The monthly master point session was held when Medford Duplicate Bridge club met Tuesday night. R. Lannigan, Portland, was a club visitor.

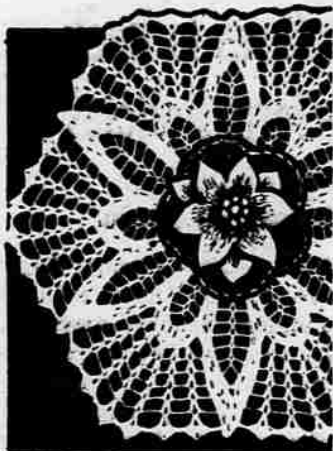

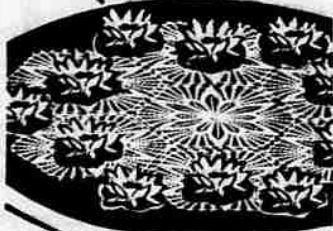
Hostesses were Mrs. Ben Todd and Mrs. Richard Milestone.
