Amateur radio operators who are interested are invited to join the club or contact members for further information.

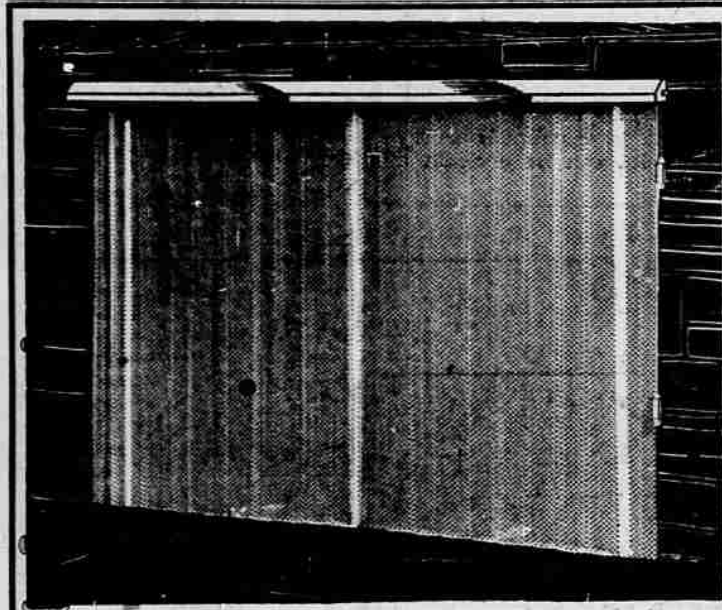
Lakeview Uranium Ore To Be Shipped

Lakeview — (U.P.) — The Lakeview Mining Company will begin the first commercial shipments of uranium ore from Oregon next week.

The Thornburg brothers, owners of the mining company, said a quantity of ore from the White King and Lucky Lass mines is stockpiled near the railroad and freight cars have been ordered for the initial shipments.

The ore will go to the Vitro Uranium mill at Salt Lake City for smelting. The Thornburg brothers said they plan to construct their own processing mill if the ore is as extensive and valuable as presently indicated.

Freight Car Supply Reaches Low Figure

Salem — (U.P.) — The freight car supply for western Oregon lumber shippers has dropped to new low figures, Public Utilities Commission Charles H. Heltzel said today.

The Southern Pacific was able to supply only 59 per cent of the cars ordered, compared with 67 per cent the week before.

On the main line Eugene to Portland, 429 cars were ordered and 239 supplied. On the Mill City branch, 155 were ordered and 87 supplied. Eastside, via Silverton, 54 were ordered and 46 supplied. Westside via Dallas, 276 were ordered and 189 supplied.
