**Women's Conscience Curbs Gadget-Buying**

New York—(U.P.)—American women would own more household labor-savers, except for their conscience. They're afraid of over-pampering themselves.

So says Albert Shepard, an official of the Institute for Motivational Research, which studies the nation's buying moods.

Shepard says 80 per cent of the nation's homes could use more major appliances—stoves, washing machines, dryers, and such.

But he told a recent conference of gas appliance manufacturers women often fail to buy. They ask themselves, "does this make me a lazy housewife?" or "is it self-indulgent?" And frequently the answer is "yes."

**BREAD WINNER**

Now two loaves of bread can be kept fresh as easily as one, without crushing them together. A double-duty transparent plastic breadbox has been designed with two separate compartments and a molded lid that lifts completely off for easy access. And the whole unit can be dunked right into hot soapsuds for thorough washing. Remember do this often, because a breadbox must be clean and sanitary if you want bread to stay fresh.

**QUICK MEAL**

New York—(U.P.)—Welsh rabbit, a longtime favorite for a quick meal, now can be prepared even more rapidly. It's available in jars. For a quick meal, dress it up with 1/3 cup of ripe olive chunks and serve on toasted English muffins. Garnish with tomato slices and whole ripe olives.
