### Church School Staff Attends Recent Retreat

During a recent retreat held at Katydid ranch, workers in First Presbyterian church school heard their pastor, Dr. D. Kirkland West, give a bird's eye view of children around the world worshipping studying the Bible and living in Christian faith.

"They need our help," said Dr. West. "A Christian Bible school in Korea for refugee children can be maintained for the small sum of \$5 a month, and there are more than 70,000 orphans in such Bible schools."

First hand word from the nation's outstanding leaders in Christian education came to the assembled teachers and officers as Mrs. James Hoey brought a report from the International Sunday School convention which she attended in Cleveland in July.

"As high standards in Christian education were held up to us," Mrs. Hoey said, "sometimes I thought Medford Presbyterians were doing pretty well. But at other points, I saw we had a long way to go."

## Special Bus Service Slated for Students Starting on Monday

Special bus service and altered regular routes for transporting students to and from Medford and Central Point schools have been announced by Evergreen Bus company officials. The schedules will become effective Monday, Sept. 19.

Fares for students will be the same as last year, officials said, or 10 tickets for \$1.

Regular buses going east will leave the city center at 7:30 and 8:25 a.m. and will go east on Main st. to Black Oak dr., north on Black Oak dr. to Hillcrest ave., and east on Hillcrest to Country Club dr. Buses will leave the Country Club at 7:45 a.m. and on the return trip will go west on Hillcrest ave. to Barneburg rd., north on Barneburg rd. to Jackson st., west on Jackson st. to Academy st. and south on Academy st. to East Main st.

**To Make Loop** The route will make a loop route, making it necessary for passengers on East Main st. from Lindley st. to Modoc ave. to board the bus eastbound instead of westbound.

A special east side bus will leave East Main st. and Crater Lake ave. at 7:55 a.m. go north on Crater Lake ave. to Spring st. It will leave Crater Lake ave. and Spring st. at 8 a.m., go east on Spring st. to Pierce rd., leaving there at 8:03 a.m. It will proceed south on Pierce rd. to Hillcrest ave., leaving that intersection at 8:05 a.m., then go east on Hillcrest ave. to Barneburg rd., north on Barneburg rd. to East Jackson st., west on East Jackson st. to Holly st., south on Holly st. to St. Mary's school and Medford Senior High school.

West side regular schedule buses will be Thomas rd. and Stewart ave. at 8:10 a.m. will turn off Peach st. at Dakota ave. go east on Dakota ave. to Oakdale ave., north on Oakdale to McLoughlin Junior High school.

Special buses on the Orchard Home dr. route will leave Oak Grove rd. and West Main st. at 7:40 a.m. traveling east on Main st. to Ross lane, north on Ross lane to Maple Park dr., leaving there at 7:42 a.m., and proceeding southeast on Maple Park drive to Jackson. It will then go east on Jackson to McLoughlin Junior High school, arriving there at 7:45 a.m., and going south on Oakdale ave. to Medford Senior High school.

Howard Buses Regular schedule buses going north and to Howard school leave from Central Point at 7:40 a.m. Students taking the southbound buses will transfer at Main and Holly sts. for St. Mary's school and the senior high school.
