

First Deer Kill Ahead Of Last Year

First-day deer kill in Jackson county appeared to be running a bit ahead of the 1954 season, according to a check of sporting goods stores and custom cutting departments of cold storage locker businesses.

While reports varied, one sporting goods store said it had weighed in 24 deer by around mid-afternoon. One locker firm reported handling 35 deer, one said it had received 10 or 11 and another reported eight.

The kills were made in Jackson county in almost all cases. Deer were brought down in all parts of the county. Some reports listed the deer at medium-size, and others listed animals both large and small.

There was one report of a party of four hunters getting three deer in the Toketa Falls area. It was indicated that lots of deer were seen and a number of hunters said their shots missed the animals.

Marshfield, South Salem Show Heels

The Spartans from Corvallis were upended by Gresham, 7-0, last night, on the strength of a third period intercepted pass.

The victory left Gresham in the undefeated class with four wins.

South Salem, a pre-season favorite along with Corvallis in District 8, kept its slate clean with a 21-7 victory over Bend. Marshfield also recorded its fourth straight win by clouting Springfield, 27-7, in a District 5 contest.

Pendleton, a District 7 contender, went outside the district to down Redmond, 32-7. The victory was the fourth without a loss for the Umatilla county team.

North Bend, a perennial threat in District 5, was upset 20-13 by Coquille, a Class A-2 school.

Hillsboro held its lead in District 4 by wallowing West Linn, 26-7, to give the Spartans their fourth straight win.

In other District 4 contests, McMinnville drubbed Newberg, 44-12; Beaverton blanked Forest Grove, 20-0, and Oregon City defeated Tigard, 27-0.

Milwaukie, in District 3, and Medford, District 6, battled to a 7-7 tie.

North Salem dumped Sweet Home, 33-19, in a District 8 contest.

The Dalles beat Hood River, 18-7, in a non-district battle.

In the Portland city league, comprising Districts 1 and 2, Jefferson continued to dominate the field with a 13-6 victory over Grant.

In a District 3 encounter, Central Catholic of Portland stopped Astoria, 20-0.

Snider's Homer Starts Bums Toward 8-5 Victory Which Evens Series At Two Games

Brooklyn, N.Y. — (U.P.) — Duke Snider's record home run, a Babe Ruth blast over the right field wall, set the tempo for the booming bats of the Brooklyn Dodgers yesterday when they hammered out 14 hits to beat the New York Yankees 8-5 and square the World Series at two games each.

The Duke's three-run smash high over the right field screen in the fifth inning — a record seventh in the series for a National league batter — plus all-the-way wallop by Gil Hodges and Roy Campanella sparked the driving Dodgers to victory. And for the third time in the history of the classic Brooklyn roar back to even it up after having dropped the opening two games.

Slugging Battle

It was a slugging battle all the way with neither starting pitcher, Brooklyn's Carl Erskine or the Yankees' J. M. Lohmeyer, surviving long as relief specialists Clem Labine came on with two out in the fifth and went the rest of the way to receive credit for the victory.

It was a bad day all around for the Yankees. Even Yankee Vice-President Del Webb, sitting in a box seat, came up with lumps and bruises as he was struck by a foul ball off Larsen's bat in the fifth and had to receive first aid in the Yankee dressing room.

The Dodgers, who lost the first two games at Yankee stadium, thrilled 36,242 partisan fans just as they did in 1947 and 1953 when they bounced back to win two in a row by mauling five Yankee pitchers. But even the Dodgers had their pitching woes as Erskine was succeeded by Don Bessent and Labine.

McLoughlin junior high-ninth grade picked up a 13 to 0 margin over Hedrick Friday afternoon in a practice scrimmage at the McLoughlin field.

It was not a full scale game. Eight-minute quarters were played and they were split into four-minute periods after which coaches huddled with their teams to talk over previous action and give instructions.

There were no kick-offs. The ball was put in play on the 40-yard line at the start of halves and after the touchdowns. Practice uniforms were worn.

Coach Mel Bolden of Hedrick declined to single out any player. He said his Bulldogs looked all right in spots and not so good in others. The mentor said the workout brought out the club's weaknesses and added, "I hope they learned."

Coach Barney Riggs of Hedrick said he and Assistant Karl Kahle felt that their crew did "little better than expected." Riggs commented, "As a whole I think they did all right." Ends Pete Rasmussen and Gary Wentz drew praise for their stout work on defense. Riggs indicated that Hedrick was somewhat under wraps since a Grants Pass coach was scouting.

Funston, Lyons — Hedrick had Guard Larry Anderson sidelined with a bad thumb and lost Tackle Monte Penwell when he suffered a cut around the eye. The cut required 10 stitches. Riggs himself missed practices Monday through Thursday. He was hospitalized part of the time because of a quinsy throat. Kahle was in charge of the club.

McLoughlin scored first in the opening quarter after a run back of an interception pass by Gerry Lyons put the ball within the 10 yard line. It took three tries from there with Fred Funston going the last two and Mike Murray kicking the extra point.

In the third quarter Lyons took a punt at about midfield and ran back for a TD. He got some good blocking and George Koch, who was in at defensive left halfback at the time, threw the final block that let the runner get away. Murray kicked the ball between the uprights on the conversion try but illegal formation nullified the boot. The next kick was wide.

Medford high's Black Tornado fought to a 7 to 7 deadlock with the favored Milwaukie Maroons Friday night in a fumble-marred struggle on the gridiron of the metropolitan area school.

The Tornado dominated play in the first half, scoring its touchdown and appearing to have Milwaukie on the run, but could not further capitalize on its command. In the second half the Maroons took to the air. Quarterback Bill Haller, a good

passer and clever ball handler, set up the Milwaukie score.

Driving from deep in its own territory, Medford tallied in the first quarter. It was the second time Medford got hold of the ball and the march was for 69 yards. Quarterback Dick McLoughlin sneaked the last half yard to the end zone. Dick Copple kicked the extra point. Fullback Gowey went over from the four-yard line in the second half for the Milwaukie touch-

down. Shaw converted for the Maroons.

Penalties Hurt — Many yards of penalties hampered the Black Tornado. The Medfordites moved the ball well when they had it but the penalties damaged the Tornado's offensive effectiveness. And fumbles also hurt.

Quarterback McLoughlin drew plaudits for his play calling and Right Halfback Mike Hawkins, back in the line-up, after being sidelined for two games and the biggest share of another, was an offensive standout for the southern Oregon club. Weak side plays with Hawkins carrying the ball worked well for Medford during the first half.

The home club netted 334 yards in scrimmage plays to 229 for Medford. Milwaukie picked up 265 rushing and 69 passing while the Medford figures were 203 and 26. The Maroons had a slim 20 to 19 edge in first downs.

Twice in the first half Milwaukie fumbled inside the Tornado 20-yard line, once on the two, and Medford recovered.

Medford will prep this week for the first of its contests among Southern Oregon foes. It entertains Crater on Friday night, October 7.
