During the day, classes will be held for those wishing to learn, and regular hours arranged for the men taking corrective or exercise therapy. A number of "big time" bowlers are available both in the men's and the women's department. Max Ament is a graduate of the member employee class who has won honors. A top match pair in the ladies' section is the team of Joan McCready and Annabelle Zahnow.
