Sugar Ray Given Chance at Bobo

Chicago — (U.P.)—Former middleweight champion Sugar Ray Robinson will get a chance at the age of 34 to try and regain his old title from the 27-year-old champion, Carl (Bobo) Olson, in the Chicago Stadium Nov. 4.

The fight was announced Thursday by the sponsoring International Boxing Club, who said it would be televised nationally, with Chicago and the area of 150 miles surrounding broadcasted out, and also would be broadcast both locally and nationally.

Robinson has beaten Olson twice previously, scoring a 13-round knockout in Philadelphia Oct. 26, 1950, and winning a 15-round decision in San Francisco March 13, 1951.

Since then he has had six fights on a comeback campaign. He lost to Ralph "Tiger" Jones here Jan. 19 in his second comeback appearance, but won the other five bouts.

Robinson's last victory was a 10-round decision over Rocky Castellani, in San Francisco July 22, one of the three victims of Olson in previous title defenses.

Olson's other victories in defending his 160 pound crown were over Kid Gavilan and Pierre Langlois. In all Olson has won 65 of 72 bouts. His last defeat was June 22 when he was knocked out by Archie Moore in the third round of a bout for the light heavyweight title. Since then Olson has beaten Jimmy Martinez and Joey Giambra.

Junior High Eighth Grade Teams Knot

McLoughlin and Hedrick eighth grade footballers fought to a 6 to 6 deadlock yesterday afternoon in the first official rivalry between Medford's two junior high schools.

Hedrick tallied in the first quarter on a long run and McLoughlin turned a pass interception into a touchdown in the third period.

The new east side school got the first TD despite the fact that practically all of the first quarter was played in its territory.

McLoughlin had threatened after Jerry Anderson's opening kick-off rolled only four yards, driving from the Hedrick 44 to the 21 before being thrown back. Hedrick took over the ball on the 28 but was penalized back to the 22. Four plays gained to the 37 then Gary McGill skirted left end with super interference and ran down the sideline in a 63-yard romp to score. It was the only offensive thrust of the stanza into Bulldog territory.

Conversion Nullified

Don Cranston ran over the conversion to make it on the next play.

The west side Bulldogs threatened again in the initial play after big, hard-running Lynn Knight ran the kick-off back 39 yards to the Hedrick 28. McLoughlin got to the 22 but a holding infraction ended the drive.

Big share of the second quarter was played in the west school's portion of the field with Hedrick once getting to the McLoughlin 21.

Rest of the game was battled about evenly.

Knight set up the Hedrick TD by his interception of McGill's toss. He gathered in the ball in midfield and struggled to the 13 yard line. On the next play he went around right end to the goal. On the extra point try Knight had trouble getting hold of the ball and was stopped inches short of the goal line.

Best gains for either team during the afternoon were around ends. The clubs played a shortened fourth quarter after stop watch trouble lengthened the third.

Heins, Stranahan Share Open Lead

Baltimore, Md. — (U.P.)—Ray Heins, making his first start along the professional trail, and millionaire Frank Stranahan shared a one-stroke lead today going into the second round of the \$17,500 Eastern Open golf tournament.

Heins, 35-year-old assistant pro at the Baldoc Hills Country Club in Irwin, Pa., canned seven birdies for a 33-34—67 Thursday, while Stranahan of Toledo, Ohio, looking for his first tourney triumph since turning pro a year ago, came up with three birdie putts of less than six inches for his 67.

A stroke back of the co-leaders at 68 are big Mack Souchak, former Duke University football star from Durham, N.C., and steady Mike Homa of Rye, N.Y., while blond Dick Mayer of St. Petersburg, Fla., who won this event two years ago and Frank Lenny of Annapolis, Md., are tied for third at 69.

In fourth, another stroke back, are Don Whitt, Alameda, Calif.; Buster Reed, McKinney, Tex.; Art Wall Jr., Pocono Manor, Pa.; Marty Furgol, Lemont, Ill.; Billy Maxwell, Odessa, Tex.; and Doug Ford, PGA champion from Kiamasha Lake, N.Y. Ten
