Plane Hits Springfield School Yard

Springfield, Ore. — (U.P.) — A single-engine Taylorcraft plane crash landed on the grounds of Moffitt school here yesterday afternoon, shortly after the plane had been cleared of a noon hour crowd of children.

Oct. 7 Deadline Set for Briefs on Dismissal Request

Warren G. Lessig, attorney for Ralph B. Matthews, 601 Dakota ave., Medford, was given until Oct. 7 to file a brief in district court after attorneys yesterday argued a motion to dismiss charges of employment of an unlicensed chauffeur against Matthews.

Lessig asked the case dismissed on three grounds, that the statute is unconstitutional in that it is too vague and indefinite, that there was a variance between the pleading and the proof, and the complaint does not state facts sufficient to constitute a crime.

The court ruled against the defendant on the first two grounds, but reserved decision on the third pending filing of briefs. The prosecution was given until Oct. 14 to submit a rebuttal.

Matthews is charged with illegally employing Elbert Ray Young, 59, of 512 Pennsylvania ave., Medford, as a bus driver for Evergreen Bus lines. Young was driver of a bus which collided with a car driven by Donald Lee Knoebel, 19, of route 1, Eagle Point, on Highway 62 at Camp White Sept. 15. Knoebel was killed and 16 bus passengers were injured.

Young is scheduled to face trial on charges of failure to yield right-of-way Nov. 17.

Forced Feeding for Convicts Threatened

Walla Walla, Wash. — (U.P.) — The warden of the state prison said today 35 hunger striking convicts would be hauled out for intravenous feeding if the lack of food endangered their health.

Two of the original 37 convicts who began the hunger strike at Monday night's dinner were hospitalized late yesterday when Warden Lawrence Delmore Jr. said he was afraid they might die of starvation.

"We serve three meals a day," Delmore said. "The men are free to eat at mealtime but we are not giving them special privileges."

Delmore said a prison physician was checking the health of the 35 inmates, all charged with being ring leaders in riots at the prison in July and August.

Youth Activities Drive Set to Open

Ashland — The Ashland-Talent Youth Activities drive, which has a goal of \$14,300 for the support of youth agencies in this area, will open tomorrow.

Gordon Hays, chairman of the drive, reported that the campaign will operate in five divisions, with solicitors working in the business, industrial, special gifts, residential and special events divisions.

Headquarters of the month-long drive are at the Lithia hotel. Agencies benefiting from the drive are the Boy and Girl Scouts, Campfire girls and YMCA of the Ashland-Talent area.

L. J. Malarkey Dies in Portland

Portland — (U.P.) — Leo J. (Tick) Malarkey, a football halfback at the University of Oregon from 1913 to 1916, died of leukemia yesterday evening in the Veterans hospital here.

A native of Astoria, he spent some 20 years in the insurance business before retiring in 1940 because of ill health. Funeral services will be conducted in Astoria at 10 a.m. Monday.

Tick Malarkey was a resident of the Camp White Veterans Administration domiciliary for several years before his last illness, and was known to many in the valley through a column he originated about Camp White doings, "Pickin' Pears," for the Mail Tribune.

Prior to coming to Medford, he was a patient at the VA hospital in Roseburg, and while there wrote a similar column for the Roseburg News Review. He had been a newspaper correspondent from time to time for other Oregon newspapers.

For a time, Mr. Malarkey was a logger, and in 1933 survived the huge Tillamook fire only by submerging himself in a stream while the fire raged over him.

Marine Money to Strengthen Corps

Washington — (U.P.) — Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson has authorized the Marines to spend most of an additional \$46,000,000 voted by Congress to strengthen the corps but which Wilson once impounded.

Wilson told a news conference yesterday that the Marines will be allowed to spend about \$35,000,000 of the additional funds. But the defense secretary said it still has not been decided whether the corps will expand to 215,000-man level recommended by the Democratic controlled Congress. He said the Marines have been authorized to freeze their strength at the current 205,000-man level pending a study of the proposed higher figures.

Cabinet, Under Nixon Leadership, Agrees No Obstacles Exist

Washington — (U.P.) — President Eisenhower's cabinet, meeting under the chairmanship of Vice-President Richard M. Nixon, agreed today that "no obstacles" exist to the orderly conduct of government business during the President's illness.

The cabinet announced its conclusion after a session of almost two and a half hours at the White House.

In addition to regular cabinet members, the meeting was attended by a number of other top level government officials.

A formal statement issued by the White House as the meeting was concluded said:

"The members of the Cabinet were greatly cheered by the reports of steady progress and improvement in the President's health.

"After full discussion of pending matters, it was concluded that there are no obstacles to the orderly and uninterrupted conduct of the foreign and domestic affairs of the nation during the period of rest ordered by the President's physicians."

The cabinet statement appeared to rule out officially any consideration of a formal delegation of presidential authority to Vice-President Nixon unless there is a change in the situation.

Murray Snyder, assistant White House press secretary, announced that President Assistant Sherman Adams would leave by military plane for Denver today to set up shop at the Summer White House.

Marcus Kidnaper 'Don't Want Lawyer'

San Francisco — (U.P.) — Mrs. Betty Jean Benedict collapsed outside the courtroom today after sobbing violently as she told the judge she had kidnapped baby Robert Marcus and "don't want a lawyer."

Despite her repeated pleas that she didn't want legal counsel and "don't want anything," Judge Alvin E. Weinberger appointed Public Defender Edward T. Mancuso to represent her and continued her case until Oct. 7.

Mrs. Benedict, a buxom, 27-year-old blonde, was apprehended in Stockton, Calif., early Wednesday after she had surrendered the 13-day-old baby of Dr. and Mrs. Sanford Marcus at a Catholic church.

She was arraigned today on a charge of kidnap without intent to commit bodily harm or collect ransom.

Adjustment in Local Milk Prices Expected

In view of milk price increases today in the Portland area, it is "reasonable to assume that an adjustment" will be made in the local milk price situation, local milk producers said today.

Richard Westerberg, Valleyview, manager of the Jackson County Milk Producers league, said today that some changes may be expected here in line with the increases in the north. He added, however, that no definite conclusions concerning milk prices have been reached here.

Multnomah Jury Plans No Action In OLCC Hearings

Much Testimony Said To Be Rumor

Portland — (U.P.) — The Multnomah county grand jury said today that no indictments would be returned on the basis of its investigation of the Oregon Liquor Control Commission.

The grand jury's report was turned over today to Presiding Circuit Judge James R. Bain. It said:

"Much of the testimony which was presented was rumor and could not be confirmed by legal evidence. Also, we believe that many of the matters within this investigation are administrative in nature and not within our jurisdiction which is to indict for crime. After careful deliberation of the matter, no indictments were returned."

District Attorney William Langley, who directed the investigation, was confined home by illness today and had no immediate comment. The probe was ordered after Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton charged there had been a "cover-up" of evidence of violations by OLCC personnel after an investigation ordered earlier by Gov. Paul L. Patterson.

Thornton did not criticize the grand jury action. However, he said his office was continuing its investigation and would "issue a report so the public would know the facts."

He said the grand jury must have concluded that it didn't have the concrete evidence to show beyond a reasonable doubt that there were violations of criminal laws. However, he said, that "doesn't coincide with what we've found" in our investigation.

"But, the jury heard sworn testimony and I didn't," he said.

Arabs' UN Demands, French Threat Clash

United Nations, N. Y. — (U.P.) — A French threat to quit the United Nations if the world body tampers with its Algerian problems clashed head-on today with a strong Arab drive for full-scale debate on the rebellion-torn African territory.

The General Assembly was scheduled to hear addresses by British Foreign Secretary Harold Macmillan and Czech Foreign Minister Vaclav David and then launch into discussion of whether it should debate the Algerian question.

U.N. officials said they would press for a final decision by the end of today's session on the question.

Unimpeachably authoritative sources said French Premier Edgar Faure had told Foreign Minister Antoine Pinay, here for the assembly debate, that he would seek parliamentary approval for France's withdrawal if the assembly votes to debate the issue raised by Algerian demands for self-government.

Paris — (U.P.) — A teenage princess married last week in Venice said today for New York aboard the S. S. Liberté.

Before leaving Paris, Princess Ira Furstenberg, 15, ordered 24 dresses from the House of Jacques Griffe. She and her husband, Prince Alfonso Hohenlohe, 31, said they planned to visit Niagara Falls.

Prices Paid Farmers Mounts One Per Cent

Washington — (U.P.) — Prices farmers received for crops and livestock rose one per cent during the month ended Sept. 15, the Agriculture Department reported today.

The gain, following four consecutive months of decline, left farm prices in mid-September four per cent below September last year.

The cost of production and living supplies purchased by farmers, meantime, fell 1/3 of one per cent. This marked the third straight month of decline and leaves the cost figure nearly one per cent below a year ago.

Neuberger, Coon Continue Debate On Power Rates

Arguments Heard At La Grande

La Grande — (U.P.) — The argument over rates to be charged for power under the partnership plan for construction John Day dam continued last night in the fourth of a series of debates between Rep. Sam Coon (R-Ore.) and Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.).

Neuberger insisted that Coon had said in Pendleton the night before that the rate of John Day would be 10 mills. Coon said the rate would be 2.5 mills at the dam site, but that production is only 25 per cent of the delivered cost. Neuberger said this would make the rate 10 mills.

Coon replied that one sawmill owner had called to say his rate was three mills, but that was after he had used a certain initial amount. Coon said this was true in power served by private utilities—"the more you use the less you pay."

He said another sawmill owner told him his rate was six mills.

Coon said comparing the 2.2 mill rate paid by industries at the Bonneville wholesale rate with the rate to be paid at retail by private consumers of John Day was comparing timber in the forest with 2x4s in the lumber yard.

500 in Attendance

Some 500 persons in the Eastern Oregon College of Education auditorium heard the two congressmen debate the question: "Agreed that the John Day dam bill is in the public interest."

The two debaters will take the stage at Baker tonight in the fifth of their series of 10 debates in eastern Oregon.

Governor to Work On Boxcar Lack

Salem — (U.P.) — Gov. Paul Patterson promised today to "do all in my power" to correct the car shortage that has caused several shut-downs in the lumber industry in Oregon.

"By advisors sensed the possibility of this situation as long ago as February," Gov. Patterson said, "and efforts were made at that time to prepare for it. Thereafter, upon the situation coming more acute, I set up an emergency transportation committee, composed of the representatives of various shippers in the state. They have worked hard and diligently on the problem, but not withstanding all of our efforts, the situation has developed."

The governor said the emergency transportation committee wants him to investigate the possibility of getting additional rail service in western Oregon, as a long-range solution. He said:

"We are investigating the possibility of new trackage, joint usage of existing trackage, usage of existing trackage, and forced routings, and any and all other possibilities which would enable us to get more cars into the affected part of the state of Oregon."

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2,604,153 Doses of Salk Vaccine Released

Washington — (U.P.) — The Public Health Service today released 2,604,153 doses of Salk polio vaccine for immediate use in inoculations.

Of this amount, 2,035,335 doses will go to the states and territories for the inoculation of youngsters under the government's voluntary distribution plan.

The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis will receive 568,818 doses for its free inoculation program for second and third graders.

The Health Service also announced that 326,664 doses previously reserved for the foundation now is being allotted to the states and territories.

Wife of Philippine President in U.S.

San Francisco — (U.P.) — Mrs. Ramon Magsaysay, attractive first lady of the Philippines, arrived here today on her first visit to the United States.

She is en route to Johns Hopkins hospital for treatment for sinus.

Accompanied by her traveling companion, Miss Nellie Gonzales, the 40-year-old wife of the President of the Philippines arrived aboard a Pan American World Airways plane from Manila.

Brooklyn Wins 8-3

Brooklyn — (U.P.) — Young Johnny Podres pitched himself "the finest birthday present I ever had" as the battered Brooklyn Dodgers came home to friendly Ebbets Field today and crushed the New York Yankees, 8 to 3, in the third game of the World Series.

Taking revenge for a series beating at the hands of these same Yankees in his rookie season of 1953, left-handed Johnny celebrated his 23rd birthday by scattering seven hits as he ended the Dodger pitching paralysis to give them their first triumph in the classic.

Partisan Gallery Thrilled

And the Dodgers, after losing the first two games, rose up solidly behind him, led by the cannonading of Roy Campanella and base running of Jackie Robinson to thrill a partisan gallery of 34,209 fans on this gray and overcast day.

Podres, the "hard luck guy" of the Dodger pitching staff, ailing and injured twice this season, was in very few bad spots as his determined mates pinned the defeat on "Bullet Bob" Turley in a mere one and on-third innings.
