

Episcopal Church Delegates Will Consider Budget

Honolulu — (U.P.) — Delegates to the 58th Episcopal General Convention were to consider budget recommendations today which will largely determine the amount of expansion of the church's educational and missionary programs in the next three years.

The program and budget committee was scheduled to present recommendations to the joint meeting of the Houses of Bishops and Deputies and the Women's auxiliary.

Church leaders said they were hoping for a record \$8,000,000 budget, some \$2,000,000 more than the church operated on in the past three years.

Most of the additional money would be used for the missionary program, domestic and overseas, and for Christian education and promotion activities. Greater Radio, TV Use

Leaders indicated they hoped to expand promotion to include greater use of radio and television.

Informed sources believed the committee would recommend the \$8,000,000 figure.

Site of the 1958 convention was also expected to be brought up before the joint meeting. New York City and Miami, Fla., have already presented formal bids and the Right Reverend Joseph Minnis, Bishop of Colorado, was understood ready to tender an invitation from Denver. Interfaith Policy Urged

Venice — (U.P.) — Here I am at the Venice Film Festival as a "reporter" instead of as a "movie star."

After the San Sebastian and Venice festivals last year I swore I would never go to another. Disorganization coupled with intrigue and politics is too shattering to the nerves.

Stupidly, I brought no nerve medicine with me to Venice this time and I find that time has changed nothing. If anything, it's worse, or maybe I'm more sensitive as a reporter.

In good old American language, a profitable little "racket" has developed. Admission to the movies and the parties following them is naturally by invitation, but for very important pictures
