Rogue River 32-24 Victor Over Eagles

Rogue River — Rogue River high, trailing 0 to 12 in the early minutes, stormed back with crisp blocking and sure tackling to overcome Eagle Point 32 to 24 in a non-league football fracas filled with long runs here Friday night.

The Chiefs, themselves got a first quarter touchdown and took the lead 19 to 12 with a pair of third quarter counters. Each club crossed the goal twice in the final period.

Eagle Point scored twice in its first four plays from scrimmage. At the start of the opening period the Eagles recovered a Rogue River fumble on the Chieftain 22. Two plays later Jim Duncan ran 20 yards to score. Then Eagle Point got the pigskin on its own 47. Jack Bunker packed the ball to the RR 32. He went the rest of the distance on the next attempt.

Fred Bond capped a 68-yard drive with a 26-yard run on the 10th play to give the Chiefs their first TD.

First third quarter marker came with a little difficulty. Bill Lane helped with a 50-yard run to the EF 15. The Chieftains moved to a first down on the one-yard line but Gary Stinchcomb fumbled and the Eagles recovered one-half yard from the goal. Two plays later Bob Wilson intercepted a pitch out and ran six yards to the TD. Lane kicked the extra and Rogue River went on top 13 to 12.

Weaver Goes 75 — Bill Weaver, who gained 183 yards for RR in five carries, broke loose for 75 yards and the third touchdown.

But the Chieftains then fumbled on their own 28. Eagle Point nabbed the ball and on the fourth punch Bunker, the night's outstanding runner for his club, went 15 yards to narrow the margin to 19 to 18 in the fore part of the last stanza.

Rogue River came up with a 52 yard push ended by a 24-yard run by Weaver and an extra point buck by Stinchcomb for a 26 to 18 bulge. Bunker broke loose for 53 yards and an Eagle tally to 26 to 18 but Weaver retally to an 80-yard sprint for the final 32 to 24 standing.

The Chiefs netted 382 yards, 57 by passing, while Eagle Point picked up 210, all by rushing.

Eagle Point was without the services of stellar back Jack Greb because of injury and RR was minus back Bill Headrick, who is suspended by Coach Tinker Hatfield. Eagle Back Gate Friend suffered a back injury on the second play of the fourth quarter.

Rogue River is a Class B school and Eagle Point an A-2 competitor.

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Jockey Hurt In 3-Horse Accident

San Mateo, Calif. — (U.P.) — Veteran jockey Peter Moreno was in critical condition Saturday as a result of injuries suffered in a spectacular three-horse spill during Friday's running of the third race at Bay Meadows.

Two other riders, apprentice Lawrence Unger and Merrill Faulkner, suffered less serious hurts.

Brain Concussion

Physicians at Mills Memorial hospital said Moreno, who now makes his home in Arcadia, Cal., was in a semi-conscious condition with a severe brain concussion and a compound fracture of the left shoulder.

Unger, Polson, Mont., was hospitalized with concussion and lacerations of the face. Faulkner, Salt Lake City, Utah, was severely shaken up, but not hospitalized.

The spill occurred when Unger's mount, Bobby In, apparently crossed his legs and went down as the field thundered into the clubhouse turn. Blue Chip Bond, with Moreno up, fell over Bobby In and Faulkner's mount, Irish Army, fell over the other two.

Motion pictures showed Unger was stepped on by another horse as he lay on the turf.

Track officials said Bobby In broke his right foreleg and would be destroyed.

UCLA Drives To 55-0 Win Over WSC

Pullman, Wash. — (U.P.) — UCLA's powerful Bruins, with fullback Bob Davenport and halfback Sam Brown leading a merciless attack, rolled to a 55-0 victory over hapless Washington State college Saturday in a Pacific Coast conference game before a "disappointed Dads' day" crowd of 20,000.

UCLA, with Davenport lugging the ball, scored the second time they got the ball. From then on it was merely a question of how high the Bruins' total would soar.

Score Twice — Davenport and Brown each scored twice to give UCLA a 28-0 halftime lead. As UCLA's devastating attack rolled up yardage almost at will, four more touchdowns in the second half finally ended the slaughter.

It was the worst defeat UCLA has inflicted on Washington State college since their series started in 1928.

Washington State failed to cross midfield in the first half. The Cougars moved to the UCLA three early in the third period, but could not score. They could generate a drive, but the speedy UCLA backs romped through gaping holes in the WSC line.

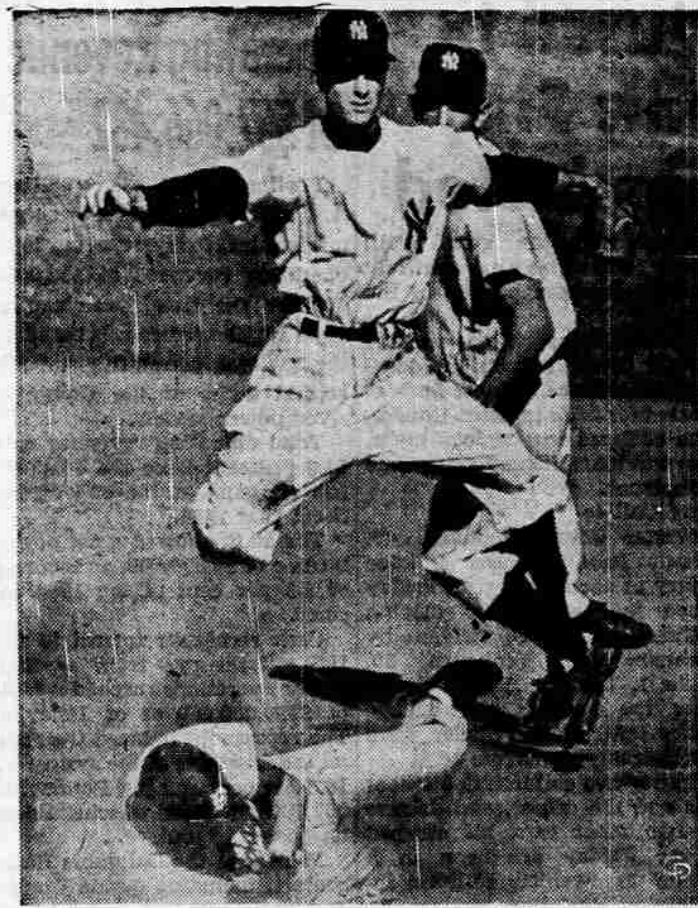
The well-known horseman, a familiar figure at tracks throughout the West, currently was training horses for the present season at Bay Meadows.

Rocking the Vikings back on their heels, the Southern Oregon eleven added another touchdown in the second period, with Clarno again scoring from the one.

Portland State came to life just before the half and drove 62 yards in nine plays with

Vince Pattee, the Vikings' only consistent ground gainer, going over for the touchdown from the four. The half ended 13 to 6 with SOC in command.

The fired up Raiders bounced right back in the third period with Don Korn crashing into the end zone after Don Dickson of Grants Pass recovered a Portland State fumble on the eight.

Garrett kicked the extra point to bring SOC's lead to 20 to 6.

Trojan Win Credited To Reserves

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — Coach Jess Hill of Southern California Saturday credited the depth and weight of the Trojan football team for overpowering University of Texas, 19-7, in Memorial Coliseum.

The Trojans had to call on all their reserve strength Friday night as they rolled to their third straight triumph. The game marked the first loss a PCC team has handed the Longhorns.

The Trojans marched to two touchdowns in the first half and confidently expected to romp home in the second half. But sophomore back Walt Fondren, inspired the Longhorns to a touchdown to narrow the margin to six points.

Jon Arnett, SC's great tailback, was blanked on touchdowns, although he ran a kick-off back 62 yards and completed two out of three passes he attempted.

Clements Injured — The 61,996 fans who attended the game expected to witness a passing exhibition by Texas' Joe Clements, the nation's leading passer. However, Clements suffered a head injury in the first period and was out of the contest.

The Trojans scored after 11 minutes of the first quarter when fullback Gordon Duvall took a pitchout on the five and raced over the goal. In the second period, SC tallied again on fullback C. R. Roberts' nine-yard run around left end.

In the third period, end Menan Schriever recovered an SC fumble on the Texas 48. The Longhorns took to the air, driving inside the Trojan 10 on three passes.

Fondren, who shifted from quarterback to halfback and performed brilliantly, scored on third down.

SC wrapped up the scoring in the final period when Duvall notched his second touchdown on a 25-yard screen pass play.
