Do-It-Yourself Craze in New Phase; Experts Finish Work

New York (U.P.)—If "The Perils of Pauline" were rewritten today, it just might be the saga of a pretty housewife mired in discouragement in the middle of her own do-it-yourself projects.

There is no one around who thinks a woman can't paint her own kitchen ceiling—but there are a number of learned painters who admit that a lot of paint has fallen on pretty faces while the amateur painter was learning how.

So now we are entering a new phase of do-it-yourselfism. More people who are experts are trying to see that homeowners have more places to turn for help when they get into trouble.

"First the amateur must overcome his or her reluctance to ask for detailed instructions," a paint demonstrator at a new do-it-yourself show here advised. "Too often a man, especially, will just buy a can of paint and walk out with it because he is embarrassed to reveal how little he knows."

First Bloom of Enthusiasm

"Many people get started in the first bloom of enthusiasm," said an executive of a laminated plastic covering manufacturer. "When the bloom fades they find it is more of a job than they thought. That is where the professional should be willing to step in and help the home-

owner finish the job."

This expert said he felt that professional workers, at first inclined to resent the surge of interest in learning certain building and decorating skills by homeowners, now were adopting a more realistic attitude. They realized, he said, that do-it-yourself projects often represented redecorating or building that the homeowner never would have started if it meant hiring a professional. And an expert with a kindly attitude could make a tidy living completing the ambitious attempts that go awry.

Daily Shows at Bank

A savings bank in midtown Manhattan opened a do-it-yourself show here this week with daily demonstrations of various projects—wallpapering, making slip covers, painting and installing tricky traverse curtain rods.

A well-dressed man watched in fascination as a girl demonstrator casually slapped a length of wallpaper on a plywood backdrop. He wasn't a struggling young man trying to cut corners—but a successful vice-president of a large commercial real estate firm who liked to relax on week ends by decorating a recently bought house in the country.
