New Regulations In State Dairy Laws Proposed at Hearing

Salem — (U.P.) — Several suggestions for new regulations to be made as a result of 1955 changes in the Oregon dairy laws were offered by some 50 dairy manufacturers and producers here yesterday at a hearing presided over by O. K. Beals, dairy division chief of the State Department of Agriculture. His assistant, Kenneth E. Carl, conducted the hearing.

Several producers, led by state Rep. Joe Rogers of Independence, objected to a proposal to mark condemned milk cans by punching a 3-16th-inch hole in the pouring lip. Rogers said he hoped something else could be found.

However, plant operators generally expressed approval of this marking for condemned cans, pointing out that about 90 percent of the condemned cans had to be retinned, during which process the hole automatically would be repaired.
