He also will discuss the work of the general convention in Honolulu. St. Mark's evening guild, of which Mrs. Matthews is a member, will serve refreshments following the bishop's address. This meeting is open to all who wish to attend, and it is anticipated the bishop will be willing to discuss any and all phases of Puerto Rican life with interested listeners. No admission will be charged or offerings made, officers announced.

Clackamas Construction Projects Announced

Portland — (U.P.) — Plans for construction projects on the Clackamas river totaling 16,000,000 have been announced by Portland General Electric co.

The projects, designed to add 75,000 kilowatts of power to the company's output, include a 50,000-kilowatt dam on the North Clackamas, improvements in diversion works at Casadero dam, two miles downstream, and major additions to the Faraday power plant, two miles below the Casadero project.

Sunday school association are Clynton Crisman, chairman; Sherman Moore, vice-chairman; and Homer Thompson, secretary.

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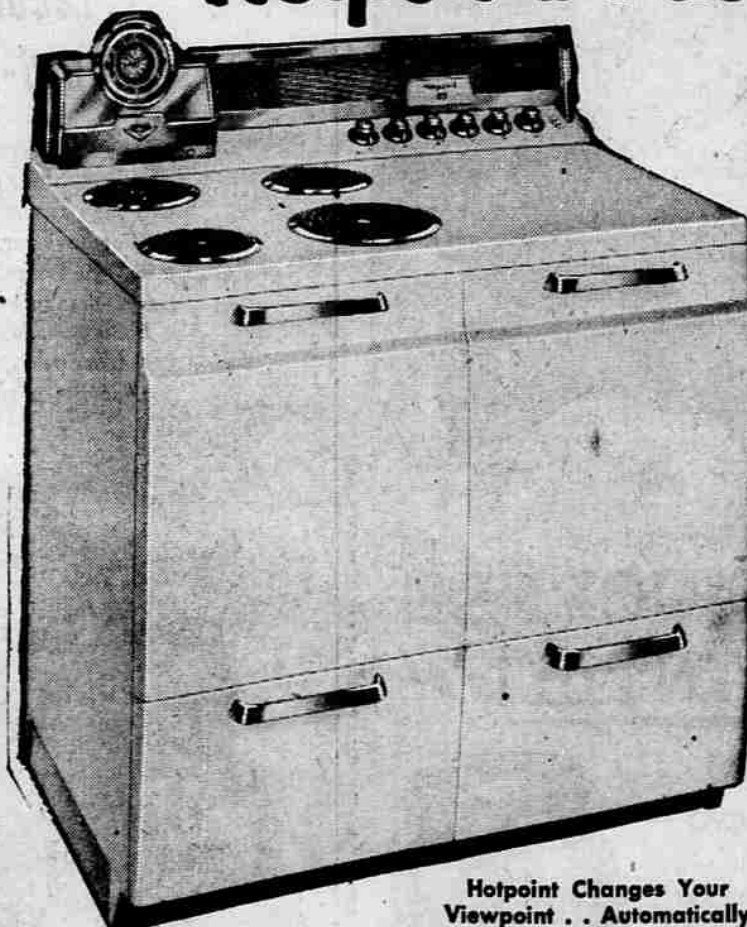
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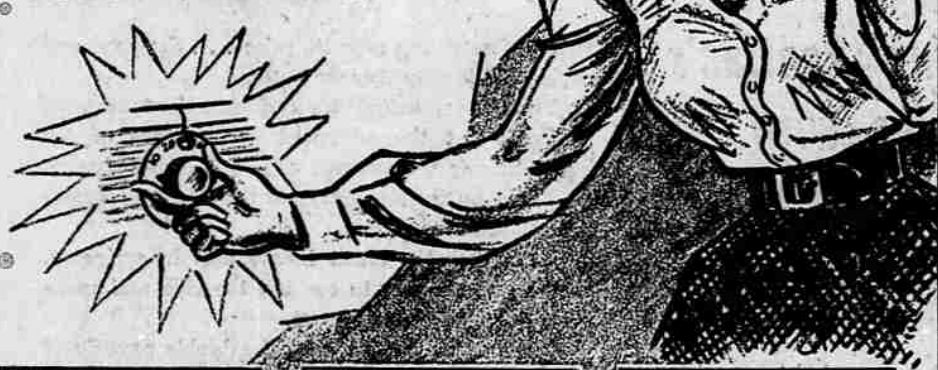
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
