Moscow, Ida.—(U.P.)—The winless Idaho Vandals were hopeful today that being on home territory will help when they meet the "tough" College of Pacific squad here Saturday.

Coach Skip Stahley said the young Vandal team was "just overpowered" when it suffered its third straight loss Saturday, a 47-14 shellacking by Arizona.

The team loosened up in sweat suits yesterday and scheduled heavier practice sessions today. No injuries were reported.

BACKS OUT OF ACTION

Pullman, Wash.—(U.P.)—The Washington State Cougars counted two backs out of action today as a result of injuries suffered on the practice field.

Halfback Floyd Richmond hurt his ankle on the field last night and probably will miss action in Saturday's game against the University of California at Berkeley. Fullback Bob Miller was injured last week and will be benched for at least five weeks.

Coach Al Kircher sent the squad through a long practice session yesterday to correct weaknesses shown in the team's 55-0 loss to UCLA Saturday.

PRAYS HUSKIES

Seattle, Wash.—(U.P.)—Coach Johnny Cherberg praised his University of Washington Huskies today for "another team victory" in their 19-7 win over Oregon Saturday.

"I can't point out any particularly outstanding player," he said.

The Huskies, who face a tough game Saturday against Southern California, were back on the field today in long practice scrimmages, working on both offensive and defensive maneuvers.

DUCKS TO BE READY

Eugene, Ore.—(U.P.)—Coach Len Casanova said today he hopes most of the bruises and sprains his University of Oregon Ducks suffered Saturday against Washington will be healed in time for the Colorado game here this week.

Five linemen and back Dick James suffered a variety of injuries requiring treatment during the team's 19-7 loss to Washington.

Despite the loss, however, with their passing attack which was good for 115 yards—110 yards more than they gathered in the previous two games. A 13-yard aerial brought them their only touchdown.

OLIVER HAS CHANCE

Berkeley, Cal.—(U.P.)—The University of California team physician today gave tackle Bob Oliver, sidelined since the start of the season with injuries, a "50-50" chance of getting into Saturday's game against Washington State College.

But the physician definitely declared tackle Don Tronstein out of action for at least a week. Tronstein suffered a knee injury Saturday in the Bears' 27-7 win over Pennsylvania.

Coach Lynn Waldorf admitted he had "the basis" for a grid machine after the Bears' win, but said the squad still is "not a football team."

FULL STRENGTH

Stanford, Calif.—(U.P.)—Coach Chuck Taylor was confident today of having a full-strength squad Saturday when the Stanford Indians clash with Michigan State at East Lansing, Mich.

Four players, who sat out the Ohio State game with injuries, returned to the squad yesterday and Taylor said they're raring to go for another upset.

The recovered players are halfback Gordy Young, tackle Chris Plain, center Russ Steele and center Don Geddes.

NEW PASSING PLAYS

Los Angeles.—(U.P.)—UCLA is set to spring a new set of passing plays against Oregon State here Friday night.

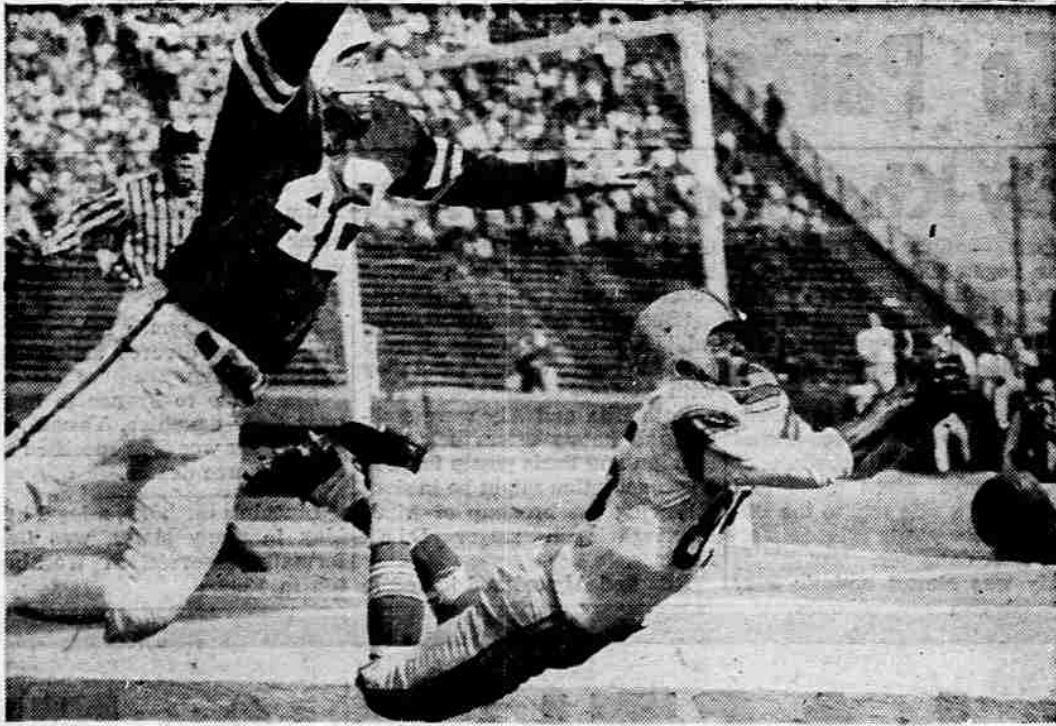
Coach Henry Red Sanders worked out the new pass plays because Oregon State Coach Tommy Prothro was his assistant for several years and knows most of the Bruin offense in detail. Tailback Ronnie Knox still favored a bruised shoulder yesterday in a passing drill.

IN TOP CONDITION

Los Angeles.—(U.P.)—Southern California will be in top physical condition for its Pacific Coast Conference game Saturday against Washington. Coach Jess Hill said today.

Hill said none of his players suffered injuries in their win Friday night over Texas. The Trojans concentrated on defense in a scrimmage yesterday after Hill said he was not satisfied with the club's defensive work against the Longhorns. Following the scrimmage, SC staged a passing drill in which quarterback Jim Contratto was connecting with regularity.

Maryland Stays In Top Spot In UP Poll; Michigan Second

New York.—(U.P.)—Maryland's terrific Terrapins, who should find the 1955 schedule a lot easier now that they've beaten their three toughest opponents, increased their margin atop the United Press college football ratings today.

Michigan, Oklahoma and Georgia Tech were bunched closely behind Maryland, while Wisconsin was a newcomer among the top ten teams in this week's ratings of the 35 leading colleges whose comprise the United Press rating board.

Coach Jim Tatum's Terrapins, who added Baylor to their vanquished list after beating Missouri and UCLA on the previous week ends, attracted first-place votes from 18 of the 35 coaches. Michigan was the top choice of six coaches, Oklahoma had five No. 1 ballots, Georgia Tech three, seventh-ranked Texas Christian had one, and ninth-ranked Wisconsin two.

Army in Top Ten
Notre Dame, Army, Texas Christian, UCLA, Wisconsin and Southern California filled the last six places among the top ten in that order.

Wisconsin vaulted into the select group from 14th place last week, replacing Ohio State which dropped from 10th to 17th.

Maryland, seeking to regain the national championship it won in 1953, now appears to have comparatively easy going to an undefeated season. The Terrapins play Wake Forest next Saturday, then follow with North Carolina, Syracuse, Louisiana State, Clemson and George Washington. The only one of these opponents with a ranking this week was Clemson (tied for 22nd).

Terps Widened Gap
The Terrapins' total of 292 points was eight less than the previous week's, but their margin over runnerup Michigan increased from 38 to 50 points. Michigan had 242 point; Oklahoma 229 and Georgia Tech 226.

The Sooners and Georgia Tech

exchanged the spots they held last week.

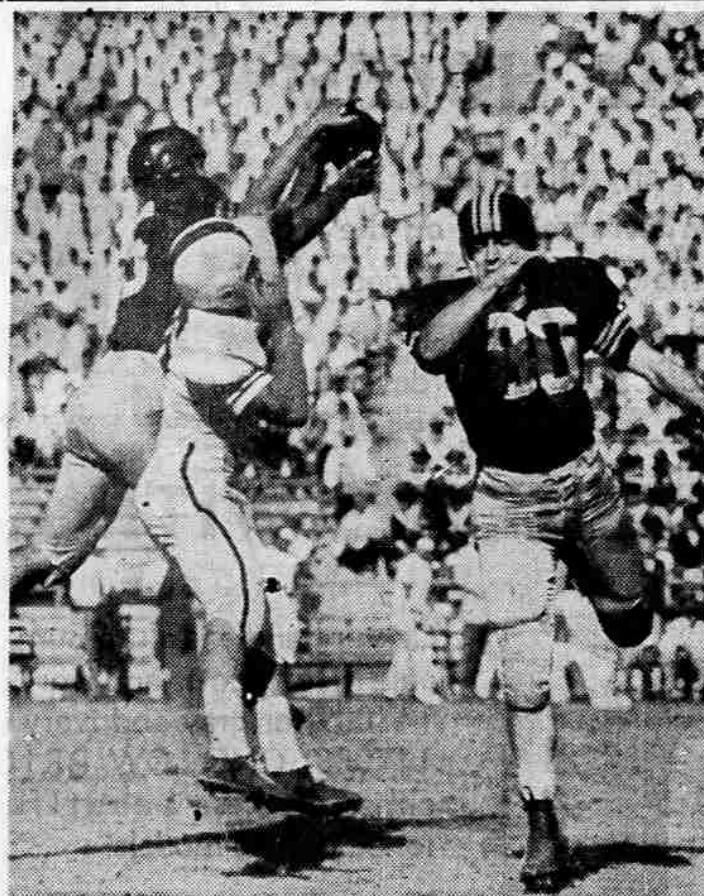
Army moved up one notch to sixth behind Notre Dame, and TCU advanced two places to seventh. UCLA, the 1954 national champion, and Southern California each fell two places to eighth and 10th, respectively.

Duke, advancing five places,

headed the second 10, with Navy 12th and Miami (Fla.) 13th. Michigan State, Stanford and West Virginia were tied for 14th place; Purdue 18th, and Auburn and Colorado tied for 19th.

Other teams that received votes this week were Illinois, Clemson, Mississippi, Rice, Pittsburgh and Texas.

Vaught came to the club from the Philadelphia Eagles last month in exchange for a draft choice, which the Forty Niners would have given up if they had kept him.

Meanwhile team physician William O'Grady announced that halfback Carroll Hardy, linebacker Bud Laughlin and defensive end Charley Powell will probably miss the game against the Bears in Chicago next Sunday.

X-rays revealed that Hardy has a sprained rib cartilage.

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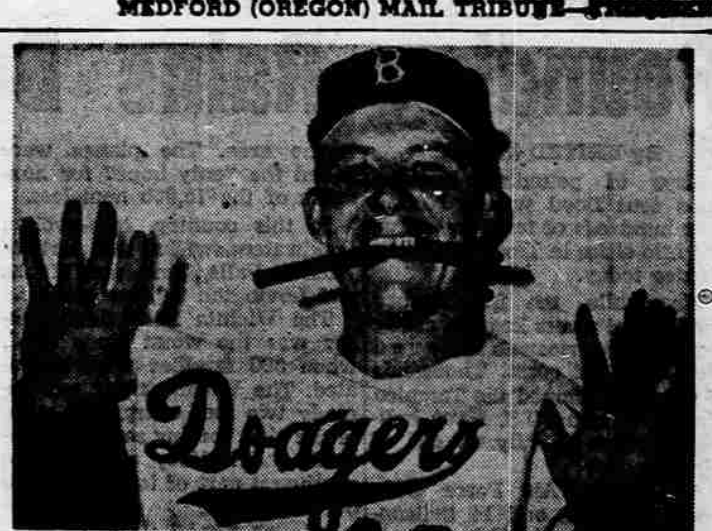
