Vice President Richard M. Nixon, urging bi-partisan effort to pass President Eisenhower's highway program at the next session of Congress:

"Republicans and Democrats must set partisanship aside and avoid arguments as to how the money is to be raised to meet the critical needs."

Telegram sent by 30 farmers meeting at the Kasson, Minn., farm where President Eisenhower outlined his farm policies during 1952 campaign:

"We hereby ask you to carry out your promise of 1952 and restore 90 per cent of parity as contained in your speech re-read here."

Mrs. Roma R. Judd of Chicago, informed that her soldier son had been killed by a Korean guard in Seoul:

"This is plain murder. If he had been killed in war, all right. But to be shot when there is no war, that's murder."

Miles David Storfer of Brooklyn, N.Y., who sent President Eisenhower his savings bank with \$4.30 for Red Cross flood relief:

"I'm only sorry about one thing, that I didn't have more in the bank to help the unfortunates of the hurricane."

Henry Ford II, president of the Ford Motor Co., explaining to the National Safety Forum his company's program to include several new safety devices in Ford's 1956 models:

"I would be less than honest, of course, if I denied that we hope this safety package will help us sell 1956 automobiles. Nevertheless, I feel fully justified in saying that this is a public service program."

Michael Quill, president of the CIO Transport Workers Union, in rejecting an 11-cent raise for union members offered by the New York Transit Authority:

"This is for the birds and not for the New York City transit system. The offer is totally unacceptable."

Rep. Leslie Arends (R-Ill.), House Minority Whip, pleading for unity in the Republican Party:

"Sometimes I wonder how dumb we can get. We simply cannot beat the Democratic Party with two Republican Parties."

Sir Winston Churchill on the possible changes in history and in the geography of Europe if American plans during the later stages of World War II had been different:

"If our American friends had listened to the appeals which I and others made, and had endeavored to sustain the left wing of the great army they moved into Germany, it is possible that we should have taken Berlin—and should at any rate have gained a great footing in the whole of the conquered territory."

California Congressman Held for Nearly an Hour By Russian With Pistol

Van Nuys, Calif.—(U.P.)—Rep. Joe Holt (R-Calif.) was detained near Moscow for nearly an hour by a Russian soldier who held a cocked pistol against his head, it was disclosed yesterday.

The congressman's family here said Holt, who has returned to New York following a visit to Russia with other congressmen, reported the incident to them in a telephone call from the East Tuesday.

Bohlen Protests
Holt told his family that U.S. Ambassador Charles E. Bohlen had officially protested to the Kremlin over the incident, which occurred last Wednesday in the outskirts of Moscow but was kept secret until now.

The California congressman said he and a member of the American embassy stopped their car in a Moscow suburb and asked if they could photograph a picturesque church and school. Holt said he had scarcely made the request, when a Red Army soldier rushed him and pressed a pistol against his head despite the fact that Holt's companion, speaking Russian, identified him as a visiting American congressman.

Holt's companion talked to the soldier to no avail as a crowd of Soviet citizens pressed around the car.

Policeman Waved Off
When a Russian policeman intervened and urged the release of the Americans, the Soviet soldier pointed the gun at him and waved him off.

Only when a Red Army Colonel appeared, an hour later, were

Holt and his companion released. Holt said no apology was offered.

Burglars Escape With \$150 After Guns Fail

St. Louis—(U.P.)—Gilbert Noh challenged two armed bandits who robbed his pharmacy here.

"Those guns aren't real," he said.

Cerebral Palsy Said Connected With Virus

Los Angeles, Calif.—(U.P.)—A study at the University of California here has indicated cerebral palsy and other congenital abnormalities may be connected with virus infections that occur very early in pregnancy.

Other research has shown that although there is no cure known for cerebral palsy, adequate training can make one-third of its victims entirely self-supporting, while nearly another fifth can become partially self-supporting.

The connection between cerebral palsy and virus infections was demonstrated in the pediatrics department of UCLA's medical school.

Doctors injected influenza and distemper viruses into fertile hen eggs. Within a day, the chick embryos showed a wide variety of maladies including bent backs, extensive brain and eye damage and lesions of the extra-embryonic membranes.

Dr. Margaret H. Jones, associate professor of pediatrics, said there is much that can be done to train the victim of cerebral palsy and that trained workers can help overcome some of its major disabilities.

Long Green of Quiz Shows Just Small Change To Bert Parks, Veteran Emcee

New York—(U.P.)—The long green given out on such new shows as "The \$64,000 Question" may seem pretty staggering, but it's just small change to an old quiz hand like Bert Parks.

Parks has shelled out more than \$4,500,000 as a quizmaster, more loot than anyone has doled out in the history of the TV-radio business.

As emcee for 10 years on "Break The Bank," the genial Parks has distributed some \$3,195,000 to contestants. And in a comparable seat on "Stop The Music," which Parks again will emcee this fall when it moves to ABC-TV, he emptied the coffers over eight years for gifts worth some \$1,750,000.

Parks, a veteran of almost 24 years in radio and TV, can remember the shows that kicked off the whole frantic quiz business, but admits he never figured it would mushroom to its present proportions.

High Wing Collar

"The fellow who started it all, I think, was 'Professor Quiz,' said Parks. "That was way back in the early '30s. He wore a high wing collar and glasses and gave out a top prize of \$20."

"There were a whole bunch of them after that—'Dr. I.Q.' and 'Double Or Nothing' and 'Take It Or Leave It.' But 'Break The Bank' was the first of the really big money shows."

Parks landed on "Break The

Bank" as the result of the recommendation of Bud Collyer, who now emcees "Beat The Clock." Parks came out of the Army in late 1945 when "Break

Officials Seek Talks On Korea Taxation

Seoul, Korea—(U.P.)—American Embassy officials today sought a new round of talks with the Korean government in an effort to settle tax problems of foreign businessmen here.

The American Chamber of Commerce in Korea charged that 62 foreign businessmen, most of them Americans, still were being held as "tax hostages" by Korean authorities who refused them exit visas.

Chamber sources said the Koreans promised Monday to ease their ban on granting exit permits to businessmen who have not paid their taxes. But again today Korean officials refused to issue exit papers to the foreigners.

Parks, perhaps the most experienced hand at making a guest feel at home, has worked with contestants ranging from four to 80-odd years of age.

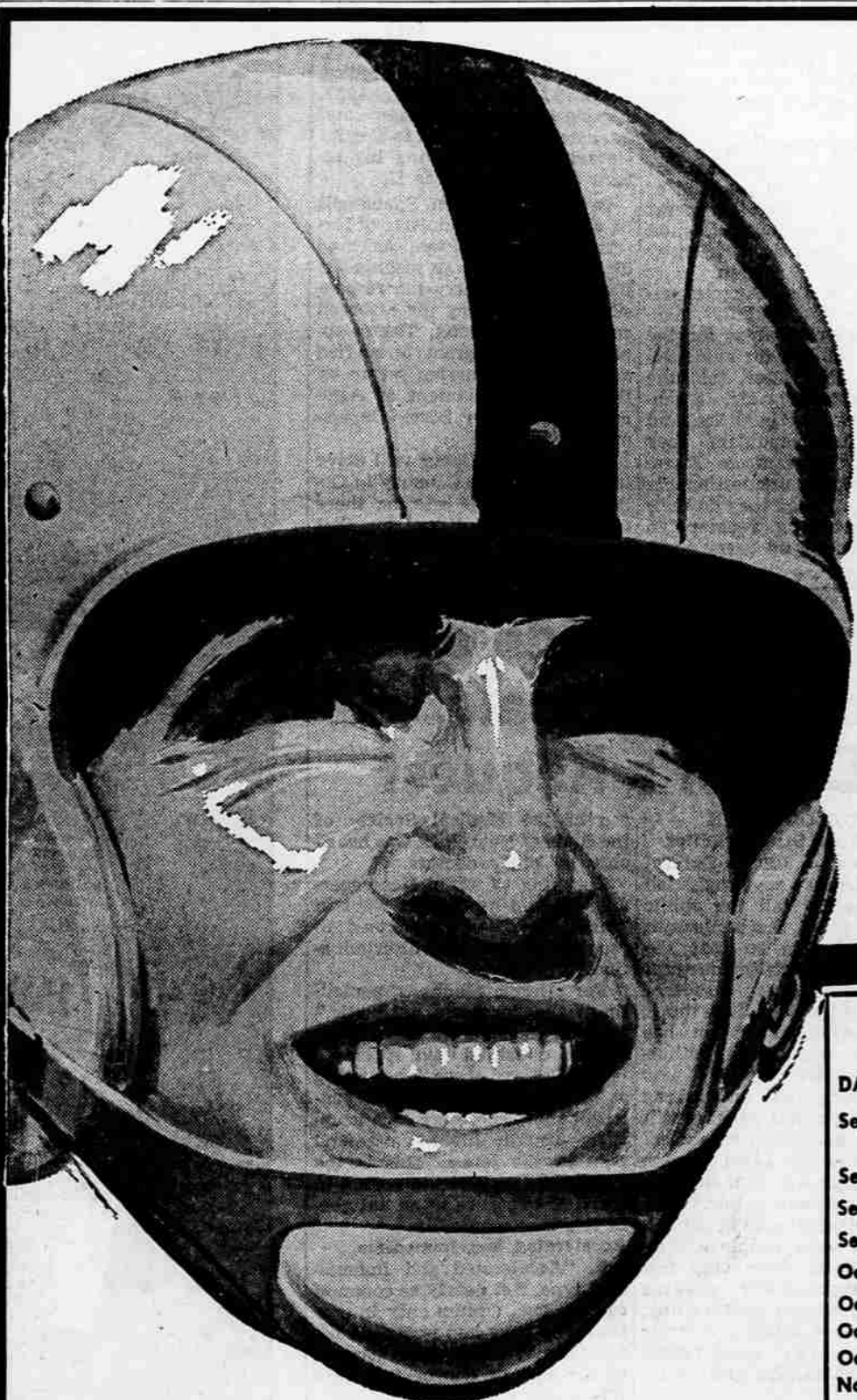
"I get some of my biggest kicks out of working with kids. You see, I've discovered a secret—all you have to do is squat down to their level. Adults scare kids because they tower over them."

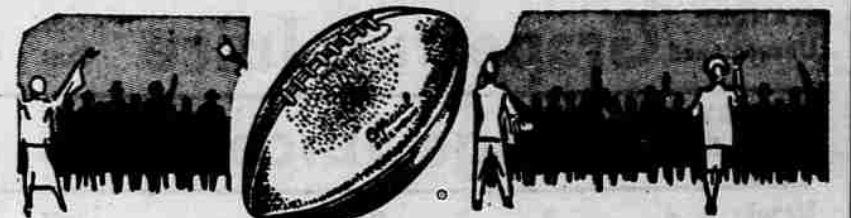
