Temporary Teacher Certificates OK'd

Salem—(U.P.)—The State Board of Education today approved 18 temporary teacher certificates because of "an acute teacher shortage."

In all cases the request for the temporary permits came from local school authorities, most of them in remote sections of the state, in behalf of individuals who did not have sufficient academic credits to warrant permanent teaching permits. The school authorities told the board it had been impossible to get the services of certificated teachers and unless the temporary permits were granted, operation of their schools would be impaired.

Freshman registration at Oregon Technical Institute in Klamath Falls has shown a large increase this fall. The board was advised that on the second day of registration 509 freshmen had signed in, compared to 391 on the second day of the fall term a year ago.

Portland Evacuation Traffic Control Due

Salem—(U.P.)—Motorists headed toward Portland during the evacuation test next week will be stopped or diverted to keep from blocking the flow of out-bound traffic, the Oregon Civil Defense agency said today.

Some 200,000 people will be moved from the test area during "Operation Green Light," which centers in the business district, the CD agency said. The test will take place on the afternoon of Sept. 27, 28 or 29.

State and Portland police and county sheriff's officers will manage traffic control points in the city and in Multnomah, Clackamas, Columbia, Washington and Yamhill counties to prevent incoming traffic from blocking the evacuation.

On being stopped, motorists will receive a leaflet asking their cooperation in staying out of the test area during the short period of the exercise, which will last from one to two hours.

Railroad Service In Major Shift

Chicago—(U.P.)—A major shift in railroad passenger service between Chicago and the West Coast was under way today.

It followed an announcement by the Union Pacific Railroad that, as of Oct. 30, its connecting service between Chicago and Omaha for five crack streamliners will be handled by the Milwaukee Road.

The trains are the City of Los Angeles, City of Portland, City of San Francisco, City of Denver and the Los Angeles Challenger.

The UP announcement yesterday ended a 75-year-old agreement with the Chicago and Northwestern Railway for carrying its cross-country trains in and out of the windy city.

The C&NW carried the trains between Chicago and Omaha, and the UP carried them between Omaha and the West Coast. Other western roads use similar connecting arrangements.

In New York, the stock exchange reported that confirmation of the contract cancellation resulted in C&NW common closing at \$18.75, down 12 cents. UP closed at \$172, up 50 cents, and Milwaukee Road closed at \$29.37, up 62 cents.

Union Pacific owns a substantial interest in the Northwestern, including \$1,238,800 par value preferred stock and \$2,152,500 par value convertible bonds.
