### Be-Kind-to-Hamburger Rules Given by Expert

Chicago—(U.P.)—Dad would give mother some real competition at the family barbecue if he'd observe a few simple be-kind-to-hamburger rules, an expert says.

Sidney Smith, general manager of the Peter Pan snack shop chain which sold more than 5,000,000 hamburgers last year, said men should "be gentler" with the ground meat.

His cooking rules:

1. Never grind the meat more than twice. Try meat ground only once for extra-tender, juicier patties.
2. Pat the meat gently into shape. "Mauling and kneading... breaks up the meat's delicate cell structure and squeezes out taste-giving juices."
3. "Never, never press down with a spatula during cooking. It doesn't shorten cooking time appreciably and only squeezes out the juices."
4. Turn only once to prevent juice escape, and use a wide spatula.
5. "Remember that hamburger meat can be sensitive as a prima ballerina. Mistreat it and you're in for an unsatisfactory performance. Be kind to hamburgers and they'll win you praise as a first-class cook."

**CLOVES SPICE PORK**

New York—(U.P.)—Most of us are familiar with cloves for flavoring and decorating hams, but often forget they are delicious when used with unsmoked meats. A roast of pork takes on new flavor when cloves are used as the seasoning.

### Amino Acid Use Increases Appetite Scientists Say

New York—(U.P.)—Scientists believe they have broken down the cycle responsible for children's poor appetite by adding an essential amino acid to the diet.

From a series of controlled clinical studies, doctors found that children who drink milk or formulas containing the amino acid, lysine, gain weight and their appetites increase, sometimes in a day or two.

Building body tissue requires more food and calls for it. That is known as appetite. If the body is not utilizing its food properly the tissues do not send appetite signals to the brain. The lysine, marketed under the trade name, "lactoford," helps the body to utilize food and stimulates the appetite, the clinical tests showed.

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### Women Given Suggestions On Buying of Suits

As a guide to the thousands of women who help men select new suits, the following helpful suggestions are offered by one of the country's largest manufacturers of men's clothing.

The suit style most becoming to a man is the one that brings his shoulders and hips into the best balance for a slim, straight up and down line, says Michael Daroff, president of H. Daroff & Sons.

That simple yardstick should always be followed, he maintains.

If a man has wide shoulders and narrow hips, Daroff recommends a style with a minimum of shoulder padding as the one which will look the best. If his waistline shows the effect of good cooking, he needs a style with enough shoulder and chest fullness to balance out his figure.

A short stocky man will look inches taller and pounds lighter in a single-breasted suit in a dark, or medium shade. He should avoid light colors, pronounced patterns, wide and heavily padded shoulders, and double-breasted styles.

If he is tall and thin, he will look best in a double-breasted suit in fabrics such as flannels, tweeds or sharkskins. Overall patterns, such as plaids, stripes or fleck effects will soften his angular lines, and color in his accessories will help, too.

### Internationally Known Designer Gives Advice to Women on How to Buy Dress

New York — (U.P.)—Sit down before you buy that dress. This advice comes from a designer known internationally as Mainbocher. His name, he explains, really is Main Bacher in honor of his Scottish grandfather, Hawley Main. He changed it when he went to Paris in the 1920s.

Anyway, the Chicago-born designer is paid staggering amounts for his knowledge of clothes by a variety of famous customers, including both society women and actresses.

**Has To Sit Well**

A dress has to fit well, to get back to Mainbocher's advice, or the results can be unfortunate when you stand up again.

He explained that wrinkles across the front of a skirt are a sign it is too tight. Women get bigger when they sit down, he hints tactfully, and if you buy a dress only looking at it standing up you won't realize that the girth is insufficient for your sitting-down size.

Each afternoon promptly at 3 p.m., just as Mainbocher did in his Paris salon, he has models show the complete collection, "in the same order and the same

way whether there is one woman here or there are 50."

**Designing Actresses' Clothes**

Mainbocher is designing the stage wardrobe for Lynn Fontaine in "The Great Sebastians" and the wardrobe for Mary Martin's TV appearance later this month with Noel Coward.

To be well dressed takes time, lots and lots and lots of time, he admitted quite frankly. Then, most women are afflicted with prejudices.

"The important thing is to express the person you are in the clothes you wear. Extreme simplicity is not right for all women. Yet there are others who have so much authority as a person they could come out in a shift and look well dressed."

When in doubt, sit down. If not to test the dress just to think about the purchase, the business-like designer advised, because: "Snap decisions do not make for good choice."
