St. Mary's Opens Gridiron Season Here on Saturday Against Illinois Valley

St. Mary's high of Medford unveils its 1955 model football at the Medford senior high stadium Saturday night with Illinois Valley forming the opposition. Game time is 8 p. m.

The engagement will give the Crusaders of Medford their only tune-up game before they begin Jackson County B League play. St. Mary's is defending county and district champion.

Small turnovers handicapped the Crusaders for their early drills but the number on hand has increased in recent evenings and has been about 20. However the Medford parochial nine is used to being short-handed. They won their togas last year with only 12 or 13 boys playing most of the time.

The Crusaders will begin their season with a good number of veterans in the line-up. And at last report they will be near intact physically. Center John Walsh will miss the fray because of shoulder dislocation.

St. Mary's will continue to use the double wing which was introduced last year. But Coach Willard Webb, new this year, has also brought back the split "T." However, Webb has indicated that his club will play under wraps as much as possible Saturday and save its surprises for conference teams.

Jim Darland and Dick Paup may open at ends tomorrow and Paup will also see service in the backfield. One end, Gerald Darland, has been shifted to center to make up for Walsh's loss and likely will start there. Tackles will be picked from among Alson Geren, Ramon Elberts and Jerry Flakus. Either Green or Elberts could begin at a guard and, if so, the other guards will be chosen from among Francis Murphy, Ed Fogel and Jack Relling.

National Am Links Field Down To 4

Richmond, Va.—(U.P.)—Determined Harvie Ward, the favorite, faced Bill Booe and Billy Hyndman opposed Hillman Robbins Jr. today in the semi-finals of the U.S. Amateur Golf Championship.

They were the only survivors of the field of 200 which teed off in this six-day grueling grind of match play on Monday.

Only one of them, Ward, was among those who was given a good chance to win the title when play started and the betting today was that the former British Amateur champion would come through.

Ward gained the semi-finals with an easy 6 and 4 victory over 19-year-old Jimmy McCoy of Lake Worth, Fla., in the quarter-finals after having disposed of Bob McCall, a Youngstown, Ohio, sporting goods salesman in the fifth round earlier in the day, 3 and 2.

Booe defeated Charley Kunkle, a 40-year-old water works company official from Johnston, Pa., 1 up in Thursday's afternoon quarter-finals after Kunkle had eliminated British Amateur king Joe Conrad of San Antonio, Texas, 3 and 2. In the morning round Booe defeated Bill Waryan of Minneapolis, 5 and 4.

Robbins Took Miles
In addition to taking care of Hopkins, Robbins defeated John Miles of Mamaroneck, N.Y., in Thursday's matches, 2 and 1.

Hyndman first kayoed Jimmy McHale, another Philadelphia insurance broker in the morning, 2 and 1, and then in the afternoon knocked out 19-year-old Joe Campbell, Purdue University student from Anderson, Ind., 2 up.
