

Brooklyn Grabs Sunday Fracas 5 to 3 To Take Lead Over Yankees in Series

New York—(U.P.)—The long-frustrated Brooklyn Dodgers hoped to wrap up their first world championship—and finally end the most famous "jinx" in World Series history—by beating the crippled New York Yankees in their own backyard.

With the site of the series switching back to Yankee Stadium and the Dodgers needed only one victory to accomplish what they have been unable to do in seven previous classics.

Despite the fact that Mickey Mantle was on the sidelines again today and Hank Bauer, Irv Noren and Joe Collins were nursing assorted ills of their own, the odds-makers installed the Yankees 6-to-5 favorites for today's contest, the sixth game in the series.

The odds favoring the Dodgers to win the series, however, jumped from 13-to-10 to 13-to-5 after they won their third straight game at Ebbets Field Sunday, 5-3, with the aid of two more homers by Duke Snider, and went ahead of the Yankees, three games to two.

Stengel Takes Blame
If the Dodgers won today, it would mark not only their first World Series triumph, but also make them "jinx-busters" as the first team in history to drop the first two games and rally to win the title in a seven-game series.

Beaten by the Yankees five times before in series competition, the Dodgers were in a position to rub salt in the Bronx Bombers' widening wounds. Stengel, who already has said

Southpaw Tommy Byrne will pitch the seventh game—assuming there would be one, of course—blamed himself a great deal for Sunday's defeat. He was particularly upset over Snider's two homers which gave the Dodger center fielder a total of nine in World Series competition. Snider has passed Joe DiMaggio, who hit a total of eight homers, and now ranks behind only Babe Ruth, who hit 15, and Lou Gehrig, who hit 10.

Casey Blames Himself
"We know how we're supposed to pitch to Snider and we don't do it," Stengel snapped after the game. "I don't blame my pitchers. I blame myself."

Bob Grim was tagged for both of Snider's homers, which were his third and fourth of the series, and Sandy Amoros also connected for Brooklyn. Bob Serv, a series "bust" to Sunday, hit a homer for the Yanks in a pinch hitting role while Yogi Berra hit for the circuit.

Rookie Roger Craig, a Montreal alumnus who Alston admitted wasn't being given consideration as a starter before the series opened, went the first six innings and was credited with the victory, although Clem Labine bailed him out of a tight spot in the seventh. Craig gave

Bill Graham Wishes for No Baseball on Sunday

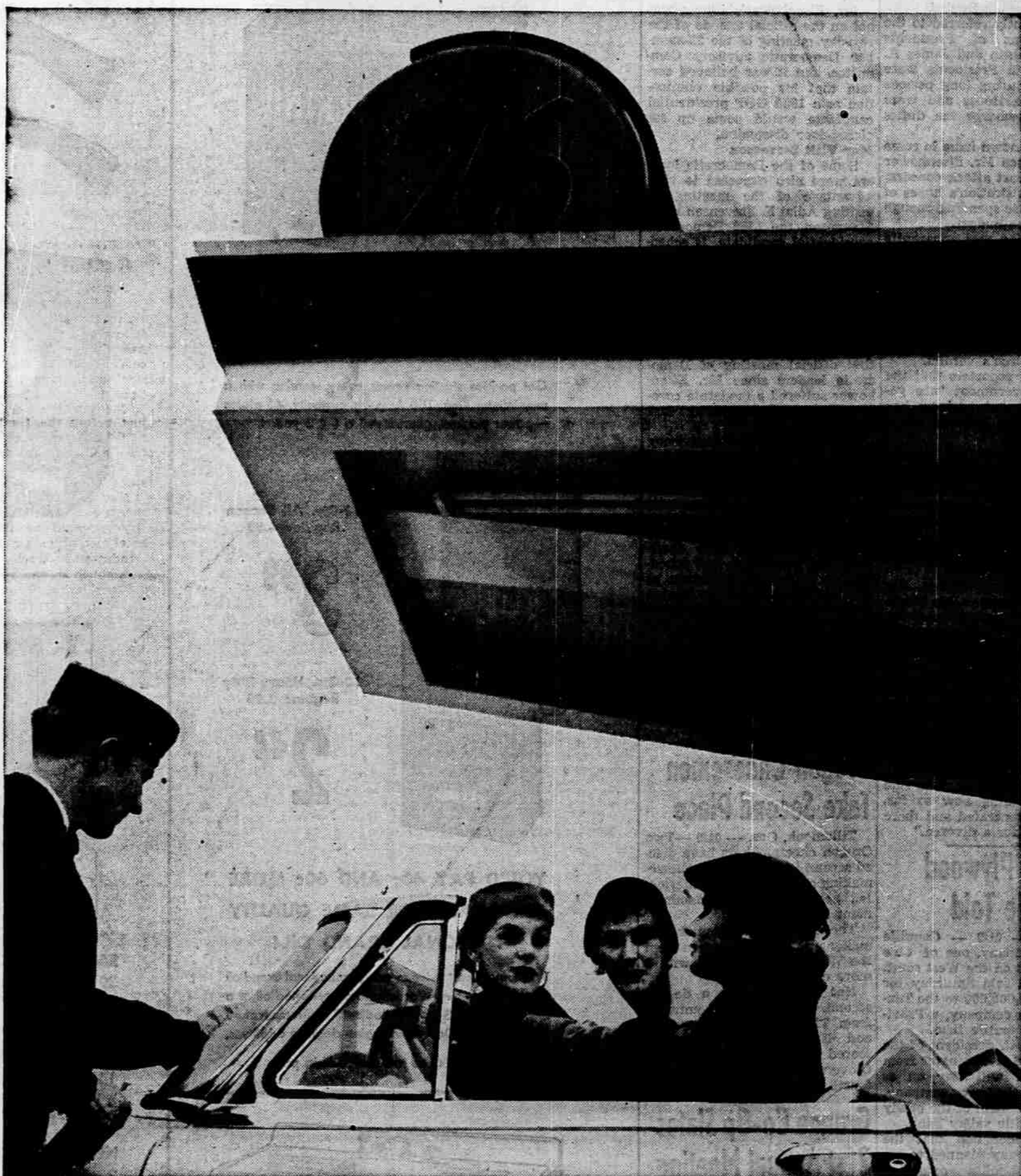
