NFIP Rushes More Than \$1,000,000 To Hard-Hit Counties

New York—The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis has rushed more than \$1,000,000 in funds donated by county chapters to other local polio units hard pressed by August's rising incidence, Basil O'Connor, president of the March of Dimes organization, announced today.

Money for this rescue operation came from 528 chapters in 45 states and Puerto Rico. These

more fortunate units provided \$1,081,538.55 in surplus funds from their treasuries to insure necessary care for polio patients everywhere. Chapter checks ranging in size from \$22 to \$22,000 were air mailed to headquarters in answer to O'Connor's appeal for funds early in August.

Many Chapters Short

"The burden of polio cases from previous years in the face of current rising incidence, particularly in the New England and North Central regions, has left hundreds of chapters distressingly short of funds," O'Connor said. "To help relieve the pressure of long-standing bills for polio services and equipment and to continue nursing services, \$1,048,300 in advances have been made in August to 166 chapters in 41 states."

O'Connor explained that this was a stop-gap measure, for most chapters would need additional funds to meet financial obligations for polio patients who continue to need help. An estimated 1,200 National Foundation chapters with exhausted treasuries are expected to call upon headquarters for \$8,000,000 for patient care needs this year.

O'Connor said, "Chapters operating in the black have willingly answered the distress calls of those in the red to insure necessary polio care. A chapter may be way ahead financially immediately after the March of Dimes and in six months need additional funds."

He cited this summer's experience in Massachusetts where more than 2,100 polio cases have been reported in the worst polio outbreak in the state's history. The Suffolk County (Boston) Chapter had \$130,000 early this year. Conservative estimates at this time indicate that the chapter will need \$350,000 more to pay patient care bills now being incurred.

Polio Uncontrolled

"Even with the Salk vaccine, polio is still an uncontrolled disease," O'Connor said. "Fortunately our chapters are geared to expect unpredictable outbreaks and expenses. Operating through the national organization, they move quickly to get polio-fighting funds to desperate areas."

Chapters answering O'Connor's call for surplus funds, and chapters receiving money from the foundation include:

Oregon—Contributing counties: Curry, Douglas, Gilliam, Jackson, Sherman, Wallowa and Wasco. Counties receiving funds were Tillamook, Umatilla, Washington and Yamhill.

Public Vote Seen On Pinball Ordinance

Portland — (U.P.) — A public vote on the attempt to repeal Portland's newest anti-pinball ordinance was assured today when tabulators in the city auditor's office verified enough names on petitions to put the issue on the May ballot.

The petitions carried 31,439 names, slightly more than 71 per cent of them valid so far in the tabulating.

Petition sponsors were known as "The Committee to Tax Pinballs." City Attorney Alexander G. Brown termed the name a misnomer because the petitions bore no reference to a tax on the devices but sought only to repeal the law making them illegal.

Too Many Girls; Sailors Quit Ship

Portsmouth, England—(U.P.)—Twenty-six British Sea Scouts "mutinied" and walked off their training ship because of too many girls and not enough work, it was disclosed today.

The boys went aboard the old naval full-rigger "Foundryoyant" last Saturday for a week of seamanship training.

A group of girl Sea Rangers was sleeping on the same deck, behind a canvas screen, and running about the top deck in their pajamas, the scouts complained. The boys walked off the Foundryoyant Tuesday and rowed to nearby Portsmouth where they are staying in a Salvation Army hotel.

Wild Dog's Body Dug Up To Stop Boy's Grievings

Battle Creek, Mich.—(U.P.)—The Army exhumed the body of a dog at Fort Custer to ease the grieving of a 16-year-old boy.

The animal was one of six "wild dogs" killed on the military reservation in a drive to free the post of stray animals that were preying on deer and other game.

Donald Greene, a high school student, was grief-stricken because he believed one of the dogs destroyed by the Army was his pet which strayed from his home near the fort.

When officers failed to convince him they hadn't destroyed his pet, they dug up the animal's body to prove it.

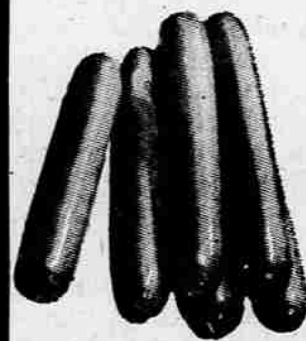
