

Oct. 20 Deadline For Applications In IFYE Program

© Jackson county farm youths have time to apply for six-month, expense-paid trips abroad under the International Farm Youth Exchange program. Winnifred Gillen, state 4-H extension agent at Oregon State college, announced that applications will be accepted until Oct. 20 from young people wanting to visit other countries.

Two-Way Exchange
Three or four Oregonians will be selected to go abroad in 1956. Exchanges need only furnish personal items and camera supplies. The IFYE project is a two-way exchange. Farm delegates from the United States go to one of 45 participating countries for four to six months, and exchanges from abroad come to this country on a similar setup.

In order to be eligible for a trip, applicants must be between the ages of 20 and 30, have a farm background, be a high school graduate and a resident of Oregon. Application forms and details on countries to be visited may be secured by writing to the county 4-H office in the courthouse, according to Glenn Klein, Jackson county 4-H club agent.

Roger Detering, Harrisburg, and Donna Mae Lingle, Boring, are two Oregon delegates now overseas. Detering is in Turkey and Miss Lingle is in Greece. Gayle Gilmour, Jefferson, leaves Oct. 4 for Brazil. Three IFYE exchanges from Turkey, England and Switzerland now are living on Oregon farms.

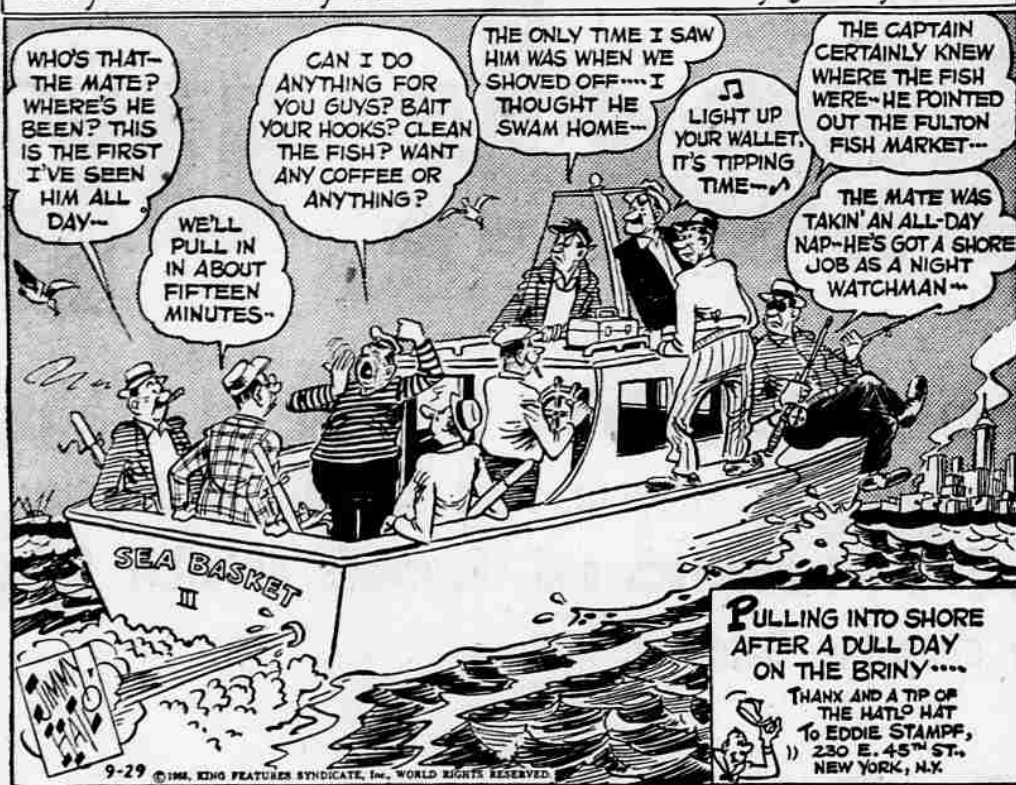
Funds for IFYE delegates come from private donors. For several years, the Oregon Bankers association has sponsored two delegates. Four 4-H clubs throughout the state have boosted the program in their county groups and church and civic organizations also have contributed.

Before an IFYE leaves the United States, he is given orientation on geography and agriculture in the country to be visited. "A speaking ability of the native language is not necessary, although it helps," Klein said.

(A) The only way you can convince your daughter that she will be making a mistake by marrying this man is to have facts on which to base your arguments. Just telling her that you were unhappy when you married her father, who was so much older than you, would not be convincing evidence. She could easily argue that the man she wants to marry is a very different type of man than her father was.

Ask your minister to help you with this problem. He can find out what sort of person the man is, why he was divorced, and what kind of a reputation he has. Many other facts can be used to show your daughter what she will be in for should she persist in her desire to marry this man. Let him point out these things to your daughter. She feels that you are prejudiced because of your unhappy experience and she is likely to minimize any argument you present.
