eight and walked none.

Southpaw Johnny Antonelli, who was suspended during the week end for "insubordination" and then reinstated, pitched the Giants to an 8-2 victory over the Cardinals.

A fine relief job by Johnny Klippstein helped Cincinnati to a 6-3 victory over Philadelphia.

Crawford Homers

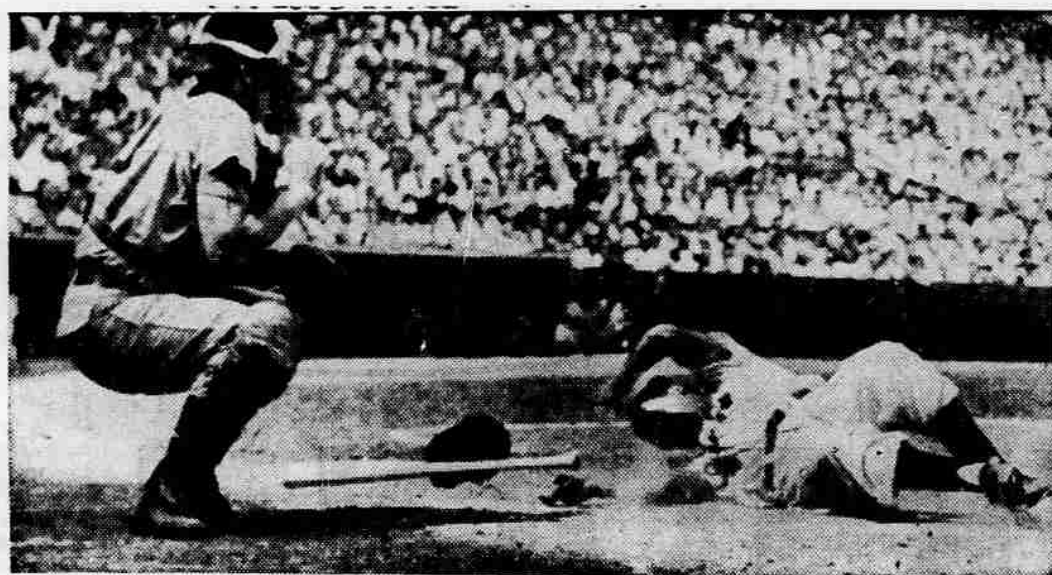

Briggs was credited with his 15th win although he needed help from Milo Candini in the 10th inning when the Stars scored one run.

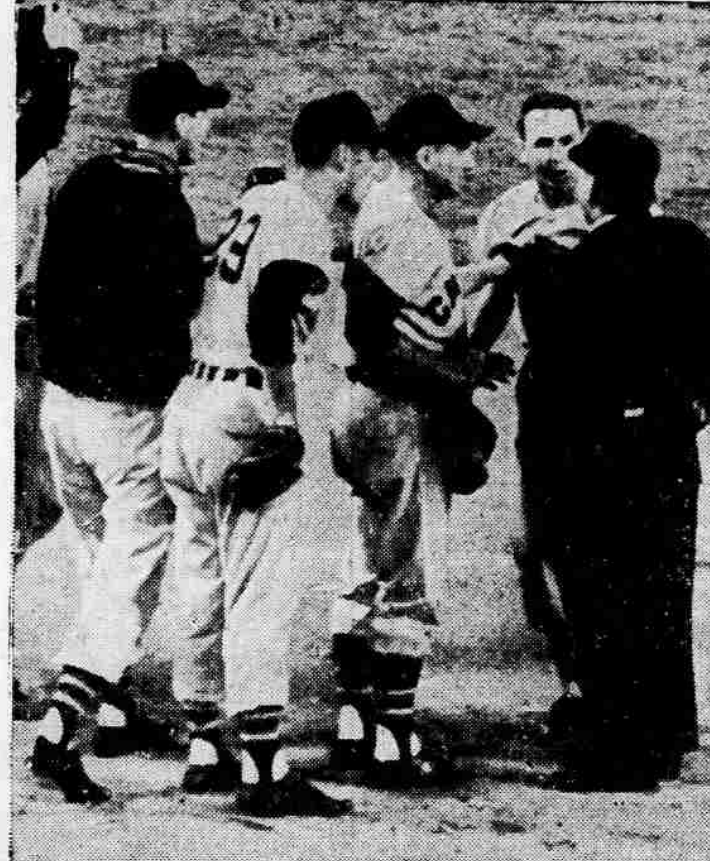

Basilio Gets Majority Nod Over Turner

Syracuse, N. Y. — (U.P.) — Wel-terweight champion Carmen Basilio declared today, "I want a shot at the middleweight title if the match can be made."

He said Wednesday night's strong finish against middleweight contender Gil Turner convinced him he has a "good chance" to win the 160-pound crown.

In his second non-title bout since winning the 147-pound championship in June, Carmen wound up Wednesday night with a majority decision over Turner of Philadelphia. It was a thrilling 10-round before 4,676 at War Memorial Auditorium. Carmen weighed 150½ pounds; Turner, 151.

They turned in a thriller-diller fight. Each was knocked back onto his heels several times during the terrific exchanges. And Turner was half-groggy in the 10th. There were no knock-downs. Carmen, unbeaten now in 14 bouts, registered his 47th victory in 65 fights. But he finished with a three-stitch gash over his right brow and a slight cut under each eye. Turner's left brow was nicked. Gil, 24, suffered his ninth loss in 58 bouts.

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Bearcats Expect College Gridders Holt, Koani Back

Salem, Oregon—A squad of approximately 55 candidates turned out Tuesday as Coach Ted Ogdahl opened 1955 football drills at McCulloch stadium.

The initial turnout included 24 aspirants with some previous experience with the Bearcats, including 17 lettermen.

Prospects at the quarterback post in Ogdahl's "T" style attack took an upturn when it was indicated that Benny Holt, who saw considerable duty at the post in 1951 and 1952, will return to the campus. The position had been a particular source of anxiety for Ogdahl after word that Harvey Neffendorf, first stringer for two seasons, would not return to school.

Another note of cheer was word that Chuck Koani, big fullback during the 1950 and 51 seasons, probably will be back in harness. Joe Bonawitz, veteran wingman, also plans to resume his WU grid career. He played in 1950 and 1951 also.

Howard Morris Joins Linfield

McMinnville — Working out under a hot September sun, a Linfield college football squad of 60 men under the direction of coach Paul Durham is preparing this week for the season's opener against Southern Oregon College at Ashland on September 17.

Durham issued his first squad call Labor day, and the practice schedule is running two practices a week for the first week and part of the second as the Wildcats prepare for the Red Raider game. Assisting Durham with coaching chores will be head assistant Roy Helsler, line coaches Al Wills, Bob Halstead and Chuck Bafaro, and backfield coach Marv Flitcroft.

Included among the men turning out are 13 returning lettermen. They are ends Jerry Beier and Luther Strong; tackles Hal Edgar, Russ Morris, and Dick Holliday; guards Howard Morris and Vic Fox; centers Les Hershey and Jesse Thurman, quarterback Ron Parrish, halfbacks Vern Marshall and Bob Flood, and fullback Bob Nelson.

Both Marshall, a southpaw, and reserve end Dick Brown are being worked at the quarterback post this fall, giving the 'Cats a three-deep list there with Parrish, a starter as a freshman last season. Brown will be a sophomore this fall, Marshall a junior.

Two of the returning letterwinners have just served armed services time. They are center Hershey and tackle Edgar.

Comets To Oppose Glendale Footballers Friday Night

Central Point — Starting assignments were still uncertain in a number of spots today as the Crater high Comets groomed for a conflict with Glendale gridders on Friday night.

The Glendale contest at 8 p.m. on Friday will be one of two week end scuffles for Comet players. Second stringers will take on the Jacksonville varsity at 7 p.m. on Saturday.

Coach Leonard Warren indicated a need for timing as he prepped his varsity for the Pirates. "We're not ready by far," he said. He reported that drills "have hit at a little bit of everything" in the limited time to gird for the opener.

Like most clubs of the area, the Crater crew has been hit by the siege of fires. A number of squad members have been on the fire fighting line.

A lineman will direct the Comet offensive. Coach Warren said that the plays will be called by Center Nathan Douthitt.

Uncertainty about the starting eleven is caused by depth in a few spots and thinness in others.

At ends the choices are among Gordon Tidwell, John Shama, Carl Koellner and Jerry Kime. All but Kime, a sophomore, are lettermen. Tackle assignments may be divided among Neil Green, Dave Parker and Dick Davis, lettermen, and Bill Morse, a junior who is pushing for a post.

Lefler at Guard

At guards Harold Lefler, a veteran, is a likely starter while Don Chitwood from the jayvees may have the other post. Green may see some guard duty. Dick Hamilton, a letterman, may not see service since he's missed several recent drills, reportedly being among fire fighters. Don Hubbard, another letterman guard, has been able to make it to only one workout.

Back of Douthitt at center are Ed Logan, a sophomore, and Ray Birge, transfer from Dunsmuir, Calif. Douthitt started the season at center last year but was shifted to a tackle and Green took over the pivot post.

Idaho Won't Be Pushover

Moscow, Idaho — (U.P.) — "We won't be any pushover. We'll be tough and we'll fight all the way," University of Idaho Coach J. Neil Skip Stahley said last night in discussing the Vandals' football opener against Washington Sept. 17.

Stahley said the Vandals "are better off" now than last year at this time.

"I don't have so many to teach my system to," Stahley explained, "and we should be stronger. But you can't discount the loss of nine starters from last year's squad."

Idaho had a 5-4 record last year, winning its final four games after a dismal start.

Stahley also announced a tentative starting lineup for the season. It included Pete Gerp-heide and Ed Hilder at ends, March Jones and Dick Foster at tackles, Eivand Resa and Chuck Fries at guards and Jim Faulkner at center. In the backfield will be fullback Wilbur Gary, Bill Baxter and Ray Bitterner at halfbacks and either Gary Johnson or Howard Willis at quarterback.

Johnson, who changed his name from Cozain since last year when he completed eight out of 25 passes for a .320 average, seems to have the edge now. But Stahley said Willis, a jaycee transfer, could be expected to see a good deal of action.

Salmon Fishing Reported Good On Lower Rogue

Portland — (U.P.) — The weekly fishing report as prepared by the Oregon State Game Commission: **SOUTHWEST:** Salmon angling at Winchester bay should be good when the storms subside. Sea-run cutthroat angling in lower Umpqua river continues good.

Salmon fishing lower Rogue river is good. A few silvers are beginning to enter the river. Steelhead fishing is slow.

Trout angling is fair throughout most of the upper Umpqua area. All streams are quite low and clear except for localized turbidity at construction projects. The North Umpqua drainage above and including Jackson creek are closed to all angling.

Summer steelhead angling is fair in the Steamboat area and slow elsewhere. Salmon angling is slow in the upper main Umpqua.

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
