Two Give Party For Bride-Elect At Recreation Hall

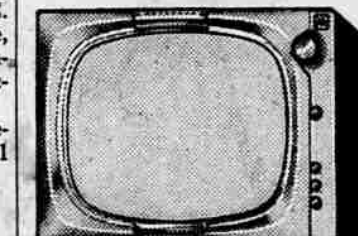
