

Tabernacle Choir Ends Foreign Tour

Paris—(U.P.)—The Salt Lake City Mormon Tabernacle choir climaxed its six-week European tour Saturday with a concert before a packed Franco-American audience at the Palais de Chaillot theater here.

The 379-group choral ensemble has sung in seven countries to the praises of European audiences and critics alike. High spot of the tour was the dedication of the first Mormon Temple in Europe at Berne, Switzerland, September 11.

Choir leaders said that the group looked forward to the concert Saturday night as the climax of the trip. Sunday the choristers and fellow Mormons accompanying them held a service at the Salle Pleyel under the auspices of the Paris Latter Day Saints mission.

Then the singers disbanded to make their way home in groups by various routes.

The concert was broadcast by the French National radio.
