

Rep. Coon Repeats Partnership Dam Finance Argument

Ontario — (U.P.) — The Coon-Neuberger power debate went into its second final week at this Eastern Oregon agricultural center last night before about 400 persons.

Rep. Sam Coon, Baker Republican, repeated his argument that partnership financing of the proposed John Day dam on the Columbia river would be the fastest means of getting new power on the line in the Northwest.

Sen. Richard L. Neuberger, Portland Democrat, replied that if the dam is built with private funds the power would cost too much and that it would not attract as much industry to the region as cheap federal power.

Coon again disputed Neuberger's comparison of kilowatt-hour costs between partnership and federal power and claimed private financing would save the taxpayers just that much money.

Neuberger contended that Coon's plan would wreck the present system of power distribution through the Northwest Power pool.

The two will present the seventh in their 10-debate series tonight at Lakeview.

OLCC Refuses Larger Containers

Portland — (U.P.) — The Oregon Liquor Control commission yesterday refused to grant a request of the Oregon License Beverage association for permission to sell beer in containers holding up to 32 ounces for consumption on the premises.

Commission regulations now permit the sale of beer in large containers but only to be consumed off the premises. Present size limit for beer containers on premise is 23 ounces.

The commission canceled the licenses of Roy Applegate of the Sportsman's Club in Burns and of the Club 13 in Astoria. Retail malt beverage licenses were granted to the Alpine Coffee shop in Canyonville and the Chateau in Leaburg. A license allowing dancing and entertainment was granted to operators of the Three J's restaurant in Portland.

Highway Inspector Files Guilty Plea

Dallas, Ore. — (U.P.) — Arthur T. Garrow, 51, street inspector for the State Highway department, pleaded guilty before Circuit Judge Val Sloper yesterday to a charge of malfeasance in office. He will be sentenced Friday.

Garrow, one of three men suspended by the State Highway commission last month, was charged with accepting \$180 from a contractor doing business with the commission.

Garrow previously had appealed his suspension to the State Civil Service commission, as had Edgar O. Ferguson, assistant resident engineer, and Charles F. O'Neill, train men. All three are residents of Salem.

The law forbidding state employees from accepting gifts in connection with their work provides that violation may bring a fine of not more than \$5000, a sentence of up to one year in the county jail or penitentiary, or dismissal from state service "with or without either or any such punishment."

Senate Committee Would Hear Farmers

Portland — (U.P.) — Farmers, rather than farm organization leaders, will be encouraged to testify before the Senate Agriculture Committee which meets at Pendleton Oct. 31, Sen. Richard L. Neuberger said today.

"It is my understanding," Neuberger said in a statement, "that Sen. Allen J. Ellender, committee chairman, feels many agricultural group leaders can get to Washington to present their views. For this reason, the committee will want to hear from a cross-section of ranchers and farmers when the hearing takes place in Pendleton."

He said the hearing would be principally concerned with wheat and dairy products problems, but other crops would not be excluded.

Wolf Creek Tavern Sold at Auction To Grants Pass Man

Wolf Creek — Wolf Creek Tavern, one of the oldest hostels in southern Oregon, was sold at auction Friday to W. W. Martin, Argyle Motel court, Grants Pass.

Built in 1857 The Tavern was erected in 1857 by Ben Holladay to serve as a stage coach stop. Holladay, who maintained a stage line between San Francisco and Portland, had other stops at Gold Hill and Canyonville.
