## Terraps Given Seven Point Nod over Bears

Mighty Maryland, the nation's top ranked college football team, has been established only a seven-point favorite to defeat Baylor Saturday and the way Steve Owen, who scouted the Terraps last week, sees it the odds-makers haven't been generous enough.

"A fine ball club," Owen said of Maryland. "The Terraps have good tackles, are deep and have fine balance. The only time I saw UCLA in Maryland territory last Saturday was when the Bruins went into the field house at half-time."

Baylor, too, is undefeated in two starts but apparently is in over its head against Maryland, the national champion of 1953. The Bears opened the season with a 35-7 win over Hardin-Simmons and then followed up with a 19-2 victory over Villanova last Saturday night.

## Michigan Also Favored

Michigan, Georgia Tech, Oklahoma and Notre Dame, the teams ranked behind Maryland in that order also are favored to win this Saturday.

Michigan, a 42-7 conqueror of Missouri last Saturday, is a 12½ point pick over Michigan State in their Big Ten test at Ann Arbor, Mich.; Georgia Tech, winner over Miami, Fla., and Florida in its two starts, is favored by seven points over Southern Methodist in an intercollegiate meeting at Atlanta, Ga.; Oklahoma, 13-6 winner over North Carolina in its only start, is a 12½ choice over Pittsburgh at Norman, Okla., and Notre Dame, which trimmed SMU in a 14-point favorite against Indiana.

Ohio State, the Rose Bowl champion and 28-0 winner over Nebraska in its season opener, is favored by 10 points in the nationally televised game-of-the-week against Stanford at Palo Alto, Calif. Stanford downed College of Pacific two weeks ago and dropped a 10-0 decision to Oregon State last Saturday.

Southern California is a 12½ choice over Texas at Los Angeles and Wichita is favored by 10 points over the University of Detroit in Friday night's top games.

**Prospect Jacksonville Vie Thursday**  
Jacksonville — Injuries may prove a handicap to both clubs Thursday night when Jacksonville plays host to Prospect in a Jacksonville County B league football game. The tussle will be at 8 p.m. at Central Point.

Among those on the crippled list at Jacksonville are Guard Gary Smith and Backs Jack Daley and Floyd Driskell. Back Don Vannice of Prospect is still hobbled by an injury suffered in the Talent mix last week.

If Vannice is able to play for the Cougars, he'll be at full with Lyle Pope, quarter; Darwin Been at left half, and Don Burwell, right half. Pope could be at full in place of Vannice with Been going to quarter and Ring from guard to left half.

Coach Wes Stauffer's probable Prospect linemen are Jim Daniels and Leon Bean, ends; Doyle Henderson and Ray Shafer, at tackles; Keith Setzer and Ring or Jim Martin, guards, and Walter Friday, center.

## Nash-Hudson Auto Debut Oct. 10-11

Milwaukee — (U.P.) — American Motors Corp. plans to unveil its 1956 Nash and Hudson models Oct. 10-11 at a press preview at nearby Burlington, which will mark Wisconsin's re-entry into the automotive limelight.

It will be the first time a new automobile model has been revealed in Wisconsin since 1937 when the old Nash Motors previewed its latest cars at Lake Geneva. Later that year Nash merged with the Kelvinator Corp. and the firm's main offices moved to Detroit although it continued to produce its cars at Milwaukee and Kenosha, Wis.

Last year, Nash-Kelvinator merged with the Hudson Motor Car Co. to form the new American Motors Corp. The firm turns out Nash and Hudson cars, the smaller Rambler, and other items such as refrigerators and kitchen ranges.

Few details of the new Nash and Hudson models have leaked out, but the 1956 versions of the two cars are expected to look pretty much like the current models.

## NY YANKS BOAST MOST SUCCESS AMONG ALL CLUBS IN WORLD SERIES

The New York Yankees have always been the most successful of all World Series teams.

Since winning their first pennant in 1921, the Yankees have been world champions 16 times and settled for second money in the classic only four times. The most recent of these was in 1942 when they lost to the St. Louis Cardinals.

Victory in this series would also give Stengel six world titles in seven years and a chance to tie Joe McCarthy's mark of seven league champions and six world series championships in eight years.

The Dodgers, on the other hand, were hoping to end their history of frustration in the "big show." The Dodgers won pennants in 1916, 1920, 1941, 1947, 1949, 1952 and 1955—but each time bowed in the series. They lost to the Boston Red Sox in 1916, the Indians in 1920 and to the Yankees in their last five classics.

**Climax Alston's Rise**  
For Alston, a series triumph would climax his rise from an obscure minor league manager in the massive Brooklyn farm system to the leader of the first Brooklyn world champion in history.

Following the first two games at the Yankee Stadium, the scene will shift to Ebbets Field for games three, four and five. If more games are necessary, they'll be back at the stadium. All the games are scheduled to start at 1 p.m. EDT except Sunday's which will begin at 2:05 p.m.

The games are being televised over the National Broadcasting System and broadcast by the Mutual Broadcasting System. In addition, they will be piped overseas by the Armed Forces Radio.

## Grid Video Priced Out Of Existence

Detroit — (U.P.) — Detroit Lions General Manager Nick Kerbawy predicted today the National Football League "can't live without television," but he charged the NFL network telecasts had been "priced out of existence."

Kerbawy said he and other club officials have been trying to find a way to replace the regular Saturday night network telecasts which were dropped this year.

"The Dumont Network started carrying our Saturday night games in 1953 on an experimental basis without much revenue. Last year, at the last minute, the sponsor canceled out and the network sold the program on a co-operative basis," he said.

"We looked for a more stable set-up this year. But now the network has gone out of business. The big problem now is to get a network to carry the Saturday night games. The league has tried to stage its own network show. But we would have to pay \$1.20-a-mile for cables that the networks can get for 13 to 40 cents."

"We've been priced right out of existence," he said.

The general manager of the NFL's defending western division champions said revenue from the network telecasts "amounted to about 16 2/3 per cent of the individual clubs' receipts."

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
