

Siskiyou District Clubs Hold Meeting; Three Join

Eagle Point—Three new garden clubs were accepted into the Siskiyou district, Oregon Federation of Garden clubs, during the district session held Thursday in Eagle Point Grange hall. The new clubs are Cave Junction Juniors, a group of young women, Camp White Men's Garden club, and Shady Cove Garden club.

Mrs. A. O. Floyd, Medford, district president, presided over the business session. More than 200 women, representing 23 out of the 25 clubs in the district, attended the session.

Phoenix Garden club was asked to entertain the group for the spring meeting, and members of Ashland Garden club will be hostesses for the coffee hour. Butte Falls and Eagle Point Garden clubs were joint hostesses for Thursday's meeting, and Talent club sponsored the coffee hour.

Speakers for the afternoon session were Frank Glonning, Camp White, and Mrs. Orrin Hale, Bothell, Wash.

Mr. Glonning told of the effort to interest men at the Camp White domiciliary in gardening and said a gardening program would be most valuable under the new plan for Veterans' administration establishments whereby each man must have a definite eight-hour schedule of activity. He thanked the women for their aid to camp officials, for their work in providing flowers for the camp chapel each Sunday throughout the year and said that the extensive volunteer program of various organizations in this area is extremely helpful to the camp.

Mr. Glonning also told about a proposed picnic area to be laid out near the camp with fireplaces, tables, flower beds, shrubbery and trees. The plan will take four or five years to complete, he said.

Mrs. Hale, who writes the "Aunt Emmy" column for Pacific Gardeners and Homes magazine, published at Bothell, is an authority on hellebore and spoke about this flower. It is an herbaceous perennial of the ranunculaceae family, she said, and described in detail the hellebore niger, known as the Christmas rose, the hellebore orientalis, or the Lenten rose, hellebore corsicus and hellebore foetidus.

Mrs. Hale said the hellebores is an ancient plant, grown by such people as the Corinthians, and she told how it reverses the seasons, growing and blooming during the winter months. It is not affected by snow and freezing weather, she added.

The speaker said the hellebores is an extremely satisfactory flower since it blooms when there is little else in the garden, is resistant to diseases and has foliage and blossoms highly desirable for use in corsages and arrangements.

Mrs. Hale displayed plants from Penny Creek farm, the Hale's home, where she grows hundreds of the plants.

Also on the afternoon program was a panel discussion conducted by Mrs. H. C. Smith, Cave Junction, with Mrs. R. T. Nichol, Medford, talking on shrubs; Mrs. Rose Kendall, Grants Pass, chrysanthemums and Mrs. M. J. Swing, Central Point, on bulbs.

Among the visitors at the meeting were Miss Claire Hanley, Jacksonville, president of the state federation; Mrs. Vernon Eilers, Aurora, Ore., state treasurer; Mrs. Smith, past state president and now horticultural chairman for the western states; Mrs. Lawrence Luy, Medford, state recording secretary.

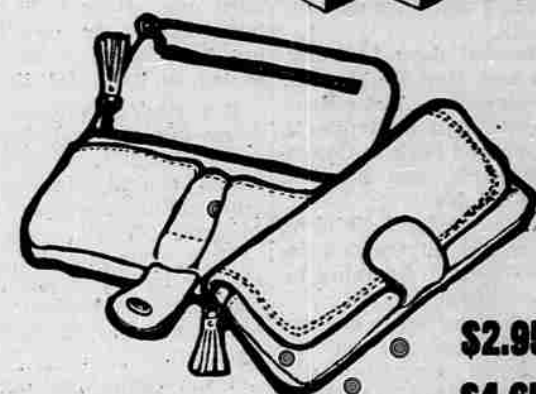
