Experienced Yreka Eleven To Tussle Crater Comets

Central Point—Injuries to key players dampened the outlook for the Crater high Comets this week as they girded for one of the most formidable rivals they'll meet this season.

Yreka, Calif., Miners come to Central Point this Friday evening with 18 lettermen back from the contingent which waxed the Comets 44 to 14 in the California town in 1954.

For their effort to even the score for the licking the Crater club is hit hardest at tackles where both Dick Davis and Neil Green are nursing hurts. Davis pulled an elbow ligament in practice Tuesday and may miss the Yreka mix entirely. Green is still troubled by a rib cartilage separation. He saw little duty against Glendale last week and his service this time, if any, may be limited.

Harrison Hurt
Ron Harrison, a halfback, who has been going good, broke a toe against Glendale and also has a pulled thigh muscle. Jack Lilly, also a halfback, is bothered by a bum knee.

Coach Leonard Warren said that Dave Parker and Bill Morse likely will start at tackles and Harold Lefler and Roger Seaman at guards. Green may be used, if possible, at either position. Nathan Doughty will be at center. Ends will be picked from among Carl Keellner, Gordon Tidwell, John Shama and Jerry Kime.

Mel Harsh is slated for quarterback with Freshman Wayne Allen ticketed for service there also. George Juveland may be at left half, Jack Lilly or Lee Gos-

sett at right half and Don Goyette at fullback. Juveland is capable of filling in at all positions in the backfield and has been running hardest among the backs so far this year.

Miners Fight Fire
The fact that the need for fire fighters severely cut into Yreka practices gives the Crater team a considerable advantage in preparing for the game. Even Miner Coach Jack Beggs was reported on the fire line as Yreka was threatened last week. But experience may make up for lack of workouts. This year the Miners can field an offensive club with seven vets and a defensive team with 11 lettermen.

A Siskiyou Daily News story says that, although the Miners will miss a number of stars and others who helped, "they still will have plenty of depth."

Among the backfield men are Jerry Churchill, 170-pound quarterback with three years experience, and Bill Kleaver, 190 left half. Kleaver was second high scorer in northern California last year and made the San Francisco Chronicle all-star team. Charles Caster, 205, and Chuck Dilley, 206, are returnees in the line.

Golden Trout Soon May Be Reality in Oregon
Portland — Angling for the beautiful golden trout, once just a dream to Oregon anglers, may soon become a reality according to recent surveys made by the Oregon Game Commission.

The colorful golden, a subspecies of rainbow, have now become well established and boast good populations in several Wallowa mountains areas. Investigations of Swamp and Baby Long lakes by Will Brown, regional supervisor, and Homer Campbell, northeast fisheries agent, showed that the goldens planted by the commission by aerial lift as young fry in 1953 had grown five to seven inches in length and were in good physical condition.

Unmistakable coloration is typical of the golden trout. The ordinary rainbow spotting is found on the upper part of the body, but the red stripe along the lateral line is more brilliant and wider than on the rainbow. Bright red-orange colors the belly. The lower fins are a bright red-orange with white edges. The flesh is also red-orange, similar to that of the blueback or kokanee found in Wallowa lake.

Virgil Swanson Commissioner of Basketball Refs

Virgil Swanson, Medford, has been named commissioner of high school basketball referees in this area for the forthcoming season. He succeeds Jean Eberhart, Ashland.

Swanson, a veteran referee, will be a "working" commissioner, officiating in ball games as well as assigning referees for other contests. The plan has operated successfully for years in eastern Oregon.

Red Chinese Study Old Disease Cures
Tokyo — (U.P.) — Communist China is conducting medical research in reverse, Radio Peiping said today.

The broadcast reported on scientific study into ancient, not modern, ways to cure diseases. Red China's Ministry of Public Health has set up a study group of doctors, some trained in 20th century techniques and others in the ancient lore of the Orient.

They announced this week, Peiping Radio said that 200-year-old prescription for curing sleeping sickness worked in 90 per cent of 54 cases tested.
