

Middlecoff Triumphant In Cavalcade

Scotch Plains, N. J.—(U.P.)—You could call it "the \$10,000 chip shot," because that's what a dazzling 50-footer on the final hole was worth to Cary Middlecoff in the Cavalcade of Golf tournament.

The divot-digging dentist from Memphis, Tenn., would have finished in a tie with Slammin' Sammy Sneed of White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., if he had taken a par five on the 72nd and last hole at the Shickamaxon Country Club course.

But Cary's chip shot rolled into the cup for an eagle three and a final total of 276 strokes, four under par for the 72 holes and two strokes better than Sneed at 278. Sneed earned \$5,000 for second place, but it was a disappointing finish for Sammy, who had started the day in a three-way tie for the lead.

Sneed, Freddie Haas of Claremont, Calif., and Gene Littler of Palm Springs, Calif., were tied for the lead at the start of the final round. Sneed shot a one-under-par 69 for his 278 total. Littler went one over with a 71 and wound up in a tie for third-place at 280 with Gardner Dickinson of Panama City, Fla., who closed fast with a 68, and Jerry Barber of Los Angeles, who shot 70.

Haas went two over par with a 72 and dropped all the way into a tie for sixth place at 281 with long-hitting George Bayer of Cincinnati, Ohio.

Wild Pitch Lifts Indian Pennant Chances; Tribe, Yankees Divide

The wildest American league pennant race of 'em all may have been decided by the most costly wild pitch in 51 years.

Thrown by Ed (Whitey) Ford, the errant pitch enabled the Cleveland Indians to split Sunday's momentous doubleheader with the New York Yankees and put them in a position where they probably can win a second straight flag with only six victories in their remaining 11 games.

Hoot Evers scored from third base with two out in the eighth inning as the pitch skittered past catcher Yogi Berra and that was the run that gave the Indians a 3-2 triumph after bowing, 6-1, in the opener. As a result, they maintained their 1½-game lead over the Yankees, a 3½-game edge over the Chicago White Sox and a six-game bulge over the Boston Red Sox.

Yanks Need Eight Victories
Thanks to Sunday's split, the Indians can finish the campaign with a 94-60 record by winning six of their last 11 games. To tie the Tribe, the Yankees would have to win eight of their last 12, the White Sox would have to take 10 of their last 13 and the Red Sox would have to sweep all 13 of their games.

Ford carried a 2-1 lead into the eighth frame but with one out served up a home run ball to Bobby Avila that tied the score. Evers followed with a double and Al Rosen was purposely walked. Ford induced Larry Doby to hit into a force play at second base but his 1-0 pitch to Ralph Kiner was the wild one and Evers dashed over the plate.

A crowd of 65,310 saw southpaw Tommy Byrne spit a four-hitter and the Yankees route 16-game winner Early Wynn in the opener.

Frank Sullivan became the league's first 18-game winner when he pitched the Red Sox to a 6-2 victory but the White Sox bounced back in the second game with a 7-2 triumph.

Hoefi Gets Shutout
Southpaw Billy Hoefi pitched his seventh shutout and 16th victory to give the Detroit Tigers an 8-0 victory but Ted Abernathy's four-hitter earned the Washington Senators a 1-0 win. Kansas City and Baltimore also split, the A's winning, 4-3, and the Orioles coming back for a 4-2 decision.

Johnny Klippstein missed the National league's second no-hitter of the season on Pee Wee Reese's ninth-inning single as the Cincinnati Redlegs downed the champion Brooklyn Dodgers, 9-0 and 5-3.

The Milwaukee Braves downed the Philadelphia Phillies, 5-4 and 9-1, Eddie Mathews hitting a grand slam, ninth-inning homer in the opener and Humberto Robinson pitching a six-hitter in the nightcap.

In single games, Ernie Banks and Willie Mays each hit his 43rd homer as the Chicago Cubs beat the New York Giants, 7-5, and the St. Louis Cardinals defeated the Pittsburgh Pirates, 6-5, with Larry Jackson picking up his sixth win in relief.

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Colts, Lions, Eagles Win Grid Frays

The Philadelphia Eagles were riding high and the Cleveland Browns were skidding towards a new low today as National Football League teams entered the final week of their pre-season head-knocking.

The Eagles remained unbeaten in five exhibition skirmishes Sunday by edging the Pittsburgh Steelers, 24-20. The world champion Browns, meanwhile, suffered a 19-3 beating at the hands of the Detroit Lions Saturday night.

It was the third straight setback for Paul Brown's tennishorns. They have won only one exhibition game over Baltimore thus far this season, while dropping decisions to the College All-Stars, San Francisco, Los Angeles and Detroit.

Graham Sees Action
Otto Graham, recently talked out of retiring by the desperate Browns, made his first appearance of the season against Detroit in the second period but was unable to fire up the sputtering Cleveland attack.

The Lions gained a 10-3 lead in the first half on a 50-yard scoring pass from Bobby Layne to Lorne Dibble and an 11-yard field goal by Doak Walker. Hunchy Hoernschmeyer bulled over for another Detroit score in the final quarter and Jim Martin booted a 34-yard field goal.

The Eagles trailed the Steelers, 13-7, midway in their game at Pittsburgh but went ahead early in the third period on a three-yard end run by Ted Weger. Their decisive score was produced by Ralph Goldston, who scooted 55 yards with a recovered fumble late in the same period.

Colts Down Cards
In other Saturday night games, Baltimore posted an impressive 24-14 victory over the Chicago Cardinals; Bob Watkins' second period touchdown gave the Chicago Bears a 7-0 triumph over the New York Giants, and the Washington Redskins edged the Green Bay Packers, 33-31.

The Browns close out their exhibition schedule Thursday night at Chicago against the Bears. In Saturday night games, the Eagles will play Los Angeles at Denver, Colo., while the Cardinals meet Green Bay at Milwaukee.

The Lions entertain the Giants at Detroit and the Colts tackle the Steelers at Buffalo, N.Y., next Sunday.

Referees Slate
A meeting of football and basketball referees of this area is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Tuesday at the Southern Oregon college gymnasium in Ashland.

Virgil Swanson of the officials group said that all basketball referees should be on hand since a commissioner will be elected for the 1955-56 season.

New York—(U.P.)—The Cleveland Indians will donate their share of the proceeds of next Sunday's home game against Detroit to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis "to show our gratitude" for Vic Wertz's recovery from polio.

Wertz, Tribe first baseman, is making steady progress in his recuperation from a polio attack. The Indians' donation will include everything except the advance sale to date, plus federal and local taxes, the visiting club's share, and the rent.

Medford High Football Team Downs Clevelanders 12-6 in Season Opener

Medford high's combination T and single wing offensive sputtered rather than purred in its first full trial of 1955 but it produced touchdowns near the start and near the finish Saturday night and got more than sufficient help from defense and breaks to carry the Black Tornado to a 12 to 6 verdict over Cleveland of Portland at the local stadium.

The Tornado touchdown on a 48-yard surge in the first quarter and an 83-yard ramble in the fourth with spectacular plays helping both times. Cleveland got its TD in the second stanza bursting over the goal in two plays after a fumble recovery on the Medford 21-yard line. The Indians reached the Tornado end zone on two other occasions but penalties erased the efforts.

Fullback Dave Bosworth scored both Medford TD's on short thrusts and Fullback Dave Graham zoomed 16 yards for the Cleveland score. Both clubs muffed their conversion opportunities.

First Game-itis
First game-itis, a not unusual malady of inexperienced prep aggregations, afflicted both clubs, Jitters, fumble-itis, inconsistent offensive precision, penalties, and early injury to a couple of mainline backs hampered the Black Tornado in its season starter. But there were flashes of good football, some of it spectacular, which gave both coaches and fans confidence that with a little more tuning the Medford eleven can be ready to roll.

The Tornado piled up a sizable edge in first downs and yardage. First downs were nine to four for Medford. Net yards from scrimmage for the home team totaled 263. Medford defense held the Indians to 154 yards.

Medford's 83-yard campaign from its own 17-yard line to the Indian goal line took 16 plays and got its biggest boosts on a 43-yard passing gain and a 15-

yard pass interference penalty. The Tornado moved to its 29 in three tries but a fumble on the fourth play of the drive lost to the 20. On a third down situation Back Lloyd Cleary heaved to Quarterback Dick McLaughlin on a screen pass. Behind some good interference with particularly good blocks by Halfback John Hawley and Guard Monte Holst, McLaughlin made it all the way to the Tribe 37.

At that point it appeared that the Medford drive might fizzle. The Tornado was set back five yards for offside and three running attempts netted just eight yards putting the ball on the 34. Halfback John Bellack passed on fourth down. The ball fell incomplete but interference with Medford receiver Dick Copple was charged to Cleveland. The penalty gave Medford the ball on the Indian 19.

It took seven more plays with the largest gain a five yarder by Cleary, to grind out the rest of the distance. Bosworth went the last 1½ yards. The Tornado tried to run the extra point with Bosworth being stopped short of the goal.

A 44-yard gallop by Mike Hawkins set up Medford's first touchdown. The Tornado took possession of the ball for the second time in the first period after Lee Knight's 16-yard punt went out of bounds on the Cleveland 48-yard line. Hawkins went through the middle three yards to the 45. Then the Medford halfback broke through the right side of the line and went

all the way to the one where Joe Gatto nailed him.

Play Called Back
Halfback John Bellack cracked over the goal on the next play but an offside infraction nullified the play and set the Tornado back to the six-yard line. Bosworth gained back to the two and Quarterback Dick McLaughlin sneaked to the six-inch line. Then Bosworth plunged through the middle for the score.

A muffed kick by Copple from getting off a kick for an extra point but Cleveland was offside and the Tornado got another chance. A bad center snap prevented a second kick.

Cleveland got its chance to even up the contest midway in the second panel. Knight punted from his 45. Medford receiver, Halfback John Hawley fumbled and Tackle Dick Alper, Cleveland, recovered on the Tornado 21-yard line. Halfback Bob Coblenz went through the middle of the line to the 16. Graham struggled through his right guard, shook loose and went across the goal standing up.

The ball was fumbled to prevent a Knight conversion kick and the score stood 6-11.

Clock Halts Drive
In addition to the scoring series, offensive drives took the Black Tornado to the Cleveland 28-yard line in the first quarter, to the nine in the second and to the 19 in the third.

Time ran out to halt a big Medford threat which produced one of main thrills of the contest near the end of the second period. Medford got the ball on downs on its own 30. Bellack on the first down tossed to Hawley who almost got away for a touchdown. As it was Hawley went all the way to the Cleveland 17 for a 53-yard gain, longest of the night.

Tribe Back Jerry Halvorsen, who brought Hawley down, almost didn't get the opportunity. End Dick Copple nearly blocked him out of the play but the Clevelanders' momentum sailed him square into the back of the Tornado ball carrier's legs.

Two running tries by Bellack had the ball on the nine when the halftime signal blared.

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Quarterback Mike Vidos passed to End Grant Gaskin from

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
